Interim-Minded Students Plan for Program Abroad

72 students have shown an interest in the January term abroad program that will begin next year. 29 of these girls indicated interest in visiting more than one country. The Renaissance-study trip to Florence, Italy, is the most affirmed, with 19 girls voicing interest. Travel to Mexico is the first choice of 15 students, whereas six chose London, and three seek travel to far-off Athens.

Rabbi Katzenstein to Speak Sunday

Rabbi Martin E. Katzenstein, Sr. Rabbi of Temple Israel, St. Louis, will speak at Vespers, Sunday. His topic is "Obedience is Sacrifice." His appearance Sunday will be his last visit to Lindenwood before his move to Harvard College, Lexington, Mass., in June. A reception and informal discussion will follow the service.

Before these countries can be included, several problems must be worked out with hotels for reasonable living accommodations. Then, classroom space must be made available for special lecturers to give presentations. Also, those studying abroad must work out a project that can be done in one month at the spot she has chosen as her study base.

If there are at least 15 girls going to Europe, it will be possible to get a substantial reduction for round trip travel expenses on Icelandic Airlines, which will cut down a large amount of the expense for the trips.

These 72 girls met with Miss Lichliter on Monday, April 17, at 7:30 p.m. to discuss plans for the program.

Faculty Increased for coming Year

"I'm not going to fight like fury to keep the teacher student ratio here at 1 to 10. It is more important, but not exactly crucial. As Robert Sprowls, chancellor of the University of California, has said, 'I'd rather have a student be within 200 feet of a great professor than on the lap of a mediocre one,'" stated President John A. Brown in an interview given last summer. The Lindenwood curriculum will be freshened by the addition of several new faculty members next fall.

Mrs. Jack Carpenter, who received degrees from Washington University, will be Assistant Professor in Psychology. She has worked in public relations with KMOX-CBS Radio, and the Washington University Medical School.

Also in the Psychology Department will be Miss Clemence Feagan, who is currently a University Fellow at Washington University. Research with the deaf has constituted much of her past experience.

An addition to the History Department is Stanley Caine, specializing in American History. He graduated Magna Cum Laude from Macalester College, and was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow at the University of Wisconsin. Mr. Caine has special skill in tennis; he is currently registered as a professional.

A Wellesley College scholar, Mrs. Charles H. Merideth will instruct classes in Medieval History. She is also working on her Ph.D. at the University of Chicago.

Of interest to English majors is Mr. Harry Minetree, who will direct creative writing courses. He is a graduate of Vanderbilt University, and the University of Iowa.

Mrs. Boyd Morros, with degrees from Washington University—Cum

Laude in French—will enter the Modern Language Department next year. Also entering will be Assistant Professor Miss Margaret McClear. She graduated from Nazareth College, and the University of Notre Dame. Miss McClear has held a Fulbright Research Grant to Guatemala, and she is now working on a Ph.D. at St. Louis University.

A graduate of Vassar and Middlebury Colleges, Mrs. Robert Mudd will join the Modern Language Department next year to instruct in German. She has done graduate work at the University of Minnesota, and currently is at Washington University.

Mrs. Hugh K. Nisbet will instruct in the Classical Language Department. She graduated from St. Louis University and was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow there.

Miss Kristi Slayman, a graduate of Lindenwood College in English and Art, has been added as an instructor in the Art Department. She received an M.A. in History of Art and Aesthetics from Western Reserve University and has traveled extensively.

A part-time Director of Choral Music has joined the staff. Mr. Frankln E. Perkins received a B.A. from Juniata College, and Master of Sacred Music from Union Theological Seminary. He is presently at Ladue Chapel in St. Louis.

Mrs. John Little has been added as a lecturer (part-time) in the Political Science Department, and Miss Florentine Roman has joined the Sociology Department as Assistant Professor (visiting). Also, Mrs. Delores Roman will assume duties as Assistant Professor in Economics.

