growth and increasing number of athletic programs (30), Lindenwood is continuously upgrading current facilities and/or constructing new ones. Such is evident in Lindenwood's state-of-the-art Performance Arena (where basketball, wrestling and volleyball teams compete), and the recently installed artificial surface called "Astroplay" in our athletic stadium. The new surface is designed to simulate grass and limit injuries. Football, soccer and field hockey all compete on the surface.

We hope this book gives you a glimpse of our outstanding athletic program, where character and sportsmanship are part of our mission.

At Lindenwood, we are committed to our students in the

classroom and on the athletic field. It is that very commitment that sets Lindenwood apart from other universities.

Lindenwood among best in the nation

After a fourth-place finish in 1999, Lindenwood

University finished second to Simon Fraser University in British Columbia for the coveted 2000 Sears Directors' Cup. The Cup is given annually to the top NCAA and NAIA athletic programs in the country. Lindenwood finished among the nation's Top 5 again in 2001.

A second-place finish in women's soccer led the Lindenwood charge in 2001. The men's soccer team made

its first-ever appearance in the NAIA playoffs, and the men's volleyball team finished 3rd nationally.

Much of Lindenwood's success can be attributed to President Dennis Spellmann, responsible for building LU's state-of-the-art Performance Arena and laying down the new Astroplay surface on its Athletic Field.



The expectations for the 2001-2002 fall, winter and spring seasons are high, but President Spellmann believes all Lindenwood's athletic programs will meet the challenge.

Football

Lindenwood's football team will have a lot of fresh faces in 2001, chief among them Rick Gorzynski, the new head


coach. Gorzynski is one of the most heralded high school coaches in St. Louis history.

But the accolades of his 27-year high school coaching career are behind him, and Gorzynski is a first-year skipper at Lindenwood. He inherits a Lions team that put plenty of points



on the scoreboard in 2000, but had trouble defensively.

"We're making some changes," said Gorzynksi. "We are going to get faster, and we are going to make some big plays on defense. We will probably take a few more chances than in the past."



Offensively, look for the Lions the run a little more in 2001. Gorzynksi said the Lions threw the ball too much in 2000.

Gorzynksi will build the 2001 Lions around some upperclassmen like defensive tackle Clarence Turner, a 6-2, 285pound junior; Peter Hubbard, a senior guard; flanker Cornelius "Sebo" Campbell, a junior; and fullback Mark Dillon, a junior who was

injured most of last season. But he is insistent that impressive youngsters will get a chance on his team.

Some of those include:

Sophomore defensive tackle Jeff Dobbie; sophomore offensive guard Will Eliopolous; sophomore defensive end Matt Hidduk' and freshmen Ryan Gildehaus, Chris Novak, Greg Canon, Nathan Dyer, Tyson Green, Dan Hill, James Marlock, Brad Sullinger, Richard Panosh, Jason Pruitt and others.

Men's Soccer

Carl Hutter's Lions went where no Lindenwood men's soccer team has gone before during the 2000 season: the national tournament. And although the Lions lost to St. Gregory Okla. in the first round, LU concluded its best season ever at 19-4.

To get to the big dance, Lindenwood won the Heart of America Conference Tournament and the Region V Tournament. But Hutter points out "That's all in the past. What matters is ahead of us."

Hutter's 2001 Lions squad, ranked No. 8 nationally in the NAIA's pre-

season poll, is chock full of talented returnees and he expects contributions from several newcomers.

"We will have the talent to go back to the national tournament," he said. "But it doesn't just happen with talent. You have to work hard and come together. That's the challenge."

Hutter said he is proud of the 2000 team, which had two all-Americans, but he is also proud of LU's performance in the classroom, where the soccer Lions had two academic all-Americans.

Women's Soccer

The 2000 Lady Lions finished their season with a heart-breaking five-overtime loss in the national championship game. It was Lindenwood's only defeat all season. LU finished 23-1.

With the pain of the loss not gone but diminishing, Coach Kevin Kilcullin says his team is preparing to return to the national title game in 2001—with a different outcome.

One thing is for certain: Lindenwood won't have to travel

far. Lindenwood University will host the 2001 NAIA Women's National Soccer Championships. For the Lady Lions, that means a chance to play for the national title on their home field.

"We'll just take it one game at a time like we did last season," said Kilcullin. We have a lot of veterans returning, and I think some of the newcomers will have an impact."



