### Lindenwood College Tops In Placement

Over the past two years, 97 percent of Lindenwood College students who participated in the College's job placement program were placed in jobs or graduate school within three months of graduation.

"Lindenwood's remarkable placement record is due to the Talent Accomplishment Program (TAP) that begins as soon as a student is admitted to Lindenwood." said Brian Watkins, director of student development. "We work with every student to develop a running resumé that includes their work and service experiences, and their record of leadership activities. The result: a profile of a well-rounded liberal arts educated graduate that is culturally literate and extremely marketable. This is the kind of person employers tell us they want to hire."

"A college should measure its success by the success of its graduates," said Dennis Spellmann, president. "We work with every student in the program until they are placed in a job or graduate school. We are not aware of another school in the country that can match our record of success."

Eighty percent of Linden-

wood's graduates receive job offers at or before graduation, as reported in the 1995 Peterson's Guide to Four Year Colleges. According to the guide, Lindenwood's job offer rates leads a majority of the nation's private colleges:

Lindenwood is a safe campus; however, security and maintenance are taking yet another step to make the campus even safer. Next semester, the College will provide an escort service for students who do not want to walk across campus alone at night.

Tim Wilson, director of maintenance work and learn, and recent LC graduate, feels this service is important. He is now the head of the program. "We want to provide a safe feeling for students in night classes and assist security in any way we can," Wilson said.

The service will consist of about 10 work and learn students, who will be stationed at different parts of the campus, such as at the doors of buildings. They will wear red and yellow jackets to be easily recognized. The program will work with security to expand the safety of the campus; it will be especially helpful for students who walk to their cars or dorms after night classes.

Wilson added that regardless of the size of the campus, students must always take precautions for their personal safety. The escort service is yet another way for students to do this.

### Student Profile:

### Jackie Niemeier

Jacqueline Niemeier, senior at Lindenwood College, does not have the typical internship. Niemeier works for the Missouri Division of Youth Services. The Missouri Division of Youth Services is an agency authorized by law to provide care and treatment to youth committed to the agency by Missouri juvenile courts.

Niemeier is Mentor and Intensive Case Monitor for the Division. A mentor is a volunteer for the Division who visits a youth in the facility. A mentor may continue to help the youth even once they are returned to their home community. An intensive care monitor works with multiple cases of delinquents once they are released from the facility. Niemeier is basically a role model for delinquents who are detained in a facility. A mentor is a friend, teacher, and confidant to a youth. Niemeier not only interacts with the youth but also with the youth's family and friends. The relationship between the mentor or intensive care monitor can be a life-long relationship if desired.

The kids that Niemeier works with usually have been through some type of turmoil. The youths are placed in the Division for offenses such as alcohol or drug abuse, gangs, and truancy. Niemeier gives help to the delinquents in education and employment. She talks to the youths to figure out why they're having problems, and then she tries to resolve it. She helps them become re-socialized, and she encourages them to turn away from their past problems and become involved in healthy activities. "Sometimes they (the youth) are a challenge, but you try to accept them because nobody ever has before," says Niemeier.

Many of the delinquents that come from the juvenile courts come from abusive homes and relationships. Niemeier says that through this job she has learned what her biggest blessings really are. "After working with these kids and seeing their home life—I pray for them," says Niemeier.

The opportunity in the Division has taught Niemeier more than any course work could have taught her. She has learned hands-on about Psychology and Criminal Justice. She says, "Working with these kids has changed me more than it's changed the kids."
