LU School of Education Selected to Join Consortium for Research-Based and Equitable Assessments

Lindenwood University School of Education was selected to join the Consortium for Research-Based and Equitable Assessments (CREA) in collaboration with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) and St. Louis Public Schools. Dr. Tammy T. Moore (pictured left), Certification Officer and Asst. Director of Assessments, led the effort and recently announced the approval received from the

American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE).

The initiative involves Educator Preparation programs in collaboration with the state and local districts, to examine cut scores for entrance into educator preparation programs to reduce barriers.

Professional and Continuing Education at Lindenwood University, or PACE, supports the University's commitment to assisting educators and school counselors. PACE extends the learning environment beyond the classroom in collaboration with select educational agencies and recognized educational consultants. Professional development courses are designed to enhance teacher effectiveness in the classroom and improve student performance. Educators and counselors can use these credits to meet state recertification requirements or earn credit toward a master's degree.

Dr. Panagos and Research Team Begin Field Testing the DIY Family Planner App

Families now have the opportunity to field test the DIY Family Planner Android and iPhone Apps. This is the first time the Apps are available for field testing. Engineered, tested, and supported by Lindenwood computer science class teams and senior student employment, the Family Planner mobile apps evolve from a paper tool that was field tested in a three-year Pilot Study. For the first time, the PRIDE Grant engages marketing students in a class project to move the Family Planner from ideation to a marketing plan. The research team joins the families on their home visits while the Missouri First Steps Providers "play" with their young child to lead Early Intervention services. For example, a family sets up an iPad for the research team to observe the home visit and communicate with the family. The Research Team collects and records data on the family's utility and the reliability and validity of the Family Planner App, along with Pre-Post gains in family empowerment.

Ultimately, the goal is to place the first DIY Family Planner Tool and Mobile Apps freely in the hands of families and individuals impacted by autism and developmental delays. Further research and application of the Family Planner Mobile Apps in K-12 education, behavioral therapies, and healthcare fields, such as My Chart integration, could lend the potential for its use in new fields.

To assist with the major aim of the research study, Dr. Kyle Coble leads a marketing team from his class to develop a marketing plan for the DIY Family Planner Android and iPhone Apps. Dr. Coble stated, "This marketing team will work on providing a groundwork marketing plan for the app, with attention paid to segmentation and recruitment strategies, as well as providing recommendations for the B2B/B2G transfer of control that will enable the app to live in the world."

Lindenwood University and Dr. Panagos hold Intellectual Property related to the mobile app. The intention is to share the mobile app with a third party capable of maintaining and delivering the app for future users. Any future agreement with a third party will require that the app be freely available to users. Any fees or revenues generated in this transfer of the Intellectual Property will only be used to offset costs incurred by Lindenwood University for support of the research and development process.

Lindenwood Prepares Teachers for Success

Below is the article "Lindenwood Prepares Teachers for Success" by Hazel Denother.

As a nation, our supply of qualified teachers is dwindling. The education industry suffers from high attrition rates and low enrollment in teacher preparation programs: teacher education enrollment dropped by 35% between 2009 and 2014, and the number of people studying to become teachers continues to diminish. Now more than ever, it is important to have qualified, passionate professionals entering the field.

Lindenwood is committed to preparing successful future teachers ready to take on the workforce. Sara Schomburg is a recent example. She studied Spanish and Education at the university while raising two young children at home, and she graduated in May of 2019. She received multiple full-time and part-time teaching job offers immediately upon graduation, and she currently works as an elementary Spanish teacher at Mallinckrodt Academy of Gifted Instruction in Saint Louis. Schomburg states that she was inspired to study Spanish because



of the native speakers she befriended at her first job in high school. Through that experience, she gained a greater admiration for the language. She states, "There's not much that I don't like about Spanish. The music, history, and culture are areas that I've always enjoyed learning and teaching about. Of course I also love speaking the language so that I can meet and help new people, as well as gain a broader perspective on life."

Teachers are incredibly important, and their work in the classroom impacts the future of our society. Schomburg aims to help students grow into the best versions of themselves: "It feels phenomenal to help the kids become confident, helpful, positive people who will cause that rippling effect in society. This is why teachers are so important, because not every student gets all of that at home. We aren't just teachers for our students: we are also counselors, nurses, custodians, coaches, moms, and everything in between for these kids. The positive effect that teachers have on society is incalculable."

