Objectives: Gain cultural competency, learn women's experiences as an athlete in a different country


Process:

Mosul's Culture

Important aspects of Mosul's culture include language, religion, clothing, media, sports, family, and food.

Language: The people of Mosul speak Arabic. They specifically speak the Maslawi dialect. Arabic speakers appreciate when non-Arabic speakers attempt to speak the language. A popular greeting is Mar-ha-ban.

Religion: Islam is the religion of Iraq. The Quran is the sacred text, and the prophet Muhammad started Islam. Sunni and Shia are the sects of Islam, and people who follow Islam are called Muslim.

Clothing: Traditional clothing is modest. Clothing plays a role in religion. No tight clothing, cover skin, most women cover hair

Media/Sports: Social Media presence, Political media presence; Soccer is the most popular sport. Maslawis watch European and Arabian soccer. Soccer is referred to as fútbol. Women play non-physical sports (table-tennis).

Family/Holidays/Food: Family is a big presence. Iraq is a collective society. Extended family gathers once a week. Holidays revolve around Islam. A popular food is Dolma, which is stuffed vegetables with lamb and rice.

History

Key details of Iraq's history include Saddam Hussein. Mosul, specifically, was occupied by ISIS from 2014 to 2017. The rebuild of the city led to new hope and faith in the city.



Norms

Norms include gender roles, alcohol, collectivism and households, and honor versus shame.
