

# LINDENWOOD COLLEGE STUDENT ASSOCIATION

As stated in the Constitution, the purpose of the Lindenwood College Student Association is to co-operate in the performance of self-government. Open meetings are held every Monday at 6:30 P.M. and all students are urged to attend and participate. We are proud of our student government and are anxious to serve the students in every way possible.

# LINDENWOOD COLLEGE STUDENT ASSOCIATION

Student government and the active participation of every student at Lindenwood in that government, is an integral part of college life. While this association has a very immediate effect on the campus, the long-range purpose of any student government is to develop in those students who live under it the capacity for a mature and responsible role in adult life. It was with this purpose in mind that the Student Council was established.

The Student Council of Lindenwood College is composed of representative students who constitute the governing group of the student body. They legislate on all matters pertaining to the social regulations in community life, subject to the approval by the Administrative Committee. The Student Council meets on Monday evening and any member of the student body is welcome to attend.

Each student upon entrance to Lindenwood becomes a member of the Lindenwood College Student Association. By virtue of this fact, she accepts both the privilege and the obligation of self government. It is only when each student realizes that she plays a role in the government of her college that this form of self-rule can be representative and effective.

Student participation and cooperation is shown by means of the following:

- By keeping in touch with her student council representative.
   It is only through such contact that the members of the Student Council can actively represent the student body.
- 2. By making use of the suggestion box in Cobbs Lounge.
- 3. By serving on Student Council committees.
- By attending Tuesday morning Student Assembly. Students are held responsible for all information given out at that time.
- 5. By knowing and keeping the regulations of the community.
- By maintaining the standard of behavior in keeping with the reputation and ideal of the college.
- By developing attitudes of self-discipline, self-respect and consideration for others.
- By cooperating to the fullest extent with the duly constituted Hall Officers in the regulating and maintaining student selfgovernment in the dormitories.

Lindenwood is also a member of the National Intercollegiate Association of Women Students.

"IAWS occupies a unique position among the collegiate organizations of this nation by virtue of its being the only national women's student government group in the United States of America. As an organization, it offers membership for all college women from accredited colleges and universities, who are then represented by selected local leaders. IAWS is a service group dedicated to cultivating an attitude preparing women to govern themselves throughout their college careers, and thereby increasing their ability and desire to fulfill the role of educated and competent women in a democratic society to the highest degree of social, physical, intellectual, and spiritual achievement."

# THE HONOR SYSTEM

The Honor System is a way of life at Lindenwood College that must be accepted by every member of the student body and every member of the faculty to be effective. It became an integral part of the college program in 1954 and the Lindenwood Community is organized on the principle that a feeling of mutual trust pervades the campus. It is expected, therefore, that each new student and new faculty will come to accept the basic tenents of the Honor System and live by them.

The individual student's obligations under the Honor System are as follows:

- 1. To know and obey the regulations of the community.
- To report herself to the proper student government officer when she has violated a regulation, and when aware of violation by a fellow student, urge the student to report herself.
- To maintain the standards of behavior in keeping with the reputation and ideals of the college.
- A belief in the Honor System involves:
- A mature acceptance of the need for governing regulations in a community and one's responsibility as a member of that community to live by its laws and to help others keep them in spirit and in fact.
- 2. The student should realize that regulations have been passed for the "greatest good of the greatest number", and that the maintenance of quiet hours, signing in and out according to the regulations, attending required meetings etc. are very necessary to the well-being of the college and its students.
- 3. A willingness to report oneself to the proper honor board representative when one has violated a regulation, as well as a willingness to urge another student to report herself in case of a violation of regulations—a method which is considered the only enforcement worthy of an honor system.
- 4. A conviction that it is one's responsibility to act always in keeping with the reputation and ideals of the college—in the classroom, residence halls, and the larger communities of St Charles and St. Louis.



# STUDENT COUNSELING OF FRESHMEN

Proper freshman orientation is essential for any college, as the freshman class is usually the backbone of a campus. Here at Lindenwood, our aim is not to submit you to frivolous customs, but rather to instill in you a deep respect for the community of which you are about to become a part. Most important, we hope to make you realize the signifigance of your role on Lindenwood campus.