Schomburg is grateful for the guidance and support she received from the faculty at Lindenwood. Going to school while raising children is no easy task, and she credits two of her favorite professors, Dr. Romero-Ghiretti and Dr. Nuñez-Betelu (Spanish professors in the School of Humanities), for her success: "Since I had 2 children of my own, attending and keeping up with classes was a bit more of a struggle for me compared to students with a traditional academic career. These professors have both been a tremendous support in helping me overcome obstacles created by my having children while in school." Schomburg adds that their Spanish instruction also helped give her a deeper appreciation for the history and cultures of Spanish-speaking countries.

Her education instructors made sure she had the tools she needed for teaching success through highly relevant coursework. She explains, "I love the fact that all of the education professors are up-to-date and active in the education community, and they really only give you assignments or projects that directly correlate to the real-world experience of teaching." Schomburg feels that all of her education professors made her confident and prepared for her teaching career, and she is especially grateful for the help of Dr. Amanda Aldridge (School of Education) and her mentor, student teacher supervisor Lynne Chrismer.

Good teachers like Sara Schomburg are essential and help make the community a better place. Lindenwood University helps aspiring teachers hone their skills and become the very best professionals they can be. Through innovative instruction, the university strives to fill the world with kind, passionate, highly-qualified educators.

Participants indicated interest in following The Family Planner Mobile Apps research study and its subsequent availability for families. Drs. Cypret-Mahach and Hutcheson Present at MACTE Conference

Dr. Ronda Cypret-Mahach and Dr. Jill Hutcheson were selected to present their research findings at the 2021 Spring MACTE (Missouri Association of Colleges of Teacher Education) conference. The theme of the conference, A Culture of Resilience, provided an opportunity for the two School of Education (SOE) faculty members to discuss their COVID-19 research data collected from parents, teachers, and administrators using a Qualtrics survey initiated in June 2020. The survey, Leading and Learning Through a Crisis – COVID 19, designed to gather data from the larger education community during the transition from classroom teaching to online teaching, was the focal point of the survey, along with Lindenwood School of Education's response to the experience. The findings resulted in several initiatives within the SOE itself designed to prepare students for similar events in the future, assist practicing teachers with online teaching, and improving the current practices within the SOE.

The pair reported out on their findings by focusing on survey data and correlated them with SOE-related initiatives. The data revealed, not surprisingly, that teachers and parents were not ready for an abrupt move to online teaching. Educators' responses focused on a lack of resources, training, and experience to make such a shift. Parents reported being overwhelmed by assisting their children or grandchildren with online educational tasks while working full-time. Parents, teachers, and administrators agreed the transition was not easy. They claimed it was chaotic, and unorganized. Not unexpected to educators was the social emotional toll the shift to online experience had on children.

The presentation titled, "Resilience: How an SOE Reimagined and Evolved During a Pandemic," featured a discussion of how Lindenwood University and the School of Education quickly met the needs of our students through innovative ideas, which now have become part of an even better and more efficient School of Education. The response was both innovative and transformative in meeting the needs of our students, faculty, and programs. Some examples include the creation of a virtual library of videos to replace and augment on-site practicum placements, the expanded use of technology tools such as Padlet and Google Classroom, along with pre-recorded instructional videos. The faculty has evolved with more competency and growth in technology, in fact, the majority of the School of Education faculty participated in online learning opportunities sponsored by the Learning Academy and Lindenwood Online. Faculty embraced the opportunity to learn more about technology and earned certificates from the following organizations, to name just a few: Quality Matters, Project Management Institute, Duke University, IDEO, and National Inclusive Excellence Leadership Academy.

The survey data made the researchers acutely aware, but not surprised, by difficulties teachers, leaders, parents, and learners experienced during the pandemic. Some of these difficulties include; the lack of training for teachers as they transitioned to online teaching, social-emotional concerns experienced by children and young adults due to lack of contact with their friends and companions, and feelings of loneliness and the need for contact with their classmates. The key outcome for the SOE is how the personal reactions to our survey fueled faculty to reimagine and evolve resulting in the creation of a week-long boot camp to assist teachers with the basics of teaching online. The SOE now has a new degree program the MA in Design and Implementing K-12 e-Learning and an associated 18-hour degree certificate. The needs of young people in our area schools echoed so loudly that arrangements are now in place for Dr. Bryan Pearlman to present a free presentation of Social Emotional Learning to faculty, staff, and parents in the near future.

Lindenwood Learning Academy session on Using Podcasts in the Classroom.


