Online billing ready

This summer, Lindenwood launched a new feature that allows students to pay their tuition bills online through the CAMS portal. The option allows students close by and those in other countries to quickly keep track of and pay their bills.

Students can access the option by logging into the CAMS student portal, accessible from the university's main site. Once logged in, clicking on "My Ledger" will lead to another page allowing students to see the current balance of their accounts. At the bottom of that page, there is an option to make payments online. After clicking the link, students will be directed to a new page where payment information can be securely submitted and a receipt of the transaction can be printed.

The online option has been available for a few months, and the response is already mostly positive. "It's been wonderful. It saves everybody time and the payment is right on the account. It's a good thing," said Kathy Steenbergen, one of the undergraduate account representatives.

"There has been a pretty tremendous notice of it," said Terry Kapeller, Lindenwood's chief financial officer. "People who have discovered it love it."

The business office urges students to make sure that the proper semester is selected in the portal as to avoid confusion on the current outstanding balance of the account. The option to pay in person will still be available to students who prefer this way of billing.

St. Louis Rams break in new field

As more than 7,500 fans crammed into 6,500-seat Hunter Stadium, one thing was clear. For one night, Lindenwood stole the spotlight and become the center of the St. Louis Rams universe.

The Rams held their first and only team scrimmage of the 2009 preseason on Aug. 7 at the Lions home field, breaking in the new turf.

"It's a tremendous opportunity to showcase Lindenwood and our facilities to a wide segment of people that never knew much about Lindenwood," Athletics Director John Creer said. "You can't pay enough for that type of P.R."

Creer said the Rams wanted to choose a facility that had sufficient seating and amenities, such as bathrooms and concessions, to house a large crowd that could watch the scrimmage without cost.

Quarterback Marc Bulger was impressed with the turn-out.

"There's a buzz, an excitement. This is definitely going to be a jump start for us. We were pumped coming in, seeing all those cars," he said.

Fourth-year linebacker Quinton Culberston felt the intensity as well.

"I wasn't expecting this many people... it was like a game almost," he said, noting that Lindenwood's new turf was softer and

even better than the field at the Edward Jones Dome, the Rams' regular season home.

Over the summer, the 10-year-old playing surface was gutted and laser-leveled to ensure smooth transitions from different portions of the field. For example, transitions can easily be made from the football field to the soccer field.

This makes it "a more playable surface, a friendlier surface for the athletes," Creer said. "Now you have a beautiful field that is laser-perfect."

Summer improvements visible throughout campus

Driving into the Auto Zone entrance down the road behind Rauch Memorial Hall, students returning to campus will notice something new. Freshly paved and widened, this road is just one of the many improvements made around campus during the summer months.

Perhaps some of the most noticeable improvements are the newly paved road behind Rauch, the patio seating area outside of Butler Hall adjacent to Grab and Go, and the new sidewalk leading from women's housing to the back side of men's Dorm G and Pfremmer

Hall. Several new revisions, such as crosswalks, traffic signs and lighting, mark the increased safety improvements. When deciding which areas would receive improvement, safety concerns and number of complaints were the leading causes for revision. "Safety is our number one priority," said Vice President Julie Mueller.

One area in particular that received new traffic safety markers is the section of roadways in front of the main entrance to the J. Scheidegger Center for the Arts. According to Mueller, many complaints were received about confusion regarding which lanes were the entrance and exit

in front of the center. In response to the comments, new painted direction arrows now mark the correct way of traffic in each lane.

"We analyze where we are getting the most complaints and where safety issues need to be addressed, and we then make the necessary adjustments," said Mueller.

One addition in particular remains unfinished. Due to delays, the new decorative gate marking the First Capitol entrance and exit awaits completion. "We've had several problems with the stone breaking, and the stone is now on order again. We hoped to have the gate finished a week ago; however, we hope to have it completed in the next few

weeks," said Mueller.

The new gate, which is to be made of brick and limestone rather than one material, will signify the old and the new characteristics of Lindenwood.

A new improvement in progress that is ahead of schedule is the Harmon Hall addition. Work on the building has taken place all summer, and the completed section will be ready for use during the spring of 2010.

Construction also progresses with the new student center. Ground breaking for the center occurred at the end of the 2009 spring semester, and construction continues to be made. Currently the project is scheduled to be completed sometime in 2011.

