TELEVISION COVERAGE PROMPTS PHONE CALLS

Barbara Ludwig's telephone in the Leisure Learning Office began ringing moments after the conclusion of KSDK-TV's "Midday A.M." program on September 21. The halfhour television show featured an interview by host Clif St. James with Jean Walters, an instructor for the Leisure Learning course, "Becoming a Winner - the Best You Can Be," which begins tomorrow night on campus.

The Channel 5 interview informed viewers about the six-week Lindenwood course and provided background information on Ms. Walters, a private counselor and business consultant who specializes in human development training for leading businesses and professional organizations throughout the area.

More than a dozen telephone inquiries were received following the television broadcast. Offered on Tuesday evenings until November 9, the noncredit course is designed to help participants help themselves, focusing in the areas of communications, building self-esteem and motivation. It is one of nearly 30 continuing educational courses and workshops being presented this fall in St. Charles and Lake St. Louis by the Lindenwood Colleges.

ST. LOUIS BRASS QUINTET TO PERFORM

The St. Louis Brass Quintet will perform in concert October 17 as part of Lindenwood's Sunday Concert Series. Sponsored by the colleges' Lectures & Concerts Committee, the two-hour concert will begin at 7 p.m. in the main reading room of Butler Library. It is open to the public free-of-charge.

The second in a series of Sunday performances, the concert is funded in part by the Missouri Arts Council and the Musicians Association of St. Louis.

Inspired by the rebirth of chamber music for brass, the St. Louis Brass Quintet was formed in 1964. Since then, it has played concerts for audiences of all ages at public performances, colleges, universities and community groups across the country.

The quintet will bring to Butler Library the vital energy of brass music. It will perform, on a high artistic level, the music of major composers from the Renaissance and Baroque to the 20th century.

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A highlight of the October 17 concert will be a demonstration of how each of the instruments - trumpets, French Horn, bass trombone and tuba - work, including a lighthearted presentation that will feature solo performances by quintet members.

The remaining performance in the Sunday Concert Series will be November 21 when Djimo Kouyate, a player of the kora, presents a concert at 3 p.m. in the Butler Library. The kora is a 21-string harp instrument of West African origin.

GRANT AWARDED FOR ENVIRONMENTAL SERIES

"Environment - the Central Issue of Our Time" is the title of a presentation to be given October 13 on campus by Thomas F. Williams, a consultant with the Office of Public Awareness, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), in Washington, DC.

The address, scheduled at 8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Building Auditorium, is the first of four presentations partially funded by a grant from the Sperry & Hutchinson (S&H) Foundation. The series, called "Environmental Issues of the '80s," will feature a keynote address November 11 by Edward H. Ziegler, associate professor of environmental law at the University of Dayton, entitled "Environmental Regulations of the 1980s -Costs and Benefits." The remaining two presentations in the four-part series will be scheduled during the second semester.

With more than 23 years of experience in environmental education, Williams has created and managed a series of pioneering, innovative and successful citizen education programs dedicated to the mission of making responsible public policy on environmental issues.

As early as 1958, he had the vision to see that air pollution was far more than a technical problem but was a public education problem as well; as a result, he created an education program leading to a sound and coherent public posture with regard to air pollution.

In 1968, he became director of the Office of Public Information & Education, Consumer Protection & Environmental Health Service, where he was responsible for a national program espousing the ecological view of environmental issues. In 1970, shortly after the formation of the EPA, Williams joined the Office of Solid Waste Management where he was responsible for public education and changing public attitudes toward solid waste management and resource recovery.

In 1977, he became deputy director of the EPA's Office of Public Awareness and established public education and citizen participation as an integral function of every program area of the EPA. The brother of Delores J. Williams of the Political Science Department, he retired from the EPA in 1980 and has served as a consultant since.

Following Williams' presentation on October 13, which is open to the public freeof-charge, there will be a question-and-answer period with the audience.

1982 COLLEGE FAIR SET FOR CHECKERDOME

Counselor Marilyn Morris of the Admissions Office will be representing Lindenwood at the 1982 College Fair, an annual event scheduled October 10-11 at the Checkerdome in St. Louis cosponsored by the National Association of College Admissions Counselors (NACAC) and the Missouri Association of College Admissions Counselors (MOACAC).

Lindenwood will join more than 150 other colleges and institutions of higher learning during the two-day event to provide information to prospective students and parents. Nursing schools, career institutions and educational branches of the military also will be represented as well as officials of the College Board and the American College Testing Program.

Admissions and financial aid counselors will be on hand to assist students with career information, to discuss options for those students undecided about college majors, to explore available avenues of financial assistance programs and scholarship grants and to provide general resource information helpful in the college selection and decisionmaking process.

Last year, more than 8,000 students and parents attended the St. Louis event. Times of the event are from 1-6 p.m. on Sunday and from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. on Monday. Admission and parking for the 1982 College Fair are free.

The NACAC is a nonprofit organization of high school counselors and college admissions officers from throughout the United States who work together to provide students and their families with useful information regarding college selection and admission requirements. The state association, MOACAC, strives to achieve these same goals throughout Missouri.

PSYCHOLOGY INTEREST GROUP FORMED

Lindenwood's Psychology Interest Group, referred to as PIG for short, has been formed to increase student awareness and understanding. The purpose of the group is to facilitate student interest and involvement in psychology as a science.