Kilcullin, whose team has the pre-season No. 1 ranking, will have senior Tish Martin at goalkeeper again in 2001. And not far away will be stopper Daniela Binswanger, another senior. The offense will almost certainly center on sophomore forward Inge Heiremans, who scored 29 goals and had 22 assists last year.

Women's Volleyball

The women's volleyball team at Lindenwood returns quite a bit of experience from a 2000 team that went 23-12 and finished third in the Heart of America Athletic Conference.

Coach Dave Witter is counting on seniors Lindsey Goosen, Lyn Schenk, Kate Bostwick, Chris Wallington and Jill Plassmeyer, and junior Brenda Allen. But he expects to see contributions in 2001 from newcomers this year too, particularly freshmen Laura Garvey, from Cor Jesu High School, and Kara Wall, from John F. Kennedy High School.

Witter says the Lady Lions "have a shot" at the conference title this year, along with Benedictine and Graceland.

But he says the Lindenwood schedule in 2001 "is murderer's row. It is a challenge, but it will help us prepare for postseason play."

Witter says excitement is building around his team, especially for a Sept. 19 match vs. Baker that is being billed as a "Block Party." Witter says all facets of the Lindenwood campus is working "to pack the place. It will be quite an event."

Men's Cross Country

Lindenwood's first-year cross country coach Sean Birren says the Lions may very well be one of the top five teams in the nation in 2001.

Returning athletes Birren is optimistic about include: Jacob Dressler, a sophomore who had a solid freshman year and may challenge for the No. 1 spot on the team; Richard Kientzy Jr., a junior who dipped under 26 minutes in the 8K; sophomore Jeremy Maranan; sophomore Andrew Smith, who will also compete for the team's top spot; and Sheldon Wood, Laverne Overton, Avalon Collins and Steven Caines Jr.

Incoming students who may contribute, Birren said, include Michael Aitken, a top seven prospect; Aaron Collier, Timothy Larrison, Alton Rattigan; Travis Straatmann, and Neil Theriault.

Women's Cross Country

Lindenwood's new cross country coach Sean Birren will build his 2001 team around five returning athletes, but he

expects contributions from many others if the Lady Lions are to be successful

Bevin Birren (Toomey) and Jamie Lee are the two returning seniors for LU. Birren was an all-American her junior year in 1999, and is back after sitting out a season to recover from foot surgery. Lee finished 7th at the national outdoor championships in Canada in the marathon.



Also back are Brook Six, who returns to LU after a year away for religious studies; sophomore Jessica Johnston, and Abidemi Charles, a sophomore who Coach Birren says will challenge for the No. 1 spot on the team.

Coach Birren said he looks for the following athletes to step up and compete for positions on the travel roster: Megan Boyle, Jaime Brahham, Cara Brewer, Jodi Heibel, Molly Hertling, Callie Hicks, Casandra Jones and Rebecca Kennedy.

Field Hockey

The 2000 Lady Lions showed that they were up to the task of fielding a competitive team in spite of a lean, young roster. While successes on the field did not amount to wins on the scoreboard, Coach Jill Jokerst was happy with how the team "closed the gap" with the competition as the 2000 season came to a close.

Now, with a year of experience under their belts and a very successful recruiting year, Jokerst expects to catch some of her opponents by surprise with the increase in the skill level.

"They have been working extremely hard in the off-season on their skills and conditioning," said Jokerst. "More competition for playing time and additional talent should raise the bar for the entire team – returners and newcomers alike."

Jokerst said Lindenwood's overall game will be much stronger in 2001. "This year I won't have to worry as much about fatigue and injury," she said. "That will allow me to take more chances and stretch the limits of these talented athletes. We have a pretty deep bench this year, and I am confident that I can go to any one of my players to make a contribution."

Specifically, Jokerst is looking toward increasing scoring during penalty corners with stick stopper Megan Evans and the strong shots of Liz Hamilton, Katie Arehart, Julia Widman, Christel Geldrich and Carly Craig. On the other end, Jokerst sees goalies Leah Werry and Kristy Scanga contributing significantly in lowering the percentage of goals scored against the Lady Lions on penalty corners.

Wrestling

Lindenwood's 2001-2002 wrestling team returns more experience than any Lion team in history. Seven all-Americans are back from the LU team that finished fourth in the nation last year.

"We do return more all-Americans than anyone else in the NAIA," said Coach Joe Parisi. "We're expecting a pre-season ranking in the top three."

The returning all-Americans at Lindenwood include:senior Josh Buchanan (125), junior Brant Bruner (133), seniors CJ Campbell (141) and Jason Fox (141), junior Jeff Carlson (149), senior Nathan James (184) and junior Wayne James (197).

