Fire at Lucky's Leads to Campus Blackout

A St. Charles landmark died Wednesday evening, February 5. Lucky's Liquor & Sporting Goods was destroyed

According to Mark Ehele, information officer for the St. Charles fire department, a call came in at 10:30 reporting smoke coming out of the west end of the building housing Lucky's and The Com-

puter and Copier Store.

Unit 9420 of the city's fire department was dispatched. They responded and then called for additional units. St. Charles County, Pattonville, and Cottelville fire departments responded.

In all, 12 vehicles and 50 firefighters were needed to battle the blaze. Fighting the fire was complicated by the fact that high voltage wires had to be shut down, causing a blackout on campus for about an hour. Another problem the firemen ran into was that Lucky's also contained live rounds of ammunition, some of which went off. No people were injured.

The fire was brought under control within an hour. However, they could not stop the fire from spreading to the adjacent computer store. Eventually, both stores were engulfed in flames.

The fire was put out at 2:00 a.m.Thursday morning. Damage to both stores and the structure was estimated at 500,000 dollars.

Thursday, February 6, the fire was being investigated by the state fire marshal and investigators from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms. As of that time, there was no report from either agency on the exact nature of the blaze.

During the fire a crowd, estimated at 200 by local police, gathered to watch the fire. Police also shut down all four lanes of traffic on First Capitol Drive due to the fire

One fire fighter was injured. Gary Bird, 28, was taken to St. Joseph's Health Center in St. Charles and was being treated for a strained back.

Lucky's has been a mainstay for the community and Lindenwood for thirtythree years. It did more than serve the needs of people--it was also a gathering place of sorts for local hunters. During any season, you could walk into Lucky's and strike up a conversation with the group of colorful characters gathered there.

The owner of Lucky's, Tom McKinzie, presided over the group of men gathered there. He was always quick with a new joke or advice concerning weapons or bourbon.

McKinzie said he was shocked by the fire since he had just locked up the store shortly before the fire was reported. He also said that he would be all right if his insurance held up.

As far as this reporter is concerned, I wish McKinzie the best for the future and hope he can restore Lucky's to what it once was--a hub of sporting lore and friend to the students of Lindenwood College.

DriskillNamed New Football Coach

The Lindenwood football team has gone through its first coaching change.

Jeff Driskill was announced as the team's second head coach. The announcement came January 20 and surprised very few among Lindenwood brass. After former coach Dave Schroeder stepped down to pursue other coaching ventures, Driskill was the immediate choice.

Driskill had been the Lions offensive line coach since the inception of the program at Lindenwood. He also worked as recruiting coordinator and as football sports information director. Driskill also was a player and coach for five years for a St. Louis semi-pro team called the Riverboat Gamblers.

Driskill does not plan to change the team's offensive philosophy to a great degree. He said that they will stick to a run based attack. He did say, however, that they would throw a little bit more than last season. They may have to throw a bit more than planned. That's because star tailback Adam Saperstein is toying with plans of a transfer to a NCAA Division I school.

Driskill plans to bring two new assistants for next season, one on each side of the ball. The defensive side has already been taken care of; that spot will be filled by Keith Newcombe. Newcombe was the defensive coordinator at Langston University (Oklahoma) last season. The Langston defense was in the top ten in both rushing and total defense. The coach on the offensive side has yet to be determined.

Possibly the biggest benefit for the team in having Driskill as its head coach is that he is the one who recruited them. "At one point, these guys were all recruited by me." Driskill said, "It was the best decision that could have been made because of consistency."

It is logical to think that the person who recruited the players on this team had an impact on the student's decision to come to Lindenwood. That impact probably was based on respect or admiration, something that can be built on.

Lindenwood has yet to land any recruits for next season because the signing period for major colleges just passed. Driskill does plan to meet with some ath-


Dear Lindey
