THE DEAN'S HOME






Dedicated in the Spring of 1957, the College Chapel is one source of our inspiration at Lindenwood.




VISITING LECTURER

WOMEN'S RECREATION ASSOCIATION










SOPHOMORE ATTENDANTS


FRESHMAN ATTENDANTS
