During the gay pre-Christmas activities, the seniors sponsored an all-school formal dance with the theme of "Candy Canes." Butler Gym was decorated splendidly with enormous candy canes and a large Christmas tree.

Senior Skip Day, a deep, dark secret to the rest of the school until it happens, started at six a.m. one fine morning with breakfast at the Statler, then the students went their various ways for a day of unrestricted fun—milk cocktails, ballet . . . Dr. and Mrs. McCluer invited the whole class to dinner in March, and the students enjoyed the evening playing bridge, watching card tricks, and participating in conversation games. At the Senior Party for the faculty much fun was had while playing charades, bridge, singing and enjoying delicious refreshments.

May Day weekend was a hey-day in the lives of the seniors. The activities started with a street supper and carnival Friday night. Saturday night the May Queen, Carolyn Coons, was crowned, followed by an all-school dance in the street and the gym. Music was amplified by the loud speaker for the open air dancers. Sunday afternoon a tea was given for the students and parents who had come to witness the ceremony. Pin Day the seniors wore their caps and gowns for the first time. The juniors wore white dresses and were pinned by the seniors with new Lindenwood pins, thus becoming seniors. The seniors then sang "Remember" to the juniors, who returned the song.

During Class Day the will and prophecy of the seniors were read—the old hand-me-downs of the seniors were passed on to underclassmen. "Custer's Last Stand," a picture which belongs to one senior every year, was passed on to another Butlerite. Suddenly it was Commencement, and each senior, four stars in her crown of higher education, received with pride the degree she had worked so long to attain. Four years gone—swept away into the mists of experience, but never to be forgotten in the minds of the seniors of 1948.






### Sophomore Class


### Freshmen Class
