# VAWA's STOP Program and its Effectiveness


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#### Abstract

The 2004 Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)(1994) is a multifaceted piece of legislation with the overarching goal of reducing intimate partner violence. The Office of Violence Against Women was created within the Department of Justice to facilitate several different grant programs to ensure effective handling of cases of intimate partner violence. This is a proposal to examine the outcomes of one such program, the STOP Program (Services, Training, Officers, & Prosecutors).


# Why We Need the Violence Against Women Act

U.S. women who are victims of domestic violence:

U.S. women who have survived attempted or completed sexual assault:



The rate of sexual assault has decreased by 63% since 1993, VAWA was passed in 1994

### Hypotheses

H<sub>1:</sub> The implementation of STOP programs within a state will dramatically decrease the number of cases of intimate partner violence.

 $H_{0:}$  The implementation of STOP programs within a state will have no significant effect on the number of cases of intimate partner violence.

#### Limitations

- Accurate numbers will be difficult to attain given the unfortunately high rate of non-reporting.
- An important ethical consideration is denial of services to the comparison group, but this group will continue to receive "services as usual" available in their respective communities.
- Intense overview will be required to ensure program recipients effectively implement the program.

## Sample

- Stratified sampling method of (5) counties within two states of similar populations and # of forcible rapes per 100,000: NC & GA
- Ensure representation of entire state population

#### Method

- Implement STOP
   Programs in each of the
   (5) counties in the
   randomly selected state
- Monitor & collect the data after a period of two years (# of forcible rapes per 100,000)