Throughout the year, there will be upperclassmen living in your dormitory to serve as your counselors. These girls have been selected on the basis of their scholastic ability, their character and their interest in working with you. Their purpose is not disciplinary but to serve as a link between you and the upperclassmen. Their duties will be what you want them to be. They can become your friend, your guidance counselor, or just someone with whom you would like to talk. The main point is that they will be here and they want to help you in any way possible. If perhaps they can't help they will be glad to refer you to the proper channel.

A great part of the success of our counseling program rests with you. We want you to become contented and useful citizens of our community and with your co-operation, I'm positive that you will.

# STUDENT CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

Your Student Christian Association at Lindenwood serves a unique purpose. Because of our relatively small student body, there are few groups sponsored by St. Charles churches for college-age persons. Therefore SCA provides both an inter-and a nondenominational fellowship for its members. As a member, you are concurrently a member of the National Student YWCA, and you will consequently have the opportunity throughout the year to take part in intercollegiate "Y" activities with other schools in Missouri and other nearby states.

We are more than a "Y", however. If you are interested in social service, you will find opportunities to work through welfare organizations in St. Charles; if you feel you gain most from bull session-type discussions, you may attend Buzz Sessions with faculty members in their homes. For just plain fun that raises money for students abroad, SCA sponsors the World University Service Auction, which finds all LC bidding on items and services donated by both faculty and students. And if you simply have the need to get away from campus for a day or two, you may participate in off-campus retreats.

SCA serves the entire student body, both individually through your automatic membership as a student at Lindenwood, and collectively through the dormitories and the active and varied interest groups which it encompasses. As a freshman you are welcome at any SCA meeting or activity, but also have a division through which you can work with your own classmates. This is Junior SCA (freshmen only), which operates as an integral part of all-campus SCA, serving the entire student body. Of course, if your personal beliefs prevent your acceptance of the Association's purpose, you may feel free to withdraw your membership.

Our purpose is to enrich the spiritual and social growth of each student, and thereby of the entire College. Now that you are a Lindenwood student, I hope you will take an active part in the growth of your college, and in your own personal growth through SCA's wide range of activities.

# LINDENWOOD COLLEGE STUDENT CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

When a student joins the Student Christian Association, she joins a dynamic vital campus fellowship which is affiliated with not only the National and International Y.W.C.A., but also with the World Student Christian Federation. The activities are many and varied and your participation is eagerly awaited.

JUNIOR CABINET. After the first nine weeks, freshmen elect officers for their branch of the SCA. It is the responsibility of this group to promote all activities of the SCA and to plan programs

which appeal especially to the freshmen class.

GENERAL MEETINGS. At least once a month special programs are planned. Sometimes speakers are invited to discuss current national and international happenings. Often there are movies or large discussion groups. Also special events are planned such as an old-fashioned Christmas party or a camp-out.

BUSINESS MEETINGS. Every two weeks the SCA has a business meeting which all students are invited to attend. At this time plans are made for future activities and voting procedures take place on

various issues.

BUZZ SESSIONS. Periodically the SCA sponsors small discussion groups in faculty homes. Refreshments are usually served while students discuss world events, campus problems, or whatever seems pertinent at the time.


SOCIAL SERVICE. Over 100 students participated in this program last year working in such areas as Boy's Club, Salvation Army, Girl Scouts, hospitals, orphanages and the Red Cross. Awards are presented at the end of the year to students who have made outstanding contributions in this area of volunteer service.

WUS AUCTION. Each year before spring vacation the SCA sponsors a tremendous auction which is the only fund raising campaign on campus. This money is sent to the World University Service and is used to help buy books and supplies for students in underdeveloped parts of the world. Cakes, pies, cookies, dinners, snack boxes and other surprises are donated by students and faculty members to be auctioned. Last year Lindenwood contributed nearly \$2000.

DORM DEVOTIONALS. Once a week short devotionals are held on each floor or wing in the dorms on campus. For special occasions such as Christmas, Thanksgiving and Easter, the whole dorm gets to-

gether for an inspirational service.

RELIGION-IN-LIFE WEEK. One week is set aside to relate religion to other areas of learning such as science, government, economics etc. An outstanding speaker is invited by the college to guide student thinking through convocation talks, discussion groups and personal counseling.



