Older adults, working students or persons interested in returning to college are invited to become members of the Continuing & Returning Education Students (CARES), a group formed to meet the special needs of Lindenwood students 25 years of age and older.

According to Marigay Sheble, a Lindenwood junior and vice-president of CARES, the group was organized five years ago to appeal to students enrolled in the Evening College and the LCIE as well as to daytime students. CARES formerly was known as the Lindenwood Continuing Education Club.

Meeting twice monthly, CARES offers information, discussions and speaker presentations on a variety of subjects and interests for older students. "These can range from steps to be taken by working adults planning upon returning to college to coordinating time for college studies and raising children," Ms. Sheble said.

All health histories and assessments will be completed in private and will be supervised by faculty members of the Nursing Department. Professional R.N.s currently enrolled in the department's "Holistic Health Assessment" course will provide the free assessments.

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SECOND ENVIRONMENTAL LECTURE SET

"Environmental Regulations of the 1980s - Costs and Benefits" is the title of a presentation to be given November 11 by Edward H. Ziegler, associate professor of environmental law at the University of Dayton.