Julie Beard returns to Lindenwood with a different role

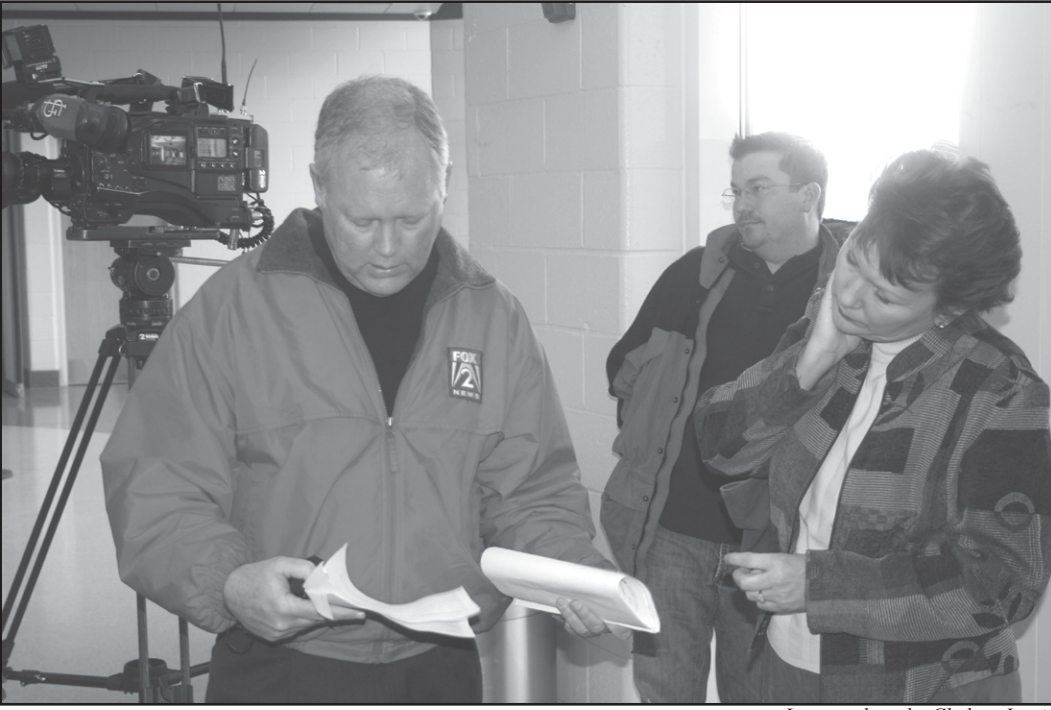

Psych. program expands pool of 'participants'

With every semester comes change to a university, and for Lindenwood University, this is no exception.

One of these changes is the renaming of the Psychology department's Human Subjects Pool to the Lindenwood Participant Pool (LPP).

While the name change might not seem significant to those outside the program, there is a rationale behind the change for those in the LPP.

"We wanted for people to realize that they have a choice in participating in these studies and felt that the name change would encourage that type of thinking," Dr. Nohara-Leclair, associate professor of psychology and faculty supervisor to the LPP said.

"We have had lots of previous students comment on how this is a fun way to gain bonus points and I think adding the word 'participant' is more inviting than the word 'subject' which could attract more students."

Whether it was the name change or happenstance, it didn't take long for LPP to broaden its reach for participants, as the Athletic Training program now allows its students to take part in LPP studies for extra credit.

"There is a lot of overlap

between psychology and athletic training. There is sports psychology, among other interdisciplinary fields, where there are research projects apart of those disciplines," Nohara-Leclair said.

The Athletic Training program echoes this sentiment as well, believing that their students would gain a lot from participating in the LPP.

"Athletic training is very human based and in the future one of the options is research, so I feel if students are a part of research at an early age, it will benefit them in their careers," Delaine Young, assistant athletic director and associate professor said.

Young worked with Nohara-Leclair over the summer to incorporate the Athletic Training department into the LPP, but admits that the psychology department spearheaded the idea.

"This idea was brought to my attention and thought it would be a great way to get students from all three departments programs to gain some experience in research."

Professors' course load will be reduced

Students should keep a lookout for happier teachers next semester.

The Lindenwood University School Board has approved a 20 percent reduction in teacher course load, effective spring semester 2010.

As of now, all Lindenwood professors have to teach a mandatory of five

classes per semester. This reduction will take that number down to four.

The reasoning behind the delay is so Lindenwood can take the fall semester to hire additional faculty to help buffer the lighter class load.