# DEAN OF THE COLLEGE

This is a booklet of welcome and instruction and I am glad to add my word of greeting to it. I am sure you have been looking forward to the day when you would begin your college work and now you are about to do so. How successful you will be in meeting the demands placed on you at the college, how well educated you will be when you finish your work depends very largely on yourself and not so much on your instructors and others here at Lindenwood. We are here primarily to set the stage for you so that you can educate yourself.

My work as Dean of the College is largely concerned with the details of the instructional program. When you arrive on campus you will be provided with a copy of the new Lindenwood catalog and in it you will find much information about the academic prorgam and the rules you will need to know about in order to get along well. If a question arises about your classwork, about your educational program, or about rules and regulations that govern these matters, come to see me if you don't know where to find the answer. I shall be glad to help you.

One thing you should know about immediately so that you get off to a good start is our class attendance system. We have no "cut" system at Lindenwood. All students are expected to attend all the classes regularly. That's why you are going to college. If it is necessary for you to be absent from a particular class meeting you must explain the absence to your instructor, in advance if possible. If you have too many absences you may have to be dropped from the course. There are other rules and regulations with which you must become familiar. Be sure, however, to be alert and learn about them early.

NOTES

But beyond these words about rules I promise you as exciting an adventure as you will find anywhere as you come to college. # ACTIVITIES AND ORGANIZATIONS

Going to class and preparing your lessons for the next day is only a part of your college life. Most students participate in one or more extra-curricular activities. There are clubs and organizations, both departmental and honorary, on the campus that meet the demand and the varied interests of the Lindenwood students. You will be sure to find one or more that appeals to you.

# Organizations Open to All Students

ASSOCIATION ON HUMAN RIGHTS accepts the following purpose: through research, education and action to become more fully aware of human rights and to make them prevail at Lindenwood College and in the local, national and international communities.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS CLUB is a nationally affiliated organization which gives students an opportunity to learn about other countries and to express their opinions on world affairs. Conferences on this campus and nearby college campuses provide interesting experience and stimulating discussion.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS is a nationally affiliated organization which puts into practice parliamentary procedure and governmental processes.

YOUNG DEMOCRATS and YOUNG REPUBLICANS are organized for the purpose of developing and encouraging party loyalty.

LINDENWOOD COLLEGE FORENSIC LEAGUE is for the purpose of establishing an interscholastic debate squad in order to promote interest and knowledge of public affairs.

STUDENT CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION is affiliated with the national YWCA. In achieving its purpose, the SCA presents many varied opportunities for active student participation such as buzz sessions, volunteer service, WUS auction and Religion-in-Life Week.

WOMEN'S RECREATION ASSOCIATION is organized to promote good fellowship, sportsmanship, and the development of recreational skills through participation in sports and recreational activities.

#### GENERAL HONOR SOCIETIES

ALPHA LAMBDA DELTA — National scholastic honor society, open to freshmen only. They must have a 3.5 average at the end of the first semester or the first year.

ALPHA SIGMA TAU — Lindenwood Scholastic Honor Society. Undergraduate membership shall be limited to members of the junior and senior classes who are candidates for a bachelor's degree. Election to membership shall normally take place in the second semester of the senior year; members of the junior class with outstanding academic records may be elected in the sixth semester of their college course. Students may be elected also at the end of their college course if the grades of the final semester makes them eligible. Transfer students must complete at least four semesters at Lindenwood in order to become eligible. To be eligible for membership the student's load must average 115 hours per semester exclusive of Physical Education with a cumulative grade point average of 3.5 with no grade lower than a C.

which are chosen in their junior year having completed five-eighths of their college course with a cumulative grade point average of .4 above the all-school average in recognition of outstanding contribution to the college community and high quality personal citizenship and loyalty.

#### DEPARTMENTAL

ALPHA EPSILON RHO — National honor society. Members are selected from the highest ranking students in the radio classes.

ALPHA PSI OMEGA — A national honor society. Open to students enrolled in Speech and Dramatics classes who have fulfilled its requirements. In cooperation with the drama classes the club helps in the presentation of plays during the year. The club presents one play during the year with an all Psi cast.

COLHECON — The Home Economics Club affiliated with the American Home Economics Association. Membership is limited to majors in this field.

ETA SIGMA PHI - National Honor Classics Society

KAPPA OMICRON PHI is a national home economics honorary fraternity open to any student who has completed eight hours of home economics, has a 3.0 average in home economics, and above average grades in other subjects.

