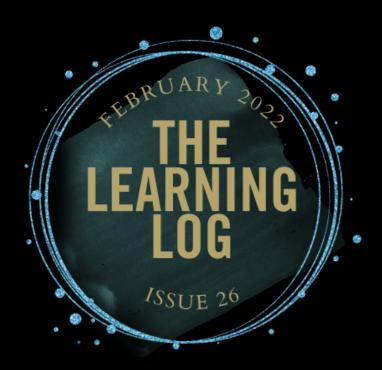

Supporting Student Success by Ana Schnellman

The pillars of RISE all work together to support, retain, and encourage students to get the most possible out of their college journeys; no pillar can work without the others. In my experience, clarity of expectations leads to student success. We can enhance the clarity of our expectations through techniques such as these:

- Scaffolding, formative assessment, and integrated practice;
- · Clear, user-friendly module design;
- Ensuring our assignments have a clear and explicit purpose as well as clear criteria for success, perhaps through use of rubrics:
- Varying the types of assignments to enhance higher-order thinking skills;
- Utilizing LU campus resources such as the Writing Center, Linden Circle, and SASS.

Such small techniques bring big results. When two sections of general education students were surveyed about their perceptions of support, here were some of their responses:

- I love it that the professor knows my name. I feel like a person!
- I know I can reach out for help and an answer will come within a day.
- Professors at LU care about us and our success.

Helping us connect the dots!: Updates from R.I.S.E. Research

The first R.I.S.E. research study, which is helping us connect the dots between faculty development and student learning and test the utility of the R.I.S.E. framework, is going strong. Our wonderful group of faculty researchers are using their classroom as their laboratory by implementing teaching changes to enhance one or more of the R.I.S.E. pillars in their courses. Read below for updates from Drs. Afful, Nasser, Stoelting, and Woltz.

RISE pillars examined: Support, Engagement, Inclusion Impetus for your study: I have learned over the past five years that students in this class may choose not to ask questions, even though they trust the

instructor. I hope adding opportunities for support will enhance both the student comfort level and the quality of projects.

Course: Project in Higher

Education

Research question: How do students perceive the optional help sessions and the "Meeting with Dr. Nasser" assignment? Is there a difference in the quality of research designs?

Procedure: Analysis of responses on a qualitative survey at the end of the course, comparison of course evaluations before and after the change, and comparison of project outlines before and after the change.

Preliminary Results:

Qualitative data suggests the "Meeting with Dr. Nasser" assignment improved the comfort level of students.

RISE pillar examined:

Inclusiveness

Impetus for your study: This purpose of this study was two-fold: 1) to examine if identity salience interventions increase classroom belonging, and 2) to demonstrate that these interventions can be implemented across different disciplines.

Courses: Urban Sociology and Race; Ethnicity and Gender; Ecology and Entomology; Human Sexuality and Social Psychology

Research questions: When controlling for instructor, do we see an increase in trust and belonginess in the classroom when identity is salient?

Procedure: Three faculty in three disciplines implemented identity interventions (e.g., expanded first date introductions, reflections on how students' identities shape the way they interact with course content, identity picharts) approximately once a month in their courses. Each faculty had an "intervention" course and a "control" course. Each course completed a pretest and post-test assessing trust, belongingness, identity salience and general class culture.

Preliminary Results: In Fall of 2021, 139 students completed the pre-test and 115 completed the post-test. We are currently analyzing the data to inform future classroom interventions. We hope to present the data at a teaching conference.

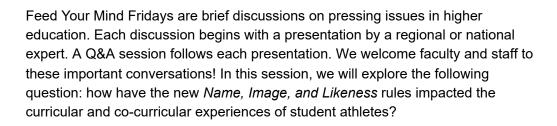