"This will provide professors with more time to prep for lectures and to be mentors and advisors to our students," Lindenwood President Dr. James Evans said.

Dr. Evans seemed very pleased with the new reduction, mentioning it gives teachers "more time to engage in professional development."

Hiring new faculty in the fall semester doesn't seem to be a problem, as Evans said, "the demand for faculty jobs increases with Lindenwood's growth."

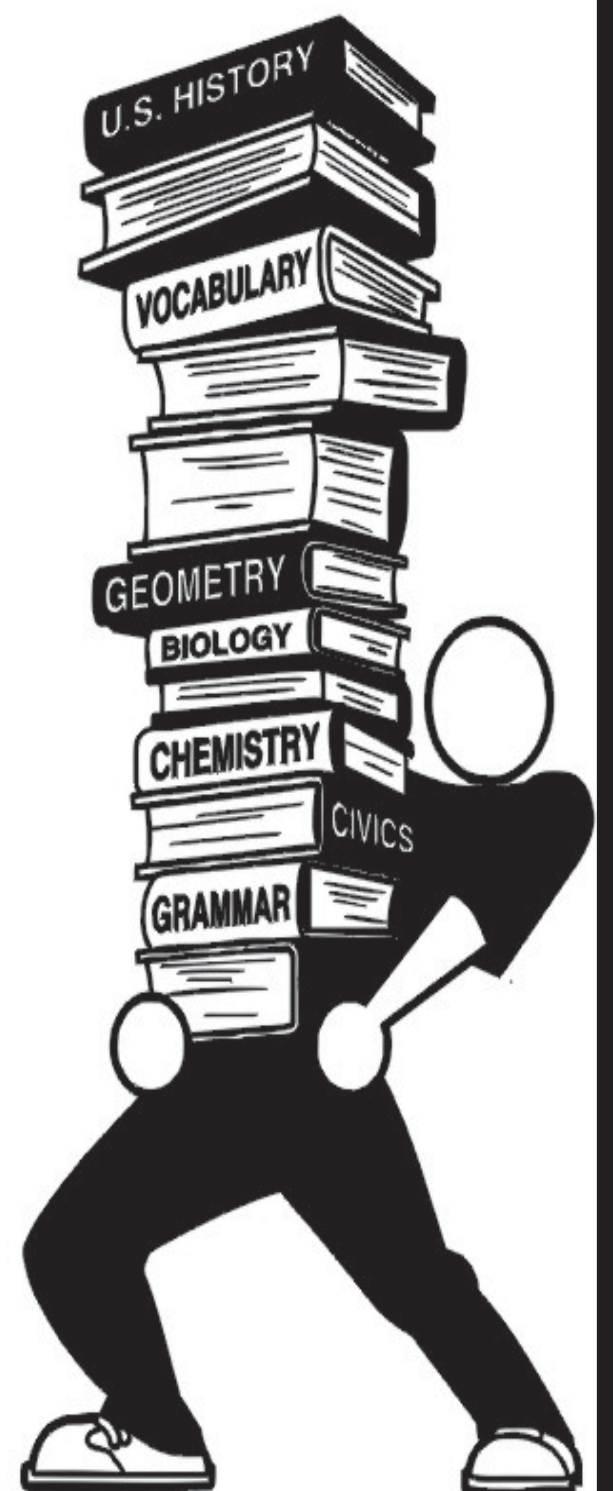
This is good news for students, he said, as teachers will get more time to interact with students outside of class.

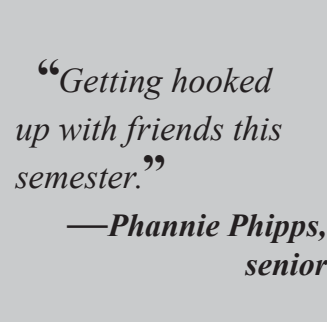

Sotomayor reaches new heights

Sonia Sotomayor was sworn in as the first Hispanic Supreme Court Justice on Saturday, Aug. 22. Her nomination to the Supreme Court has made an impression on the national Hispanic community.

Sotomayor has surpassed incredible heights in the legal profession. Her resume is extensive: an Ivy League education, five years as Assistant District Attorney in Manhattan, and 17 years as a federal court judge.

Her critics are skeptical of her comments about differences in race and culture.