MU PHI EPSILON — National honor society. Membership is limited to music majors who are elected on the basis of scholarship, ability, character, and faculty approval.

PHILOSOPHY CLUB meets several times a year to discuss philosophers and philosophical questions. Students usually prepare the papers and lead the discussion. Membership is open to all students who have completed, or are currently enrolled in, one of the courses in the Department of Philosophy.

PI ALPHA DELTA — Local society. The club invites to membership students interested in the Classics, Latin and Greek language, literature, and culture. Membership organized on a pattern based on Roman life. STUDENT ARTIST GUILD — A local honorary club. Upperclassmen planning to major or minor in art and who have a minimum of B in completed art courses and an average of C in other subjects are invited to membership. The purpose of the club is to provide projects and discussions which will further an interest in and an appreciation of art.

STUDENT NATIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATION, Sibley Chapter. The SEA, as its name implies, is composed of all students interested in teaching as a profession. It is a nationally affiliated organization and all members keep in touch with N.E.A. and M.S.T.A. through their publications.

TRIANGLE CLUB — Local society. Membership is limited to science majors and minors with a B average in three science or math courses.

## ACTIVITY CLUBS

BETA CHI is open to those students who pass certain tests showing proficiency in horseback riding.

CHOIR membership is open to all students whose voices qualify after having tried out with the director of the choir.

LINDEN SCROLL — A senior service honorary society, members of KCLC, the campus radio station, is beamed to all buildings on the campus. Any student interested in this field may participate in the programs of the station whether or not she takes courses in the department.

ORCHESIS is a national honorary modern dance club which serves to promote interest in dance as an art form. Members selected by audition present a variety of dance programs during the year.

POETRY SOCIETY is organized to encourage the creation and appreciation of poetry at Lindenwood.

PRESS CLUB includes staff members of the yearbook, the campus newspaper and the radio station.

TERRAPIN membership is given to those who pass a test in swimming skills. Each spring this organization presents a water pageant.

# Board of Student Publications

This Board, composed of faculty and students, determines policy and procedures for the three student publications: The Griffin—a literary magazine, The Bark—the student newspaper, and The Leaves—the student yearbook.

# Student Activity Fund

The Student Activity Fund is created by the \$32 student activity fee which is included in student expenses for the year. It covers admission to the concert-lecture convocations, all-college social events including the social activites of the Resident halls and non-resident group, membership in the Lindenwood College Student Association and in the Student Christian Association, the Christmas Fund and subscription to the LINDEN BARK and the LINDEN LEAVES.

# IMPORTANT LOCATIONS ON CAMPUS

Soon after your arrival at Lindenwood you will want to locate the following places. Each is an important part of the College.

THE BANK—The College Bank is located on the main floor of Roemer Hall, and is open

Students are urged to deposit their money here to insure its safety. Carrying money about or leaving it in your room often-times leads to carelessness and loss. The College stands responsible only for money placed in its care. The bank is for "depostiing," not borrowing. Checks drawn by students on their parents or guardians will not be honored except when written instructions for such privileges from parents or guardians are on file in the Bank.

BOOK STORE—The college Book Store is located next door to the Post Office. Here supplies, books, stationery, sheet music, ink, pencils, greeting cards, pennants, college jewelry, etc. may be obtained. Regulation gym uniforms, leotards, and tank suits to be used in swimming pool may also be purchased here. All students wishing to have garments dry cleaned may leave them at the Book Store.

POST OFFICE—The Post Office is located on the ground floor of Roemer Hall. A lock box is assigned for every student. Each girl assumes responsibility for her own key.

The Post Office is known as Station 3 of the St. Charles Post Office and is conducted under the usual regulations. Packages may be mailed here, stamps bought, etc., as in any Government Post Office. In each dormitory are mail boxes for outgoing mail, which is collected three times daily.

EXPRESS OFFICE—Express packages may be sent from the office of the Supervisor of Plant Operations and Maintenance. His office is on the ground floor of Roemer Hall, and is open from 8:00 in the morning until 5:00 in the afternoon. Packages can be wrapped in the room across the hall.