Three returning national qualifiers are sophomore Micah Copeland (133/141), sophomore Mark Venable (184) and sophomore Tim Hildebrandt (285).

Returners won't necessarily have a cakewalk at Lindenwood, though. Parisi expects an impact from two redshirt freshman—Mark Cline (125) and Josh Brining (149) and several newcomers: Juco all-American Chad Smith (157), two-time California juco champ Brian Holt (165), juco all-American Jeff Figge (174), two-time Ohio state champion and high school all-American Roger Miller (285), two-time Missouri state champion Dustin Teeman (149/157), two-time Missouri state champion Tony Valencia (184/197) and two-time Juco champion Eric Brown (184).

This season will be the first time in four in which LU will be traveling to compete at the national championships—the Lions had hosted the event for three consecutive years. Parisi said the next national wrestling tournament will be in Great Falls, Mont.


"It's great to wrestle at home in front of a big crowd," said Parisi. "But there's something special about that traveling experience for a team. I think they're looking forward to it."

Men's Basketball

The cupboard certainly is not bare for first-year men's basketball coach Scott Allen. The Lions have six seniors who saw significant playing time returning from last year's 20-11 squad.

Leading the way will be point guard Travis Brooks, who averaged 12 points and six assists last season. He'll see action along with shooting guards Matt Brooks and Nick Connelly, 6-foot-5 all-conference forward Robbie Miller, 6-

foot-7 forward Dave Sovol, and 6foot-9 center Zoran Lazic. Sophomore small forward Ross Conner and junior guard Dustin Roberts are also expected to vie for playing time.



With an upperclass-laden squad, one might think playing time would be hard to come by for newcomers. Allen said it very well might be, but he wouldn't be surprised to see an impact from freshman Brooks Williams, a 6-foot-3 all-stater from Quincy High School, and Borislav Djordic, a 6-foot-7 freshman from Yugoslavia.

"We will have a lot of depth," said Allen. "And we will need it. We have the toughest non-conference schedule Lindenwood has had in several years. It's going to help us get ready for conference play and for the postseason."

Women's Basketball

Lindenwood's women's basketball coach Dave Witter has every reason to be optimistic about the 2001-2002 season. His team returns two starters and several experienced players from a 21-11 team that lost by a single point in the national tournament to Albertson, a team that went to the national championship game.

Witter returns his starting backcourt in senior Katie Pizzardi and junior Julianne VanDaniker. Other returnees include post players Sara Tucker, a sophomore, and Katie

Kutz, a senior.



LU also had a successful recruiting season, said Witter. The team is excited about the potential contributions of newcomers Angie Cain, Angie Stith and Tiffany Carney, as well as four time all-stater Lauren Ivey.

The Lady Lions had a conference record of 15-5 in 2000, and finished second in the HAAC tournament.

Swimming and Diving

Lindenwood University's swimming and diving team is looking to build on last year's 7th place finish at nationals with a host of returning stars and 25 newcomers coming on board.

The Lions had three national champion divers last season in juniors Kelli Wind and Jon Metcalf and senior Jessica Metcalf. LU had four all-Americans—the aforementioned threesome and the now-graduated Sarah Herholz.

According to Coach Craig Penrose, two returners should make a quick impact on the men's side of the pool: sophomores Ryan Kuehner (breast) and Casey Woodcock (back). Penrose said he expects no fewer than five returners on the women's side to have an impact: junior Jenny Cooper (butterfly), junior Jese Hesling (sprint freestyler), junior Rochelle Plutchak (backstroke) and twin sophomores Katie and Kelly Thompson (breast/IM).

Penrose said new faces to watch this year will be Dan Daniger (free, fly), Josh Jackson (free, fly), Juliea Raphael Amamrich (IM), Justin White (breast), Heather Carpenter (free, breast), Elena Kermicieva (free), Theresa Phillips (back), and Alex Titus (IM).

Men's Volleyball


Replacing the top player in the conference will be hard to do, according to Lindenwood men's volleyball coach Ron Young. So Young is taking a different approach to the graduation of Marty Zambo.

"We aren't going to be able to replace him," said Young. "I think as a team we will have to pick it up. We depended too much on Marty to carry us through difficult times last season."

The Lions finished 29-8 last season and were No. 3 in the nation after losing to eventual national champion Cal

Baptist. But Young says it will take leadership to get back to that level of play and reach the national tournament again. And Young says that is important since LU will be hosting the national tournament April 19-20.