As a Hispanic female, I believe that those differences help define us. The Hispanic community may be labeled with negativity, but Sotomayor has ignored this; she is hopefully the first of many Hispanics who will leave a full and remarkable biography.

Rams in quest of much progress

The St. Louis Rams are ready to step out of the rabbit hole and into a new beginning.

With the hiring of new coach Steve Spagnulo, the drafting of OT Jason Smith, and several key players brought in during free agency, the Rams will greatly improve over the 5-27 record they've posted the last two seasons combined.

The Rams showed their improvement on August 7 in front of a crowd of app. 7500

people. They were the first team to break in the new field turf in the stadium. Fans got to see all of the hard work Coach "Spags" and the team have done during training camp, and it looked to be a much improved team from last year.

At the scrimmage, the team practiced situational plays. This was a plus because this was a weakness for last year's team, and a major reason the losses piled up.

Looking at stats from last

year, the Rams have a lot of improvements to make. The Rams were ranked 27th of 32 teams in yards per game, 30th in points per game, 28th in yards allowed per game, and 31st in points allowed per game. The Rams must make drastic changes if they are to improve upon these numbers and last years 2-14 record.

They have shored up the run defense by drafting MLB James Laurinaitis from Ohio State University and Darell Scott from Clemson University at DT. They have also signed St.

Louis' own Hollis Thomas (Sumner High School) who is a wide body at DT.

To shore up the offensive line, OT Jason Smith of Baylor was drafted, and Jason Brown was signed in free agency from the Baltimore Ravens.

The Rams need to improve this year, and they will. They have brought in the right coaches and players to put the team in a place where they can succeed, and are poised to make a big jump in a weak NFC West division.

"It has created excitement among the team to bring in a coach that has won games at a high level. On a personal level he is real easy to work with. It's good as a young coach to have a great opportunity to work with somebody that has coached at a high level like he has," said David Ward,

The obvious reason Lindenwood hired Soderberg as coach is to win championships, but he also has other plans in mind as well.

"The goal is to win championships and graduate my players. I want to make sure they are the best they can be. I have to thank Coach (Ryan) Cherepkai for building this team, and I have to give him a lot of credit," Soderberg.

"So my major concern is helping the seniors get their diplomas."

The season has yet to begin, so there is a lot of work left to do.

Still there is a lot of optimism throughout the team.

Their first game will be on Nov. 4 on the road at McKendree University.

Lions hungry for championship run

Coming off their most successful year in team history, Lindenwood Lions football is primed and ready for another run at the NAIA championship.

Last season the Lions took the Heart of America Athletic Conference (HAAC) title with a 9-1 record, advancing to the NAIA playoffs for the second consecutive year.

After postseason victories over Lambuth University and Morningside College – their first postseason victories in school history – Lindenwood advanced to the semifinals against No. 1 Carroll College, where they fell 38-37 after failing to convert a two-point conversion with seconds remaining.

"Coming off 11 wins really gave us a taste of what it's like to play

at the pinnacle of NAIA football," Head Coach Patrick Ross said.

Lindenwood enters the 2009 season ranked No. 3 overall in the NAIA Preseason poll (first in the HAAC), which is the school's highest ranking ever.

And expectations from the rest of the league will certainly be higher.

"The people on the outside are taking notice that we have great players ... and show stability in our program," Ross said.

The offense will take on a new look this year, as Lindenwood will be without quarterback Ben Kisner, the team's starting QB for the past

four seasons. In his career, Kisner set team records for passing yards (8,556) and passing touchdowns (69) and is firmly cemented as the best LU quarterback of all time.

Ross said that while several potential quarterbacks have jockeyed for the position throughout camp, junior Phillip Sta-back is the frontrunner for the starting role.

Despite the loss of Kisner, Ross is confident that no matter who wins the position battle, Lindenwood's offensive scheme will be successful. "Anything can happen," he said. "I feel strongly that the guy

who replaces [Kisner] is gonna be able to do a very good job for us."

The Lions did suffer a major blow during spring practice however, when running back Nate Orlando who tore his ACL during a spring practice. He is out for the season.

But a strong veteran presence will still influence this team. Top wide-out Rudy Fleming leads a receiving corps that accumulated 36 touchdown receptions last season. Fleming led the squad in every major category, amassing 67 receptions, 1,056 yards and 11 touchdowns.

"Rudy is a special player," Ross said.

With 15 starters returning, Ross's goal was simple: to maintain the composure, focus and playing ability that he saw in last year's squad.

