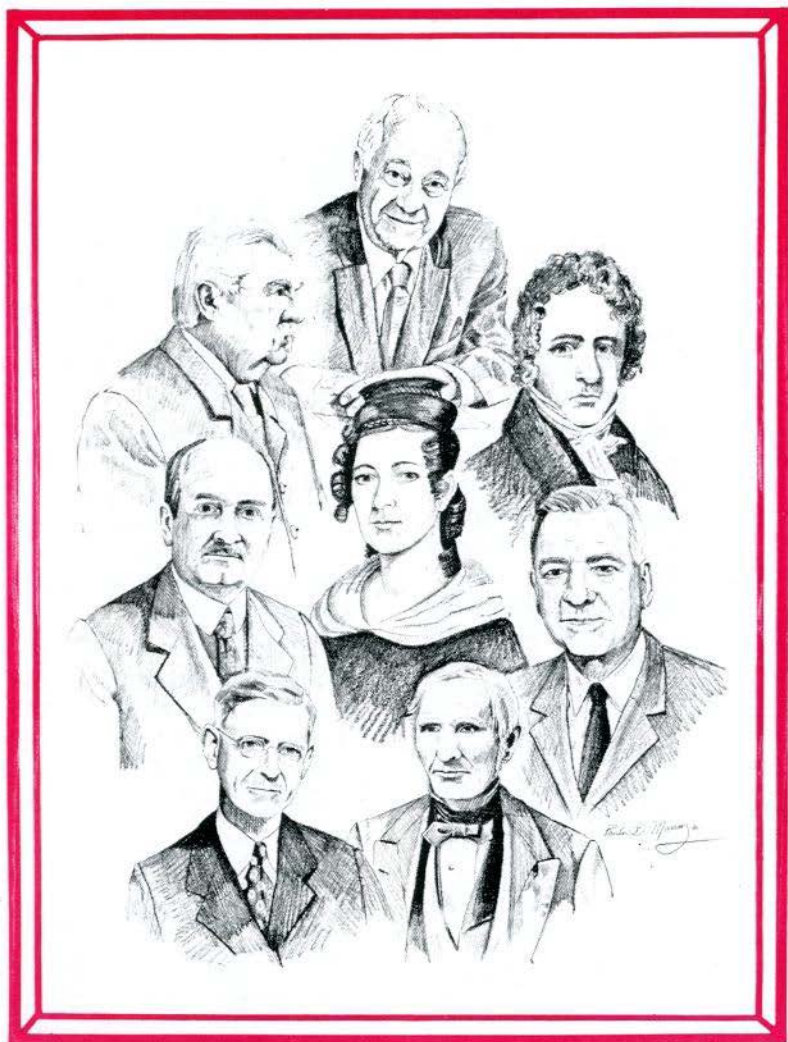

bassadors, for your faithfulness and interest in today's Renaissance - - and for all the years to come.

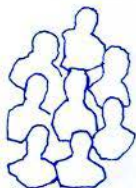

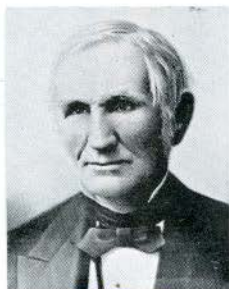

If dreams are what people are made of, then we can respect and appreciate the pioneering investments of the Sibleys. At the youthful age of 27, Mary Easton Sibley, alongside her husband, George, began the dream of Linden Wood. Their desire of establishing a college to instruct young women, an innovation in 1827, was an enduring dream beyond their own years.

Throughout Lindenwood's history there have been other remarkable leaders who followed the Sibley dream as college ambassadors:

- As the first president of the board of directors and the college's original benefactor, Samuel Stuart Watson, laid the cornerstone of Sibley Hall on July 4, 1855.
- The Rev. Samuel Jack Niccolls, D.D., was a major benefactor to the college in the late 1800s and also served as board president. Niccolls Memorial Hall, constructed in the Butler/Roemer years, was dedicated to his outstanding leadership.
- Col. James Gay Butler provided extensive financial and philanthropic support to Lindenwood as president of the college board of trustees.
- In 1914, Dr. John Roemer accepted the Lindenwood presidency, steering the college to greater heights of student enrollments and constructing new facilities for expanded growth.