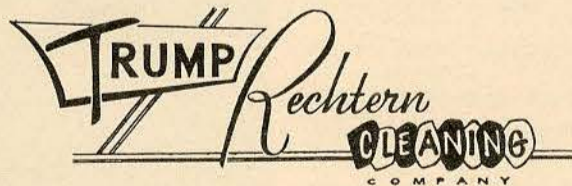

Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Berg find new home at LC

"Those who maintain the idea that education ends upon receiving a degree are just not living in the twentieth century," states Mrs. John A. Brown. Mrs. B. Richard Berg, wife of the Vice-President for Public Affairs, declared, "College is not the real world. It prepares you to take a position in whatever the real world is—as a housewife, in the peace corps, or in a profession."

Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Berg find themselves in a new environment on the campus. They are not the kind of women who isolate themselves from the community. Mrs. Brown works with the Red Cross in St. Charles, and studies the colonial period in American History as a hobby.

Mrs. Berg, who arrived March 1, plans to work with the Student Ecumenical Association, the tutorial program and the committee planning Vesper Services. "Dr. Brown and others feel that Vesper Services are not meeting their original purpose." She would like to see the "whiz bang" services presented less often. "They must be provocative. I won't have anything to do with mandatory attendance." On the Sunday when Vespers are not held, Mrs. Berg would like to arrange informal discussions on pertinent topics. Some of the ideas for these discussions are from a Church class she taught last year in Washington. The discussion topics included, "Does your draft card burn you up?," "The New Morality—From Pilgrim to the Pill," and "Race Relations."

Mrs. Brown spends much of her time reading and researching speeches for the President. While in Washington she worked with Dr. Brown on a script for a weekly radio show, "Governments of Man."

Mrs. Berg concluded, "Somebody must be concerned with community problems of housing, schools, and public health. We need to realize that these things don't reach everyone equally." An educated woman, Mrs. Berg feels, can play a role in solving these problems.

At the time of publication the following reorganization proposals had been presented to Student Council for consideration.

STUDENT COUNCIL

Senate

- I. Membership
 - A. 3 permanent members from the Junior and Senior classes
 - B. All heads of Committees
 - C. All Officers
- II. Presiding Officer
 - A. The Vice-President
- III. Powers

Administration Policy of the Student Council will be discussed by the Senate with the consent of the House.

 - A. All standing committees
 - 1. curriculum committees
 - 2. nominations committee
 - 3. sounding board committee
- IV. Meetings
 - A. Meet only when called by the presiding officer
 - B. Must meet when called on Mondays from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m.
 - C. All Senate meetings should be closed.

House of Representatives

- I. Membership
 - A. 1 annual member from the freshman and sophomore classes
 - B. 2 members from the dorms and the day students
- II. Presiding Officer
 - A. The President
- III. Powers
 - A. All general matters before the council
 - B. All members must serve on at least one committee.
 - B. All House meetings are in joint session with the Senate, therefore
 - C. All meetings are open to the Student Body.

All meetings of the Senate and the House should be conducted by modified Parliamentary procedure which each member will be aware of.

Trustees establish Mrs. E. memorial

Mrs. Fern Bittner, Mrs. Ann Lewis, and Pat Jungers will be the trustees of the Edith P. Everist Memorial Fund. Mrs. E., head resident in Cobbs Hall since 1961, died suddenly Friday, March 17, at St. Joseph's Hospital. A memorial service was held that afternoon in Sibley Chapel. The burial was in Marshalltown, Iowa.

The fund will provide furnishings for a classroom in the new stables building. Letters will be sent to those people whom the trustees feel were close to Mrs. E. Anyone else who would like to contribute may submit a pledge through the college bank.

ORGANIZATION OF STUDENT GOVERNMENT

The Lindenwood College Student Council shall have two houses, the House and the Senate.

SECTION 1.

POWERS OF THE SENATE

- a. The Senate shall meet to prepare an agenda for House sessions.
- b. The Senate shall be comprised of the President of the Student Association as an exofficio member, the NSA Coordinator, the Secretary-Treasurer, Honor Board Chairman, Chairman of the Freshman Counseling, Sounding Board Chairman, Social Council Chairman, Solicitations Committee Chairman, Elections Committee Chairman, Rules Committee Chairman, and Campus Chest Committee Chairman. The Vice-President shall serve as the presiding officer.
- c. The Senate shall submit committee reports, old and new business to the House.
- d. The Senate shall meet from 6:30 - 7:00 p.m. on Monday during the school year.

SECTION 2.

