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NURSING PROGRAM ACCREDITATION NEARS REALITY

The Lindenwood Colleges' baccalaureate program in nursing is expected to receive accreditation by the National League for Nursing (NLN) before the end of the year.

More than a year of organizational planning and development will become a reality within the upcoming months when the programs receives NLN accreditation. Organized in 1952, the New York City-based NLN is the official nursing accreditation body for colleges and universities throughout the country.

"To receive NLN accreditation means that you have achieved a level of excellence," states Elizabeth A. Krekorian, chairman of the Department of Nursing. Not only will accreditation increase enrollment, it will provide greater career opportunities for area nurses. For those who want to continue their studies after receiving a B.S.N. degree at Lindenwood, accreditation will provide a basis for future graduate education. Nurses must receive a B.S.N. degree from an NLN-accredited institution before pursuing a master's degree.

According to Dr. Krekorian, Lindenwood's B.S.N. program is based upon a systems theory and is designed for registered nurse transfer students to continue their education and to develop their competencies at the baccalaureate or professional level of practice. It combines a broad liberal arts education with the scientific and professional knowledge needed for the increasingly complex practice of nursing.

For the past year, Dr. Krekorian and her staff have been assembling a 425-page document which soon will be presented to the NLN prior to an on-site evaluation by the NLN in mid-October. The evaluation of Lindenwood's program will center on the organization and administration of the Department of Nursing; its student body; faculty; curriculum; and resources, facilities and services.

NLN accreditation is expected within 60 days after the accrediting team makes its on-site evaluation, Dr. Krekorian said.

APPOINTED TO CAMPUS SCHOOL STAFF

Kay J. Hoffmeister of St. Charles, a substitute teacher for the St. Charles Public Schools and the Campus School, has been named head teacher and assistant director of the Campus School.

A 1967 graduate of the University of Missouri-Columbia, Mrs. Hoffmeister has a B.S. degree in elementary education with an emphasis on preschool and kindergarten child development. Currently, she is pursuing a Masters in Education degree at Lindenwood.

Prior to her substitute positions at Lindenwood and in St. Charles, she was an elementary teacher at Halls Ferry Elementary School in Florissant; Marshall Elementary School in Tulsa, OK; Woodview Elementary School and the Spring Branch Association for Children with Learning Disabilities, both in Houston, TX; and Barretts Elementary School in Chesterfield.

FALL CONTINUING EDUCATION OFFERINGS

Courses that will explore people's legal rights, clinical nutrition and the nature of psyche are among offerings to be presented this fall on campus by the Office of Continuing Education Services.

"Your Legal Rights" is the title of a course to be presented from 7-9 p.m. on Thursdays, September 9-30. It will provide a basic outline of the actual workings of both criminal and civil procedures, and it will teach participants how to select, hire, negotiate fees with and monitor the performance of an attorney.

Called "a must" for every potential consumer of legal services, the course also will explain the legal remedies for lawyer incompetence, malpractice or actual fraud. It will be taught by Don L. Erickson, president of the Citizens Law Center of Webster Groves, a nonprofit organization dedicated to educating citizens in law and to cutting the costs of legal services. The course fee is \$65.

"The Nature of Psyche - Tools for Modern Living" is the title of a six-week course to be presented from 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays, October 6 through November 11.

"My purpose in teaching this class is to provide an insight into a variety of psychic tools which will give participants a greater perception of theirselves as well as surrounding situations and circumstances," states Victoria Heldenbrand, a marketing specialist for Boise Cascade in Hazelwood and an individual who possesses extra sensory perception (ESP).

The course will provide an insight and a working introduction to the areas of meditation, altered states of consciousness, reaming as it relates to creativity and awakening one's own ESP qualities. It will consist of six one-hour lectures and six one-hour sessions of individual participation or group discussion. The fee is \$95.

"Nutrition - a Practical Approach to Wellness" is the title of a six-week course to be presented from 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays, October 9 through November 10. To be taught by Nancy L. O'Black, a nutritional consultant and a member of the American Council of Applied Clinical Nutrition, the course will cover the full gamut of nutrition and will be styled individually to class participants.

Among subjects to be discussed are biochemistry, food digestion and enzymatic activity, food selection, nutrition and deficiency, nutritional supplementation, foods and sources of nutrients, special diets, food additives, proteins and allied nutritional approaches. The course fee is \$95.

ORIENTATION SET FOR NEW PROGRAM

Beginning this fall, the LCIE will accept resident graduate students into its Valuation Sciences Master's degree program. Resident students will be able to complete a 136-semester-hour master's degree program in a cne year, three trimester period, leading to a career in appraisal. One of only six programs like it in the United States, the program provides advanced education for persons with bachelor degrees who are working in or entering the appraisal profession.

The program offers thorough study of the interdisciplinary principles and methods of appraisal; the study of finance, law and other business electives; the advanced study of investment and valuation; a specialization in one of the appraisal disciplines; an internship under the supervision of a senior appraiser; and a master's degree paper and project.

Persons with a bachelor's degree or studies in the areas of business, real estate, art history or fine arts can enhance their education and qualifications to enter the appraisal profession. The LCIE program permits students to specialize in their choice of an appraisal discipline, such as real estate, personal property and fine arts or business valuation. A full orientation to the LCIE program will be held on the St. Charles campus, August 21 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Young Hall. Full information on admission to the program, its educational format and studies and examples of individual student research projects will be presented. Overnight accommodations also will be available for out-of-town participants.