Young knows he has several key players returning to "step up" and provide the leadership.



They include five juniors: outside hitters B.J. Wegner, Mike DiPierro and Nathan Fischer, middle hitter Morris Graves and opposite hitter Jon Ladner.

And then there are the sophomores: Setter Eddie Dahl is back, along with last year's freshman player of the year,

middle hitter Steven Nowell and outside hitter Andre Osmond.

Newcomers who may have an early impact include: freshmen outside hitters Derrick Abell and Aleksndar Lugonia, freshmen defensive specialists Mark Lasky and Julian Vera, freshman middle hitters Ben Nelson and Eric Wulf and setter Josh Young.

Baseball

Seven starters return for the baseball Lions from their 31-19 team of a year ago, chief among them outfielder Gabriele Corchado, a junior who had 12 homers and hit .400 last season when he earned honors as first-team all-conference, first-team all-region and honorable mention all-American.

While Corchado supplied offensive firepower for LU, so did freshman second baseman Juan Rios, who hit .376 and never was throw out while stealing 23 bases. Look for jun-



ior catcher Brett Israelson to provide some punch as well, along with returners Chad Limbach and David Logue, sophomore outfielders, and sophomore shortstop Jaime Cruz.

Others expected to make an impact, said Coach Tom Broyles, include reshirt freshmen Tom Schnabel, an infielder from Wentzville, and Craig Morris, an outfielder from University City.

Probably the biggest question mark for the 2002 Lions will be pitching. Broyles has no starting pitchers returning from last year's squad. But he remains optimistic.

"We've got Dan Jackson, a 27th round draft pick in 1999 who will be counted on as our ace," said Broyles. "He's a righthanded senior and he will provide a lot of leadership."

In addition, senior righthander Aaron Bobrzynski will be expected to contribute. Junior Matt Gilman will continue out of the bullpen, where he posted a 5-0 record last season.

The lack of depth on the mound means lots of opportunity for newcomers, said Broyles, who is looking forward to the contributions of lefty Ryan Giger, a transfer, as well as Brad Nichols (10-4, 2.94 ERA at Elgin CC last year), Nick Moore and James Biondo.

Softball

Most coaches would be pleased with a 33-20 record. But not Rob Westling. Not Lindenwood. Not after a team finished in the nation's top 10 for three years before that. So Westling and his Lady Lions are looking for a return to the nation's elite in 2002. He says the effort will be built around a core of returning players, and several newcomers.

Back for her senior season at Lindenwood is one of the nation's best pitchers in Dawn Cameron. She will share duties on the mound with junior hurler Alex Orlando. The newcomer to the mound this year will be senior transfer student Beth Parvin.



Offensively, look for returning outfielders Jamie Moses, a sophomore, and Danni McConnell, a junior, to contribute. On the infield, Jordan Sweeden will return but will likely move to second base or third to make room for sophomore shortstop Mary Kate Sexton. Others likely to see playing time are Melissa Poertner, Lindsay Tatalovich, Barbie Ventura, Meghan Crowe, Stephanie Decker and Lisa Brinker.

"There will be a lot of competition going on, but that's good," said Westling. "We have a lot of experience. Now we'll see if we can get the leadership we need."

Men's Track & Field

On the wall in John Creer's office are news clippings from his 1998 national championship team in indoor track. It is a constant reminder of where his team hopes to return in 2002.

Creer retired as a coach last year, but when Lindenwood needed his services, he couldn't resist jumping right back in to what he loves. And it appears his Lions already are focused on the prize—another shot at the national championship.

While the Lions won the indoor title in 1998, they finished fourth outdoor this past year. Creer is optimistic. He has several sprinters returning. They include: juniors Kevin Arthurton, Maxime Isiah and Irvin Browne, senior Wayne Robinson and sophomores Demetrius Totton and Kurt Gibbons.

Also back is all-American sprinter Timothy Caines. And if that isn't enough firepower, how about returning all-American Kenji Rhodes, a triple jumper?

Creer is also hoping for contributions from sophomore distance runner Andrew Smith, and decathlete Cody Hirschi.

Women's Track & Field

The women's track team is Lindenwood is poised for another good season, says Coach John Creer.

The women finished 12th at nationals last year, and Creer hopes that will turn into a top five performance in 2002.

Returning for the Lady Lions are seniors Dena Moore, a high jumper, and Bevin Toomey-Birren, a marathoner. Both did not compete last year due to injuries. Creer expects a lot from juniors Bernice Morton, who could very well place in the 100, 200, 400, long jump and triple jump, as well as Shyra Hughes in the 400 and Natalie Cozier in the long jump/triple jump.

