Place: The action of the play takes place in a small bar in south Philadelphia. Although the bar is now closed and abandoned, the building still stands on the corner of 50th and Bainbridge Streets. Billie Holiday appeared there in the 1950's.

Time: Late in the evening, March of 1959. It is also late in the life of Billie Holiday. Four months later, she will die of cirrhosis and heart failure in a hospital in Harlem on Friday, July 17, 1959.

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

More often than not, the thought of Billie Holiday brings to mind a difficult and troubled life. I too shared that thought, but with limited knowledge of the vastness of her talents, accomplishments, and contributions of a transcendent legacy of recorded work. Researching "Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill" has provided me with a greater perspective and respect for this complex icon called "Lady Day". A glimpse from the lens of this play by Lani Robertson provides us all with perspectives as to how and why a human being with such an enormous gift can fall prey to such hard times. I had no idea she was among the first to perform at the prestigious Café Society, that she performed at Carnegie Hall, was one of the highest paid performers of her time, and was also an inductee into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. Though she lived a tempestuous and difficult life, her singing expressed an incredible depth of emotion that spoke of hard times and injustice as well as triumph. It has been stated that she was the greatest jazz singer of all times. One of the questions I often asked was, "What made Billie Holiday so special?" In doing research, music buffs state that her bluesy vocal style brought a slow and rough quality to the jazz standards that were often upbeat and light. By slowing the tone with emotive vocals that reset timing and rhythm, she added a new dimension to jazz singing.

Perhaps, these qualities were induced by the plague and ill-effects of racism and sexism which Holiday experienced. From "Strange Fruit", a harrowing song about black lynchings in the South, and "God Bless the Child," a self-penned classic, we are brought into the complex fold of this tough-tender persona. I knew of Billie Holiday from shows I've done in my career and was always fascinated with how she and so many African Americans of her era were able to produce such a level of artistry, when often barred from eating or sleeping in the very same establishments where they were applauded and revered. What message did that send to their sense of self? How conflicting and challenging it must have been to transcend this experience that you are less than.... to a place of deep pure feeling of vocal intensity and performance. It is from that place of perseverance and determination that I continue my own journey of artistry. And in doing so, I am thankful to share this with my friend and colleague Hassie Davis. Gratitude to Dean Marsha Parker and Professor Ted Gregory for giving greater breath to my artistic experience here at Lindenwood as I come to the completion of my MFA.

For "Lady Day at Emerson's Bar and Grill", I envisioned a space where the audience would become patrons of Em's casual and intimate spot....where one could get a glimpse into what it was like to share an intimate late night with "Lady Day". Tim Poertner has brilliantly brought that to life... intimate, casual, and bluesy...upfront and personal. It is my sincere hope that each of us will embrace that place of humanity found in this experience of "Lady Day At Emerson's Bar and Grill", and leave not with judgment, but with an understanding of what it takes to truly say "God Bless the Child that's got his own"!