POWERS OF THE HOUSE

- a. The House shall be comprised of the Senate and twenty dorm representatives who shall be elected at the beginning of the school year.
 - 1. Representatives shall be elected on the basis of student population.
 - 2. The total student population shall be divided by a factor of twenty to ascertain accurate representation for each dorm.
 - 3. Each dorm shall be assured representation.
 - 4. At the beginning of each school year, the House shall be reapportioned by the Senate.
- b. Those matters presented to the House shall be substantive or procedural.
 - 1. Substantive measures are those which amend the constitution or make long term commitments into the future. A 2/3 majority of those persons present and voting shall be necessary for passage of substantive measures.
 - 2. Procedural measures are those matters of Student Council procedure and temporary matters discussed before the House. A simple majority of those persons present and voting shall be necessary for passage of procedural measures.
 - 3. A quorum for the House shall be 16, (one more than half of the body as a whole).
- c. The House shall hear reports from all committees, standing and special, and report to their respective dorms.
- d. The House shall have the power to create Special Committees consisting of four members and a chairman.
- e. The Senate shall appoint membership for Solicitation, Election, Rules and four members of Curriculum Committees.
- f. The House shall meet during the school year on Monday from 7:00 p.m. until adjournment.

SECTION 3.

RULES FOR THE COUNCIL AS A WHOLE

- a. Meetings of both Houses shall

normally be open to the student body.

- 1. Students may or may not be recognized at meetings of the Senate at the discretion of the presiding officer.
- 2. With a majority vote, either House may resolve itself into executive session.
- b. All members shall serve on one and not more than two committees.
- c. Representatives of the campus press, KCLC and the campus newspaper shall attend meetings of both the House and the Senate and may be called upon to express their views but will not vote.
- d. Parliamentary procedure shall be followed.
- e. A Parliamentarian shall be elected by and from the House. She shall serve both houses. It is the duty of the Parliamentarian to see that Parliamentary procedure is followed and to chair the Rules Committee.

SECTION 4. COMMITTEES

- a. Standing committees shall be:
 - 1. Solicitations - comprised of five members chosen from the House. It shall hear proposals for all solicitations projects on campus, with the right to approve or reject such proposals.
 - 2. Elections - comprised of five members chosen from the House. It shall oversee balloting and election procedure in all Student Council elections.
 - 3. Sounding Board - comprised of one representative, elected from each dorm and the day students. Sounding Board members shall not be voting members of Student Council. Secretary of Sounding Board shall be a member of Student Council and shall be appointed by the Sounding Board Chairman at the time that other committee assignments are made. It shall hear complaints and suggestions and submit them to the proper administrative office.
 - 4. NSA Commission - comprised of one representative elected from each dorm and the day students. They shall not be voting members of Student Council. The NSA convention alternate shall serve on the NSA commission. Representatives shall be elected.

5. Curriculum Committee - comprised of one representative of each class, who petition for the position and are elected by the House. The Vice President shall serve as chairman of the committee. Four House members also serve.

6. Rules - comprised of five members elected by the House. It shall meet to consider proposals for revision of the Constitution, and to discuss matters of Parliamentary procedure. The Parliamentarian shall serve as chairman. Consideration for removal from office shall be considered by the Rules Committee.

7. Campus Chest - comprised of members selected by the House from the Student Council or the Student Body at large. The chairman shall be a member of the Student Council. She shall be nominated by the Senate with the advice and consent of the House. Its functions shall remain as incorporated in the Student Council minutes until such time as the Constitution is revised.

b. Special Committees shall be created by the House. Membership will be chosen by the House. Such committees shall be temporary. Membership of special committees may be selected from the Student Council and the student body at large, with both represented. The chairman shall be a council member.

c. Senior members of the House shall be eligible for Committee chairmanship. A senior member is defined as a representative having served more than one term on Student Council. Junior members are those persons serving their first term on Student Council, and they are eligible to serve as committee members.

d. Committees may send out proposals with: do pass, do not pass or no recommendation.

e. Committee assignments shall be made by the Senate at the beginning of the school year. Assignments shall be made the first Monday following dorm elections.

f. Resident counsellors in Niccolis shall be seated until that dorm holds its regular election in November.
