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TELEVISION TO AIR 'SIBLEYS OF LINDENWOOD'

"The Sibleys of Lindenwood" is the title of a documentary to be aired by First Capitol Cablevision to St. Charles County residents, August 24 and 26, on Channel 22. The 6:30-7 p.m. presentation was written and produced by Florence Barboro of St. Louis, a junior at Lindenwood. It traces the history of the oldest women's college west of the Mississippi and portrays the life of its founder, Mary Easton Sibley.

Mrs. Barboro, who expects to receive a B.A. degree next May, is majoring in communications with an emphasis in mass media. The documentary stems from a class project for a course in script writing for television and the cinema taught by Jean N. Fields, assistant professor. In cooperation with First Capitol Cablevision, her original five-minute script on the Sibleys was lengthened several times and filming was extended to reach the final 30-minute presentation.

Mrs. Barboro spent nine months producing "The Sibleys of Lindenwood." In addition to writing, editing, filming and musical accompaniment, she spent many months researching the Sibleys and the history of the 155-year-old Lindenwood College for Women.

In addition to the August 24 and 26 cable television airings this week, "The Sibleys of Lindenwood" will be shown to visiting alumni during Lindenwood"s annual Alumni Weekend, October 15-17.

PILOT GROUND SCHOOL COURSE SET

Have a friend or neighbor that is interested in becoming a pilot? Have he or she contact the Office of Continuing Educational Services which is sponsoring a course in private pilot ground school instruction, September 14 through November 16, from 7-10 p.m. on Tuesdays.

The course, 36 hours of instruction in a 12-session comprehensive ground school, will provide a background and understanding of flight theory. Instruction will prepare participants for the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) "Private Pilot's Written Examination." The course also will prepare women for "copilot" status if their husbands are pilots.

In a cooperative arrangement with Lindenwood, the St. Charles Flying Service, Inc., will provide one hour of free flight instruction for those completing the course. The course also will cover the principles of flight, air traffic control, meteorology, radio navigation, aircraft operations and specific topics and questions covered on the FAA's written exam for a pilot's license.

The course will include a field trip to the St. Charles Flying Service hangar at the St. Charles Municipal Airport, the use of FAA illustrations and audiovisuals, course attendance by FAA representatives and the possibility of guest appearances by aerospace and airline pilots from the McDonnell-Douglas Corp.

The course will be taught by Walter C. Hanneman, president of American Business Micrographics in St. Charles and a professional pilot for nearly 20 years.

A 1967 graduate of the Lindenwood Colleges, Miss Ludwig holds an M.A. degree from the University of Nebraska in Lincoln, where she majored in adult and continuing education. She has studied at the University of Heidelberg in Gernmany, and she is certified to teach German in grades seven through 12.

Prior to her appointment at the University of North Carolina in 1978, she has served as a curriculum specialist and a graduate assistant at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln; as an intern and instructor at Southeast Community College in Lincoln, NB; as a credit manager for the Nebraska Department of Labor's Administrative Office for Unemployment Insurance; as a junior and senior high school teacher in Nehawka, NB; and as a bindery supervisor at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Love Memorial Library.

According to <u>Variety</u> magazine, "This is a killer-diller-thriller that should keep audiences busily gnawing their fingernails for many months Its situations and incidents are shrewdly colorful, enthrallingly believable at the moment and, at the finale, highly exciting."

"Wait Until Dark" will be directed by Edward T. Herendeen with set design by Mel Dickerson, both of the Department of Performing Arts.

Other productions for the 1982-83 season include Joe Orton's "What the Butler Saw," running October 21 through November 6; Charles Dickens' classic, "A Christmas Carol," running December 3-18; Cole Porter's musical classic, "Kiss Me Kate," running from February 24 through March 12; and, for the final production of the season, Tennessee Williams' "The Glass Menagerie," running April 14-23.

JOHN MOORE SERVICES HELD

Services were held August 17 at the St. Charles Presbyterian Church for John B. Moore, Ph.D., professor emeritus of economics, who died August 13 at the age of 72. A resident of St. Charles, Dr. Moore was chairman of the Department of Economics at the time of his retirement in 1975, having served 25 years on the Lindenwood faculty.

Dr. Moore held an A.B. degree from Westminster College and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Missouri. He was a member of the President's Economic Advisory Council and the Photographic Society of America. He is survived by his widow, Barbara A.; a son, Richard A. of El Paso, TX; and two grandchildren.
