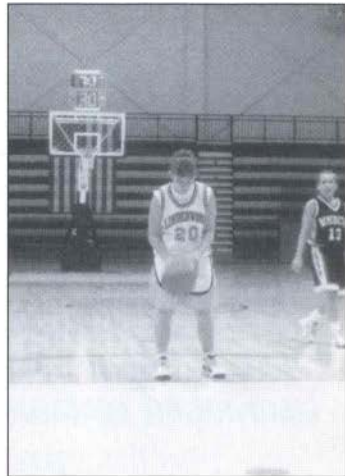
Walking onto the field, court or track in a Lindenwood uniform means a lot more than just another game...it is an opportunity and a privilege. Sports at Lindenwood build character and produce well-rounded citizens.

Lindenwood is among the fastest-growing colleges in Missouri, and our athletic philosophy is one of the reasons for our dramatic growth. We have more than 17,000 successful graduates throughout the world, and for many of them, athletics were a significant part of their experience at

Lindenwood. We are committed to top academic programs, values and scholarship.

Our attitude toward athletics is exemplified not only in our philosophy of a top education for scholar-athletes, but also in the facilities we provide. Wrestling, volleyball and basketball teams compete in our state-of-the-art Performance Arena, which was completed in 1996, and the field in our Athletic Stadium has been resurfaced with a high-tech new artificial surface called Astroplay that is designed to closely simulate real grass and limit injuries in the process.

Football, soccer and our new field hockey program will compete on the new surface this year. These improvements, and many others to the campus and athletic facilities, show our intense commitment to our students, both on the field of competition and in the classroom.

Mary Easton Sibley was a pioneering educator, and George Sibley was a noted pioneer and frontiersman who helped chart the Santa Fe Trail. The Sibleys' pioneering spirit lives on at Lindenwood, which blossomed from a frontier college into a university – an innovative force

dedicated to liberal education in the highest sense and meaning of the term.

Two new residence halls are currently under construction, and a new campus center with state-of-the-art facilities is slated for construction this year.

In recent years, the university's educational facilities have been aggressively modernized, just as the athletic facilities have been added and renovated to make them among the best in the country.

Lindenwood's impact reaches far beyond the gates of the main campus. Adult students attend undergraduate and graduate classes at satellite facilities in St. Louis, Westport, O'Fallon, Wentzville and Washington. Lindenwood is leading the way again with the establishment of the Center for the Study of American Culture and Values on the grounds of the Historic Daniel Boone Home, which merged with

Lindenwood challenges its students to be leaders – to dare to walk boldly into the next century.