THE B. KURT STUMBERG HEALTH CENTER—The Health Center is always open to students. Never wait until you are "sick enough to come," but bring your apprehensions and questions before you become ill. The College physician is here at 1:00 p.m. Registered nurses are available at all times.

THE TEA ROOM—The Tea Room, commonly known as the "Tea Hole," is one of the most popular spots on the campus. A variety of short-order meals, as well as fountain service, are available. It is located in Cobbs Hall. The hours for the Tea Room are as follows:

RECREATION ROOMS IN THE DORMITORIES—You will find the recreation room in your dorm on the ground floor. You may use this room any time you wish—for wing parties, for cooking your own dinner, or for entertaining dates.

MARGARET LEGGAT BUTLER LIBRARY—The Library building is east of Roemer Hall. It houses 41,000 books, plus 175 periodicals and newspapers. 43.360 22.5

The loan desk and card catalog index to the book collection are in the lobby. Stacks are open to students, and books are issued for two weeks. A fine of 5c a day is charged on overdue books. Reference books and magazines do not circulate.

Books "reserved" for class use are issued at the loan desk and used in the reading rooms during library hours. They may be withdrawn between 9:00 and 10:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, 3:00 and 4:00 p.m. Saturday, and 4:30 and 5:00 p.m. Sunday. The books are due at 8:00 a.m. the following morning with these exceptions: books taken at 9:00 p.m. Friday are due at 9:00 a.m. Saturday; books taken at 3:00 p.m. Saturday or 4:30 p.m. Sunday may be kept until 8:00 a.m. Monday morning. A fine of 50c for the first hour and 25c for each additional hour is charged for late reserve books. The Library hours are:

LIBRARY CLUB ROOM—The Library Club Room is on the ground floor at the Library, just next to Roemer Hall. It is furnished with attractive and colorful furniture; adjoining the Club Room is a kitchenette with electric range and refrigerator. The Club Room is used extensively by student groups and faculty members.

You will find the Club Room open from eight in the morning until 10:45 in the evening. Students may go there at any time during those hours, unless there is a regular club meeting or some other attractions scheduled there on the weekly calendar. Just off the Club Room you will find the SCA Prayer Room for personal meditation and prayer.

DAY STUDENT'S ROOM—The Day Student's Room is located on the ground floor of Roemer Hall. It is attractively furnished with comfortable chairs. Each girl is provided with a locker for her books and coat.

COBBS LOUNGE—Located on the ground floor of Cobbs Hall is a pleasant place to have a chat with that "special date." If you are a ping pong fan or if you like to listen to the radio or phonograph, stop in. The Tea room is next door.

THE LINDENWOOD COLLEGE CHAPEL—This building is jointly used by Lindenwood College and the St. Charles Presbyterian Church. Lindenwood uses the sanctuary for its chapel and vesper services, as well as for other programs open to the public. The College uses the Nursery for its nursery school and the area devoted to educational activities for students in the field of religious education. College plays are often presented in the round at Fellowship Hall in the church building. The facilities of the building are available for the use of student groups. The building is jointly owned by the College and the church and is located on land adjoining the College and purchased for this purpose.

SWIMMING POOL—The swimming pool is in Butler Hall, near the gymnasium. Those not enrolled in swimming classes may swim during the hours of "open pool."

GREENHOUSE—You will find the Greenhouse in back of Sibley Hall under the water tower. Visit it now and then—it always has something lovely to offer.

ROEMER AUDITORIUM—The auditorium is located on the first floor of Roemer Hall. Freshmen and Sophomores occupy the seats on the main floor; the Juniors and Seniors sit in the balcony.

SIBLEY CHAPEL—The entrance to Sibley Chapel is on the east side of Sibley Hall. Piano, organ, and voice recitals are held there.

STABLE—The stable and riding ring are located in back of Ayres Hall. Visitors are always welcome.

TENNIS COURTS—In back of Butler Hall can be found the tennis courts, hockey field, and archery range. These are for the use of the students at all times.

GOLF COURSE—A six hole golf course is located west of Niccolls Hall. It is kept in condition for use as long as weather permits playing golf.

KCLC—is the Lindenwood radio station at 600 on your dial. Its studio is located on the terrace level of the Fine Arts Building. There is a two-hour broadcast every weekday evening. Through KCLC students may hear KADI-FM, St. Louis, from 6:00 a.m. to 12:00 midnight.