- Guy Motley, another leader in Lindenwood's history, played the first major role in college admissions as he was requested by Dr. Roemer to recruit new students.
- Lindenwood's fourteenth president, Franc. L. McCluer, was a devoted public servant and a major contributor to the Constitutional Convention of 1943-44. Born in O'Fallon, Missouri, Dr. McCluer's loving guidance insured the well-being of Lindenwood students for nearly two decades.
- Community and civic leader John M. Black was a long-time Lindenwood enthusiast. In 1965, he represented the college as chairman of the board of directors and staunchly supported Lindenwood as a lifetime board member.

In the early 1900s Col. Butler set forth a challenge to Lindenwood's future ambassadors: "I would never tell a youth how to make money. I would tell him how to make himself, for he will need all the reserve of strong character and brain to dispose of his wealth . . ."

The students of Lindenwood have learned and shared this knowledge in their generous support and investments in Lindenwood's traditional values and dreams. To our students and ambassadors, we owe the deepest gratitude of all . . . You have dared to make your dreams live.

The support, dedication and love shown for Lindenwood by Nell Quinlan Reed of Kansas City combined with a lengthy list of civic, cultural and community achievements were reasons she was selected as the 1965 Alumni Merit Award recipient.

A member of the class of 1909, she is the widow of U.S. Sen. James A. Reed (D-MO) who had a lengthy congressional career beginning in 1916. She is among five alumnae who founded the Kansas City Alumni Club in 1911, and has been a faithful and loyal supporter of club activities and the college, including volunteer service on the Lindenwood College Board of Directors, and financial Contributions to establish new courses and aid in scholarship assistance and support for cultural exchange programs with foreign students.

Formerly active in Kansas City cultural arts and educational concerns, she was awarded an honorary degree of doctor of laws from her alma mater in 1949.

Typical of Lindenwood's ambassadors is Patricia P. Bailey. Washington, DC, a member of the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and the college's board of director's.

A 1959 honors alumna, she holds a graduate degree from the American University Law School.

With a career in federal government that spans 26 years, she has served in a number of high-ranking positions in the State Dept. on the presidential campaign staff of Nelson Rockefeller, on former President Gerald Ford's reelection committee and for the U.S. Attorney General in the Justice Dept.

An ambassador who has not lost contact with her alma mater, she received the Alumni Council's Merit Award in 1966 for outstanding service to her chosen profession and to Lindenwood College.

“... By accomplishing the role of governor, I was not just doing it for me. I was opening doors,” says Lindenwood alumna, Martha Layne Collins, governor of Kentucky. Gov. Collins’ quote provides an exceptional parallel to the college’s values for training this nation’s leaders. In addition to her state responsibilities, Mrs. Collins is a 1981 Lindenwood Alumni Merit Award recipient and long-time friend and college ambassador.

She gained national recognition in 1984 when she served as chairwoman of the Democratic National Convention.

Gov. Collins is considered by many to be a top contender for a vice-presidential nomination in the 1988 or 1992 presidential election.

Many of you may remember Anna Harrison, prize-winning scientist and first woman president of the American Chemical Society. Anna has great respect for Lindenwood and is one of our best ambassadors, even though she only attended the college for two years. Why? Because our college professors honestly assessed her intellect as far reaching, and suggested even greater opportunities. Dr. Harrison was the first woman to receive a Ph.D. from the University of Missouri in chemistry. She has never forgotten Lindenwood, the institution that allows its students to grow.

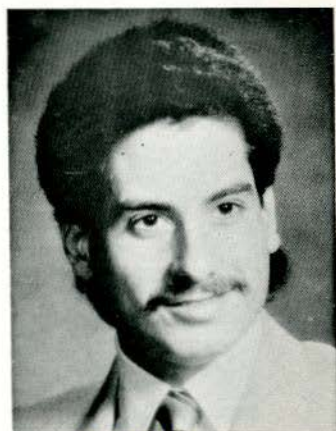
