These students were chosen on the recommendation of their department deans. Lindenwood College was contacted by Marilyn Westenberger, who serves on the Board of the Chamber of Commerce. Westenberger suggested to the Board to bring in students to the membership of the board. The purpose of incorporating the students into the Chamber is to benefit everyone.

"The students win, the members win, and the Chamber wins," said Westenberger. "The Chamber wins because the students bring in time contributions and insight. The members win because the students bring in new ideas. The students win because they get to interact with many business and community leaders."

Lindenwood takes another step into the future as the Fine Arts Department develops a new advanced computer and graphic art academic program.

This exciting new program was designed by a Lindenwood graduate, Jordan Mogerman, who is now an assistant professor of graphic design

This semester, students in Computer Art II studied 2-dimensional computer art. Next semester three new classes will be offered: Computer

Art I, which will cover 2-dimensional photography; Design I, which will cover the design of brochures and newsletters; and Publication Editing and Producing. Students in that class will lay out the yearbook and Lindenworld.

"This new program is designed to prepare students for entrance to the graphic design field," Mogerman said. He added that jobs in page design, publication composition, and other design work require the high tech experience this program offers.



Dancers practice lifts in the dance studio (l to r): Amy Belding, Tim Root, Debby Craig, Bobby Grosser.


The Lindenwood College Showcase Dancers will present their annual fall showing of faculty and student choreography Wendesday, November 30 at 7:30 p.m.
