With sexual aggression on the rise, we as college students need to use extra safety precautions. Every university has a responsibility to its students and every student has a responsibility to his or her self.

According to a volunteer at Webster University's Women's Resource Center, there are some measures you can take to protect yourself against sexual violence. These tips are geared mainly towards date rape, since that is the most common type of aggression the student needs to look out for:

1. Set sexual limits. Before going out on a date, know how far you are willing to go and stick to it. This is a limit you set to yourself, for yourself

2. Trust and act on your feelings. If your gut instinct tells you something is wrong, it probably is. Don't ignore your body's warning signals.

3. Be firm and direct with your sexual messages. Don't say no if you mean yes. Sex is not a game. It's a responsibility. You have the right to say yes and the right to say no. You always have the right to change your mind. Don't be ashamed to say no if that's how you really feel.

4. Be responsible with alcohol. On a first, second, or any 1 to 1 date, you don't need to drink. Alcohol lowers your inhibitions and impairs your judgement. If you do drink, be responsible.

5. Don'tisolate. Stay with the group. If it's a first date, there's nothing wrong with meeting him or her at a public place.6. After the sun sets or in deserted areas, use the buddy system. Do not walk alone, no matter how short the distance.

Self-protection devices such as Mace can be found at several universities, including

Webster and UMSL. Washington University sells a small battery-operated personal alarm that can be attached to a key chain.

If any other type of weapon is desired, make sure that it's legal and that you know how to use it properly. Improper use of a weapon can be used against you.

### **Football**



## Community Work Service Program **Underway For 20 Students**

This semester, a community work service program has been developed as an alternative to the current on-campus work and learn program. The new program gives students an opportunity to work off-campus with volunteer and community service agencies. All junior and senior work and learn students with a satisfactory GPA are eligible, according to Reverend Dr. Michael Mason, college chaplain.

Designed by Mason and President Spellmann, the program is intended to expand the experience of the students.

"This allows students to do things outside their career path, but things they're still interested in," said Mason.

Also, the service program gives Lindenwood an opportunity to work with the community.

"It is a donation to the community. Instead of paying students to work for the college, we pay them to work in the community," said Mason.

Currently, the program involves approximately 20 students. According to Susan Ebbesmeyer, student organizer of the program,

several local service organizations, but not all organizations, had enough, or the right kind, of work available.

"I basically went through the vellow pages and called about 50 organizations on a random basis", said Ebbesmeyer.

Now, students can choose from a list of 14 participating agen-

Some of the agencies involved include The Child Abuse Hotline, Salvation Army, Humane Society, and Barnes Hospital of St. Peters.

"We tried to choose agencies that were in walking distance of the college or a short distance away," said Mason.

During a semester, the new program requires students to replace the 150 hours of regular work and learn hours with 150 hours of the hours of the selected off-campus service. Students are free to arrange scheduling with the agency and report hours to Mason.

The program will continue throughout the year. According to Ebbesmeyer, the program is being considered as a one semester work and learn requirement in the 1993-94 catalogue.

"This summer I received a list of 50 students to call and ask if they would like to work in the program," said Ebbesmeyer. "Those I couldn't reach by phone, we caught during orientation and the first weeks of school."

Selection of agencies was also done on a random basis.

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
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## Attention!