Sophomore distance runner Abidemi Charles from Guyana is also expected to give the Lady Lions a boost in 2002. "I really think we can be top five this year," said Creer. "We have some very good people back, and we are bringing in quite a bit of talent to complement what we already have."

Men's Golf

The No. 17-ranked men's golf team seeks to continue its winning tradition at Lindenwood this fall, according to Coach Roger Ellis.

The Lions won five tournaments in 2000 and compiled a record of 110-24. Tournament victories included the Heart of America Athletic Conference Championship and the Region V title.

Dan Emrick returns to lead the Lions in 2001. A senior, Emrick was the individual medalist in five tournaments and he has repeated as a member of the allconference and all-region teams.

In addition to Emrick, returners include all conference and allregion performers Jason Micek and Ryan Dunn. Stephen Lugering also received all-region honors.



The No. 3-ranked Lady Lions had a record-setting season in 2000,



Back to lead the Lindenwood squad again is sophomore Itzel Nieto, the individual medalist in six tournaments last season. She is all-conference and all-American for a second time.

In addition to Nieto, returners include three all-conference performers: Collette Giroux, Sand Thind and Carly Graham. Besides the returners, Ellis said he expects contributions from junior Misty Pesola, sophomore Jill Laytham and incoming freshman Christy Bezaire.

BowlingMike Halwe started the Lindenwood bowling program three years ago, and is beginning to realize the fruits of his labor.

His women's team finished the season ranked 19th in the country last year, and "we have everyone coming back, including two new people who could have an impact."

No. 1 is Erin Reid, a sophomore who already is ranked in the nation's top 30. She is constantly challenged by team captain Kori Kuhlenschmidt, a junior. Also returning are

senior Robi Pohl and sophomore

Kim Richter.

Newcomers that have Halwe's attention are freshmen Jennifer McDonald and sophomore Jennifer Ip.

On the men's side, everyone returns as well. Halwe is proud of the punch packed by his O'Fallon, Mo duo of seniors Doug Lakey, team captain, and Todd Pagano. Then there's the



brothers Solovic-Mike, a senior who was out all last season with a back injury, and Steve, a sophomore. The final returning starter is sophomore Jack Champlin.

Halwe suspects to see an impact from freshman Ryan Reid, Erin's brother, who was with Team Canada and just won a gold medal in the Tournament of the Americas.

"I can see both the men and the women as top 10 this season if things come together," said Halwe. "We are really building a program here at Lindenwood."

Tennis

Look for some excitement out of the Lindenwood University tennis program in 2002, said tennis administrator Kevin Kilcullin. The women's team is hoping to build off a second place finish in the Heart of America Conference, and the men are hoping some top new recruits will supplement key returners in a run toward the top of the HAAC.

Kilcullin said he is counting heavily on Victoria Garcia, a sophomore, and last year's No. 1, along with No. 2 Eva Sam, a senior. "Victoria lost only once last year," said Kilcullin. "We have high hopes for her. Eva is a fierce competition who has continued to get better and better every year."

On the men's side, the Lions finished third in the conference and return their No. 1 and No. 2 as well: senior Vincente Brochado and sophomore Dexter Christian. Kilcullin says those two might feel some pressure from newcomers this season.



He has high hopes that Zbi

Rosenbaum, a transfer student from Kansas, and freshman Sebastien Briffault will have an immediate impact on LU's success. "It's going to be a competitive season," said Kilcullin. "We're looking forward to it."

Roller Hockey

Coach Steve Kahre looks to return strong after a second place finish in the nation in the National Collegiate Roller Hockey Association National Tournament this past spring. New recruits will bolster the team this year and help the Lions finish even stronger in the 2002 season.

Fencing

A club sport this year, Lindenwood is sure to continue its long tradition of successful sports programs with its new fencing team.

The exciting atmosphere at Lindenwood University's sporting events can be attributed in no small part to the Lion Cheerleaders, Lion Line Dancers and Spirit Squad. The award-winning squads pride themselves not only on entertaining Lindenwood's



students and fans, but also the opposing team's students and fans.

However, don't let the bright smiles, swift feet and positive words of encouragement fool you. The cheerleaders, led by coach Kim Knerr, and dancers, led by coach Alice Bloch, are a competitive bunch. Both squads competed in national competitions across the country last year, and if their performances were any indication of what is to come this year, Lindenwood followers will have plenty to cheer about.
