DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Written in 1980 by Jim Leonard Jr. about farmers in a small Indiana town during the beginnings of the Great Depression, The Diviners captures the struggle of the common man in an increasingly shrinking, complex and technologically driven world. It examines the themes of spirituality and religion versus pragmatic secularism. Romantic notions of natural man in harmony with the cycles of nature are set against the raging economic outer world and the coming technologically dominated age where automobiles, airplanes, tractors, world markets and eventually war, drive humanity toward a moment of decision, the ramifications of which we continue to feel in our present time.

The Diviners is a play that explores man's relation to the elements, rhythms and voices of nature. It is in essence a myth about lives of the people of a fictitious town, Zion, touched by a Shaman like character in the guise of an "idiot boy". Like all Shamans the boy acts as a medium between the human and the natural, spiritual and divine, but is, as reoccurs in the myths and literature of the world, of neither place. Personifying man's struggle between the material and spiritual worlds, he is caught in a haunted limbo, awaiting the time when he is made whole again.

Water plays an important role in this story, almost taking on a persona, becoming another character on the stage. Water washes and cleanses. Both Eastern and Western Religions look to water to purify the soul. Rivers symbolize a roadway, a bridge between the living realm and the spiritual, and Buddy is of that middle world, the river is the final road that he will eventually take. He was born of the water and must return to it to complete the cycle.

Water in our world mythology, takes on many symbolic themes, it cleanses and revives, it is synonymous with the Great Mother and the waters of life and the womb. It is the primordial element. When scientists and astrologers look to other planets in the Universe, they search for the signs or potentiality of water, with out it there can be no chance for life. However, water is also the cause of great destruction and death. The Great Flood of the Old Testament, Tsunami and hurricanes of recent years, stand as powerful reminders of the overwhelming and unforgiving potential of this paradoxical element. It is both the beginning and the end and as such, it holds a powerful, archetypal significance and meaning for us. It is the prime example of Nature's ability to both nurture and destroy. Man has struggled to live in harmony with water for centuries. The first civilizations settled their tribes around on the rivers and lakes of the Fertile Crescent. Man has and continues to both harness and control water's might to varying degrees of success and failure. Growing up around the awe-inspiring Niagara River, I have always been aware of the dual nature of water as a giver and taker of life.

Because the themes of this story are universal, we have incorporated various conventions of world theatre to help us tell it. Conventions and symbols from the theatres of the East, specifically China, Japan and to some extent India, are blended with Western Realism to offer what we hope is a harmonious mix meant to serve the simple beauty, the ebb and flow of the play and its characters. Although the themes of this story are universal, it is in its dressing, an American story about a simple and pragmatic people. A people of the land that are being swept up in events beyond their control or understanding, they cling tightly to one another because their companionship and unity are all they have to weather the trials of their lives.