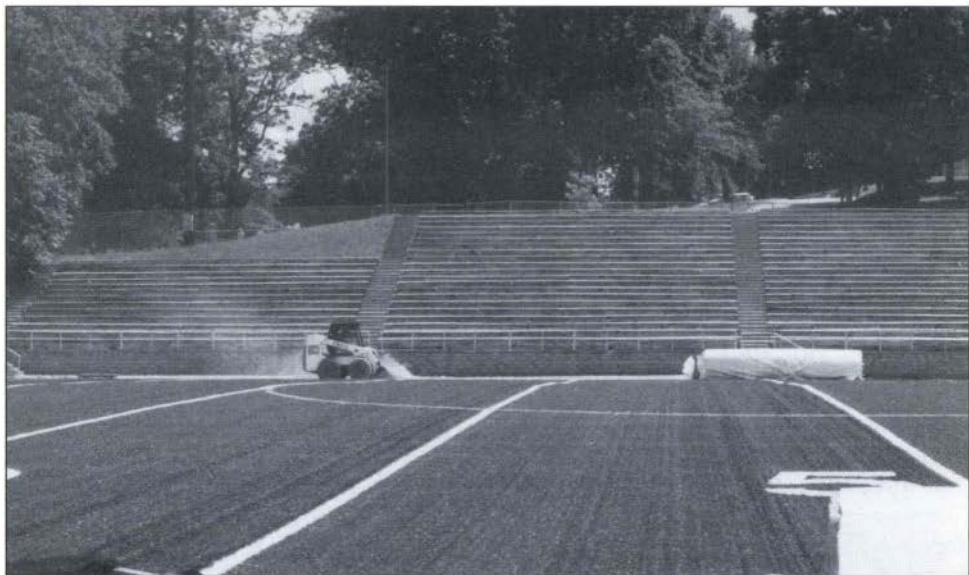

Our Commitment to Top Athletic Facilities

- The Performance Arena, a 3,000-seat venue for college basketball, volleyball and wrestling as well as concerts, lectures and conferences.
- The Athletic Stadium, a 5,000-seat, artificially turfed football and soccer arena. The stadium was fitted this summer with a new, high-tech artificial surface called AstroPlay.
- Two grass soccer/football fields located just southwest of the stadium
- Baseball and softball diamonds
- A six-lane, all-weather, outdoor track, for athletic and student use
- Four new tennis courts next the Arena
- Fitness Center, with weight machines and free-weight training equipment and a batting cage.

LU teams will compete on new, high-tech surface

Lindenwood's artificial turf in the Athletic Stadium has long been an attraction for athletes who wanted experience playing on an artificial surface.

This year, however, the stadium, as well as the infield on the softball field, got a facelift with the installation of a new, state-of-the-art artificial turf that looks and feels like real grass.

The new turf, called AstroPlay, was created by the Astroturf Company and was installed this summer.

"This is a completely new product," said Brett Barger, Lindenwood director of operations.

"It's non-abrasive and is the closest duplication of real grass on the market."

The new surface was extended all the way to the fences around the football field, replacing the grass that used to be there as well.

"We're extremely excited about this," Head Football Coach Dan Kratzer said. "It's a user-friendly surface, and from everything I've seen, it's going to work out extremely well for us. I think our athletes are really going to like it."

Football, soccer and field hockey are played in the Athletic Stadium.

Football

The Lions of the Gridiron had their best season ever last year, finishing 8-2 and competing in their first national tournament ever. None the less, coach Dan Kratzer says last year was only a sign of things to come. With the new, state-of-the-art playing surface in the stadium and a large contingent of returning players, the Lions will be primed for continued success

Women's Soccer

The perennial powerhouse, last year's team finished 18-3-3 and made it all the way to the semi-final game in the national championships. Coach Kevin Kilcullin has the team's sights set on another trip to the nationals this year and an even better finish.

Men's Soccer

Finishing the season strong, the men took their 15-9 record into the conference tournament and won it. The team made it all the way to the second round of the Midwest Regional Tournament before their season ended, but Coach Carl Hutter has his Lions ready to surge forward once again.

Cross Country

After both the men's and women's cross country teams breezed to victories at conference, they went on to the national tournament. The men placed second while the women finished 11th, and with runners like last year's freshman All-American Kristen Bruening returning, the team expects another great year.

Women's Volleyball

After finishing the regular season with a 7-2 record in the conference and a 25-13 record overall, the Lady Lions fell to the number-one ranked team in the nation in the Midwest Regional Playoffs. However, with almost all of his players returning this fall, Coach Witte hopes his squad can expand on its fine performance.

Tennis

The tennis team hopes to build on last year's fall season in which the women went undefeated in dual competition and the men suffered just one lost meet. This seemed a precursor to a successful spring, and it was when the women made news by qualifying for the national tournament in Florida. Coach Terry Beer is excited about the quality of this still relatively new program.

Wrestling

With a strong showing in his first year as head coach, Joe Parisi's squad improved all season with several competing at the national tournament, which was held in Lindenwood own Performance Arena. The tournament will be held here again in 2000, and Parisi and the grapplers expect even greater success this year.

Women's Basketball

The Lady Lions had a strong regular season, finishing 23-10. Their hopes for the national tournament looked good, but they fell just short in their efforts to make the tournament. However, coach Dave Witter continues to improve the team each year and is hoping for even greater success in 2000.

steadily rolling along under head coach Dale Ribble, the Lions have continued to get better year after year. Last year the team finished at .500, going 16-16 overall and 10-8 in league play. This was a marked improvement over the team's 5-28 record just three years ago. This year could be a break-out year for the squad, and things are looking pretty good.

Indoor/Outdoor Track

Men's and women's track teams were a dominating force in the conference again this year and went to nationals again this year as contenders for the national men's and women's crowns in both the indoor and outdoor seasons. Indoors, the men placed second at nationals and the women fifth. Both squads returned to nationals in the outdoor season and duplicated those results at nationals. This year, the team and Head Coach John Creer are looking forward to help from new assistant coach Tom Culbertson.

