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## Background on Problem

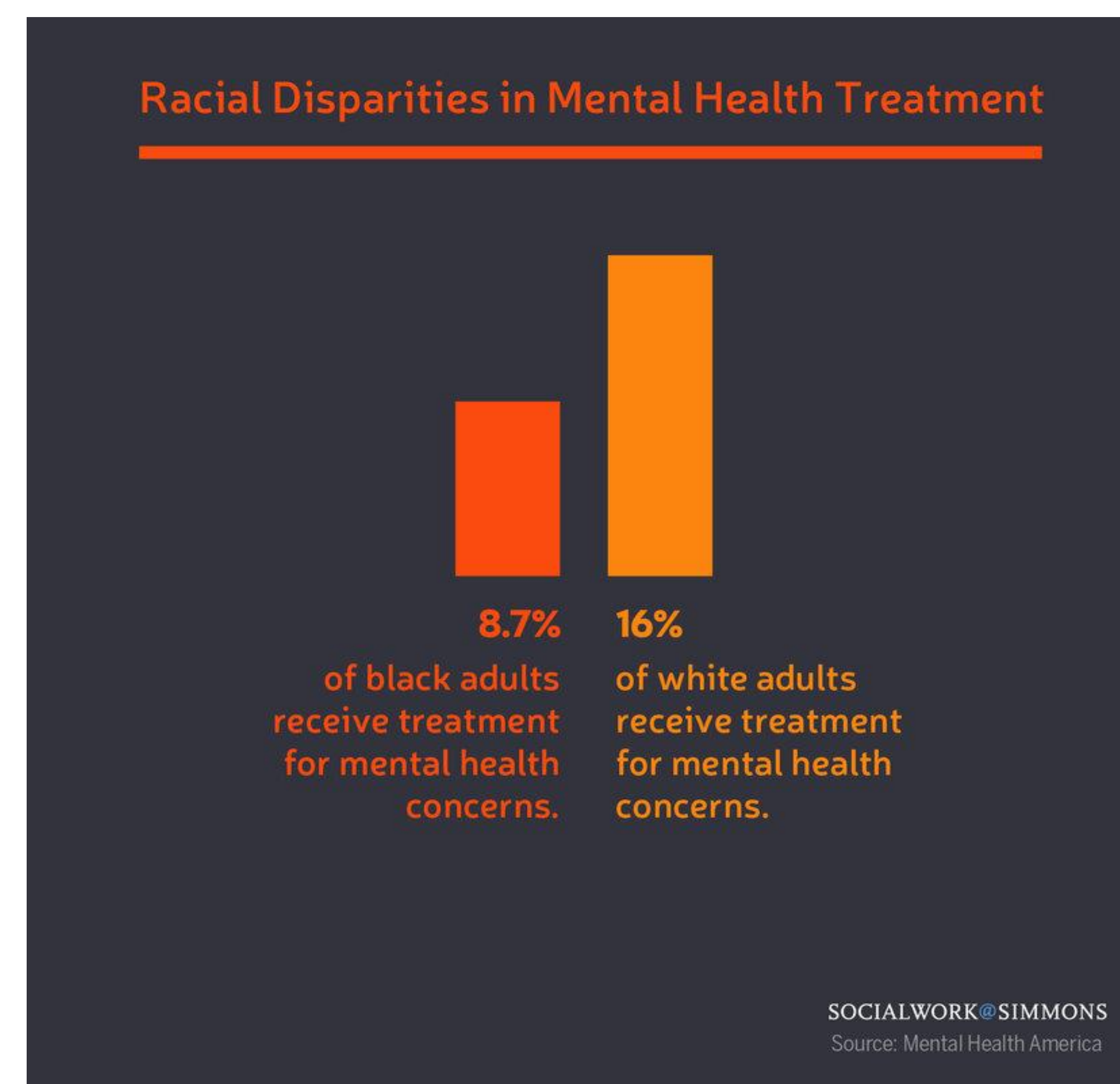
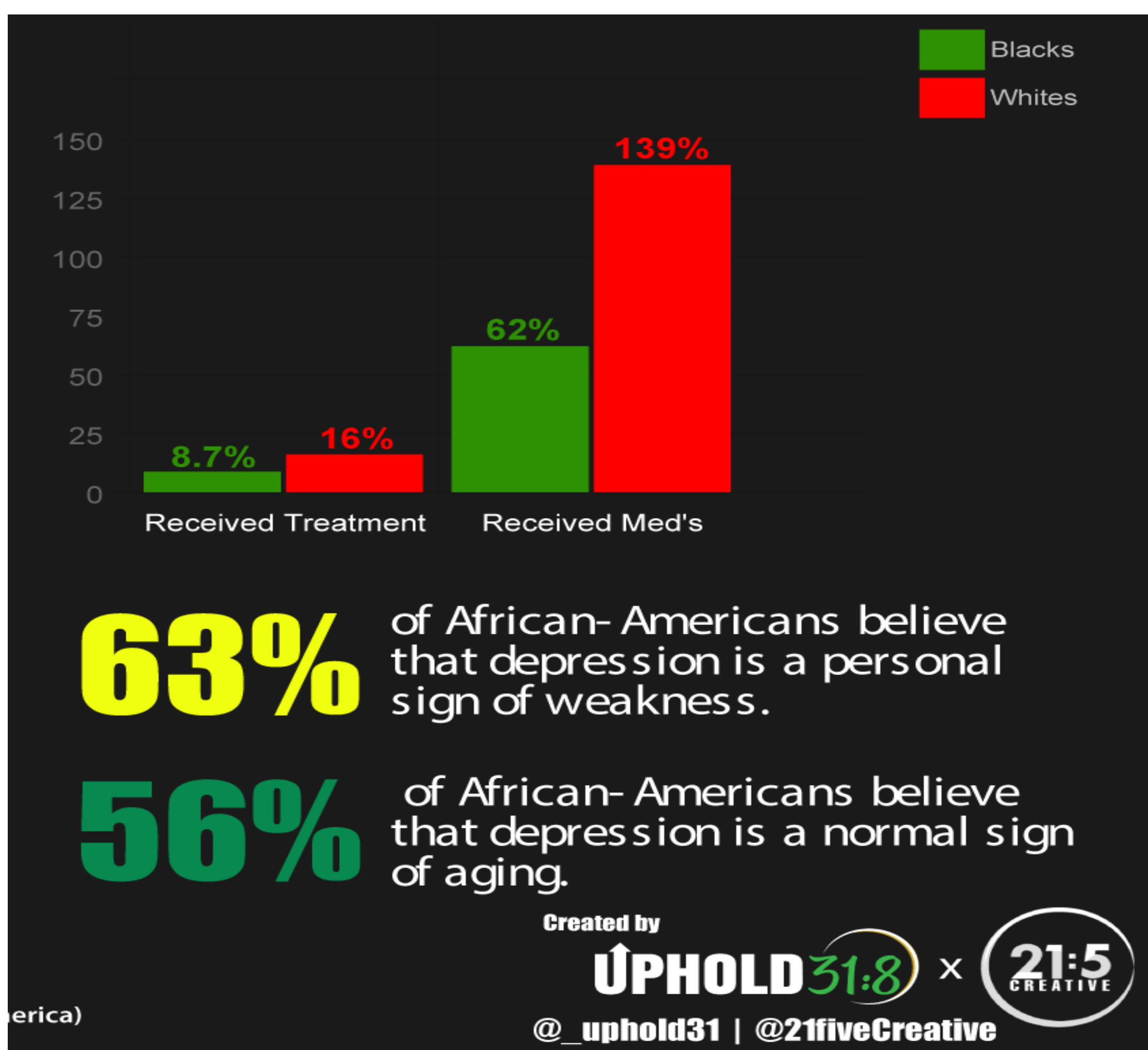
- Stigma surrounding mental health in African American communities is deeply rooted in cultural beliefs, historical trauma, and social pressures.
- Studies show that 25% of Black individuals seek professional mental health treatment, compared to 40% of Caucasians, highlighting a significant treatment gap.
- Despite higher rates of mental health disorders, African Americans are significantly less likely to receive treatment due to stigma, mistrust, and systemic barriers.
- Historical trauma from events like the exploitation of Henerietta Lacks and the Tuskegee Study has compounded this stigma.

## Risk Factors

- Historical trauma due to systemic racism and medical exploitation.
- Cultural stigma that associates mental illness with personal weakness.
- Mistrust of healthcare professionals due to past medical injustices.

## Negative Outcomes

- Social isolation, shame, and avoidance of seeking help.
- Undertreated mental health conditions, exacerbating mental health struggles.
- Chronic physical conditions (diabetes, heart disease) linked to untreated depression.
- Decreased treatment adherence, due to fear of stigma and legal consequences.



## Promising Strategies

- Protest: Raise awareness and challenge mental health stigma and discrimination, driving social change.
- Education: Public awareness, healthcare training, and workplace program can help reduce stigma, promote understanding, and create inclusive, supportive environments for mental health.
- Contact: Personal stories and social interactions help shift attitudes, foster empathy, and reduce the stigma that surrounds mental health.
- Reform: Inclusive laws and policies help remove systemic barriers, ensuring access to support and resources for individuals with mental health conditions.