The Lions will open play against Evangel University on the road on Sept. 5.

A total of 337 student athletes from 37 schools gathered at the National Shooting Complex in San Antonio for the 2009 ACUI Clay Target Championships.

Cyclers roll into season

The cycling season for Lindenwood will start quickly with riders competing this weekend, Aug. 27-30, in the MWCCC MTB Race at Butler University in Indianapolis, Ind.

Riders will compete in Track, Mountain Bike and Cyclocross events this fall. Coach Darren Marhanka described the events: "Track racing occurs on a closed track called a velodrome with high banked turns. Riders compete in a variety of events including the kilometer time trial where riders try to achieve the best time for one kilometer.

"Mountain bike usually occurs on trails in the woods with much change in vertical elevation and covers between 10 - 20 miles," Marhanka said. "Cyclocross occurs on a closed course with barriers that riders usually must dismount for and carry their bikes over and then remount their bikes. The bikes that riders use are specialized road bikes that have knobby tires and special brakes for mud clearance."

Coaches Marhanka and Adrienne Murphy have high expectations for the team this fall. "For the fall season,

I would expect a high finish at collegiate track nationals," Marhanka said. The team will travel to Trexlertown, Pa., to compete against other universities at the national championships Sept. 24.

Last year's road season was a smooth trip for the Lions. They qualified for national championships and had finishes in the top 50, which showed how much the team had to develop to be considered a top competitor at road nationals.

Riders competing in road will have the fall season to train. Training consists of maintaining base form and building muscle in the weight room with free weights and calisthenics and plyometrics. Riders competing in mountain bike will be gone every weekend through national championships in Truckee, Calif., Oct. 16. Marhanka expects high finishes in the A, B, C and D categories.

Recruitment is always a priority, and riders of all skill levels and disciplines are welcome. "We need more female riders to compete against other universities," Murphy noted.

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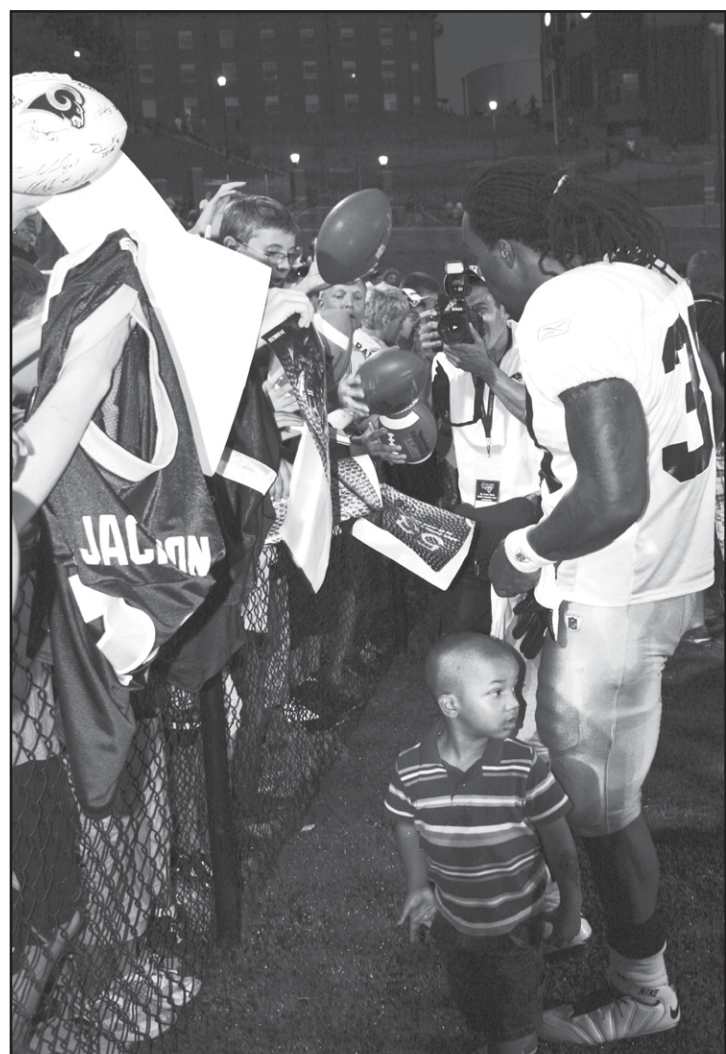
