WRITING WORKSHOP SCHEDULED FOR TEACHERS

Jacque Wuertenberg of St. Louis, a nationally-known educational and language arts consultant, will conduct a one-day workshop, "Helping Children Write," November 30 at Young Hall. Designed for elementary teachers, the workshop will focus on developing techniques from basic composition to creative writing for children in grades K-8. The session will provide the ideas, methods and materials for teachers "to take home and implement in their classrooms."

Sponsored by Lindenwood's Education Department, the workshop will present specific strategies to personalize school curriculums through writing experiences. Included will be actual writing models for children to perceive themselves as active language users and producers, children's writing samples, idea books as catalysts for writing and pattern books as a basis for instant writings specifically designed for youngsters. The one-day workshop also will provide various opportunities to improve writing fundamentals in the classroom by teaching writing as a total classroom process and by using it as a technique for illustrating, editing and publishing.

Well-known throughout the United States and Canada, Ms. Wuertenberg is a former professor at the College of Idaho in Caldwell, ID, and Oakland University in Rochester, MI. Honored as one of the "Outstanding Young Women of America" in 1969, she has taught at all grade levels in countries from West Africa to Asia as well as the United States.

The registration fee is \$45 in advance and \$50 the day of the workshop, and it includes workshop materials and lunch. For further information and registration procedures on "Helping Children Write," contact the Education Department at extension #356 or #359.

'IN FOCUS' TO AIR NOVEMBER 29 ON KCLC-FM

Area service organizations, community groups, volunteer agencies and health care associations will be explored when KCLC-FM premieres a new series, "In Focus," beginning November 29. To be aired Monday through Friday during the 5 p.m. news broadcast, the series will feature interviews with representatives of various agencies and groups who will explain the role the organization plays within the community.

"Most residents are familiar with the operation of local chapters of such groups as the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society because their roles are self-explanatory," states Emil Wilde, KCLC station manager. "We not only are going to discuss these organizations but others that are not as widely known for their community efforts. The entire purpose of 'In Focus' is to provide information about these groups and to explain that they are in existence to help people if the need arises," he said.

The first subject to be explored will be cardiovascular disease and prevention, November 29 through December 3, featuring representatives of the St. Louis Heart Association. Others to be interviewed in upcoming weeks include the American Cancer Society; Gleaners, a newly-formed St. Charles County agency that provides food to the needy; Fish Emergency Help, Inc., a St. Charles-based volunteer organization that provides emergency food, clothing and shelter; and Echo, Inc., an areawide child abuse organization.