Swimming and Diving

In their inaugural season, the aquatic Lions far exceeded the typical expectations for a new program. Coach Craig Penrose led the team to the NAIA Nationals in Washington. The men placed 12th and the women finished 13th. With new diving coach Doug Beavers added, this year, the team is poised for even greater success.

Softball

The Lady Lions finished their season 42-8 made yet another trip to nationals. Having established themselves as a powerhouse, the team, which has most of its players returning, including dominating pitchers Sallie Henry and Dawn Cameron, is looking forward to a return trip to nationals.

Baseball

The team finished strong under first-year head coach, Tom Broyles. Their overall record of 13-23 is greatly surpassed by their remarkable 20-4 record in HAAC play and their HAAC title. The team narrowly missed playing at nationals when they lost in the finals of the Midwest Regionals.

Golf

The men's golf team placed 22nd at nationals last year, and, along with the women's team, has hopes of going even further this year. Head Coach Roger Ellis will be pushing the Lions to their best.

New Sports

Men's Volleyball, Spirit Competition, Field Hockey and Bowling have been added this year. These teams will look to continue the great success set forth by all current Lindenwood teams.

LU sports recognized among best in nation

Fourth place finish in Sears Cup places LU with elite

Sports program shooting for top spot in 2000

Lindenwood University athletic officials have set their sights on the coveted Sears Directors' Cup—given annually to the top athletic program in the country.

In a preseason press conference, Athletic Director Dan Kratzer said L.U. was "shooting for the top this year" after presenting the 4th place plaque to President Dennis Spellmann.

The Lions could very well make it happen. With a national championship already under their belts in indoor track and field and a fifth place finish in softball, Lindenwood is ranked among the nation's elite in several sports.

The football team, with an 8-2 record last year, is setting its goals high after its first appearance ever in the national tournament. And there are high expectations this season for track, softball, baseball and wrestling.

"We're going to excel on the field," said Kratzer. "But it is important to remember that athletes at Lindenwood excel in the classroom too. Kids don't come here just for sports. They have to

have their whole future in mind."

Lindenwood's exponential growth over the past few years has been evident in the athletic department, which has grown from three to 28 sports. The administration has kept up with the growth by adding new and improved facilities.

"Our Performance Arena seats 3,000 and is a superb multipurpose facility," said Kratzer.

And the visitors are still beaming about Lindenwood's new Astroplay surface on the athletic field, home to football and soccer.

"It sounds funny, but once people see this field they know the grass is greener at Lindenwood," said Kratzer. "We believe in top facilities and top opportunities for our athletes."

New sports provide opportunity for more student athletes

Men's Volleyball

Traditionally a sport for women at the high school and college levels, men's volleyball has been growing in popularity in recent years, in part because of the success of the United States men's team in Olympic and world competition. Mike Gardner will coach the team, which will compete from January through March.

Field Hockey

This fall, Lindenwood will see its new field hockey team in action for the first time with coach Rob Westling at the helm. Very popular in the eastern United States, field hockey is played locally by only a few other schools. In its first season, the Lindenwood squad will compete against St. Louis University, Washington University, Hanover College and DePaul University.

Bowling

The new bowling program will be in competition throughout the academic year, competing in at least eight tournaments in its inaugural season. The squad will compete in five-person men's and women's teams and will strive toward a national tournament in April. The team is coached by former professional bowlers Mike Halwe and Randy Lightfoot.

Spirit Competition

For years, Lindenwood's cheerleaders, dance team and spirit squad have won awards and contributed to a fun and lively atmosphere at Lindenwood sporting events. Now, the cheerleaders and dancers will engage in competition that will showcase the athleticism and talent that they possess.

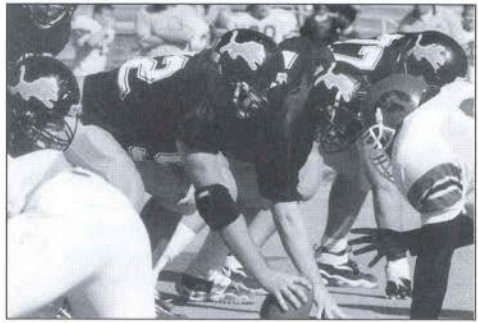
