### humanities

Humanities is the largest academic division at Lindenwood with areas ranging from foreign languages to studio art. The languages at Lindenwood consist of German, French, and Spanish. These can be studied on a cursory level or pursued in depth. Features of this department are January trips to Mexico and France and independent studies as well.

Music has always been an integral part of Lindenwood's academic program. Whether in theory or practice, the college offers a variety of cultural experiences that are not only useful to the music scholar, but to other students of the college community as well. Located near St. Louis and its outstanding musical offerings, Lindenwood can allow its music students to experience excellent


concerts and also provides the opportunity to receive musical instruction from various members of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra.

The Communication Arts Department is a combination of many interesting fields. Theatre, broadcasting, television, film, and advertising are areas which offer reputable facilities to the students. The flexible curriculum of a communication arts major allows him to either concentrate in one specific area or to broach the entire field of communications.

Other areas of concentration in the humanities division are art history, studio art, classics, English, philosophy, and religion.

### natural sciences

The division of Natural Sciences includes biology, chemistry, nursing, mathematics and physical science.


Students studying in the areas of biology and chemistry are encouraged to experience independent research and to become familiar with equipment through laboratory work. Science students also have the opportunity to study in related fields, such as, ecology and nursing.

Mathematics not only offers courses in the area but follow through with career suggestions. This department provides students with knowledge that is useful in fields outside of math, such as medicine and teaching. The students pursuing a field in mathematics may avail themselves with both an excellent staff and the Lindenwood Computer Center which houses the I.B.M. 1130 computer.

Physical education is made available to the students of Lindenwood in many varied activities. Included in this area is gymnastics, swimming, dance, archery, tennis, and, of course, equitation. Many of these sports provide students with a chance to compete, but it is in the area of equitation that Lindenwood shows its overwhelming skill and talent.









#### social sciences

The department of social sciences offers areas of concentration in American Studies, Economics, History, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, and Elementary Education.

Business Education and Administration prepare the student for careers in the 'business world.' This includes everything from secreterial occupations to the fascinating area of computers.

Both sociology and psychology offer behavioral labs and independent studies which afford the student the opportunity to explore his area of interest. Psychology degrees are the B.A. and B.S., while sociology leads to a more complete graduate study level.

History covers many areas, including American Studies and Classical Civilization. January courses in Europe are a part of the history curriculum, while on campus seminars, independent studies, and tutorial courses provide the student in this field with a broad expansion of knowledge.


Education is an interesting area, offering the student actual classroom training via the Lindenwood Campus School. Here students may observe and teach preschoolers and kindergarteners. 



He did raise his head to smile At every person coming in.












## international night








## kclc: election coverage 1972






















#### kclc: innovative radio station



Paul Jenkins, a Missouri-born painter, displayed his works in the fine arts gallery from February 11 until March 4 of this past spring semester.

Jenkins received art training at the Kansas City Art Institute and also attended the Arts Student League in New York. Upon leaving the League he settled in Paris for a few years and responded quite favorably to the work of three European painters.

While at Lindenwood, Mr. Jenkins spoke to students and faculty about his works. He stressed the importance of remaining open and free to impulses and ideas that arise during the creative process.




























#### the new roemer auditorium

A large sum of money donated to the colleges made the rennovation of Roemer Auditorium a plausible delight. Architects for the project are Manske-Dieckmann and the general contractor is Robert R. Wright, Inc.

The theatre itself is patterned after

the Stratford Theatre in Ontario and the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis. The auditorium includes a multi-leveled performing platform and is equipped with modern lighting and an air conditioning system. Though an early completion date was originally set for February of 1973, the auditorium was opened during the summer of 1973.
