FALL CONVOCATION SEPTEMBER 12 AT LINDENWOOD CHAPEL

Lindenwood College's new mission statement, spearheaded by the Long-Range Planning Commitee and President James I. Spainhower and approved by the Lindenwood College Board of Directors last May, is the subject of a convocation September 12. It will begin at 8 p.m. at the Lindenwood College Chapel of St. Charles Presbyterian Church, Gamble and Sibley streets.

Students, faculty and staff as well as community residents are invited to the event, which Dr. Spainhower refers to as "a celebration of the institution's new mission and purpose." Taking part in the convocation, in addition to the president, will be members of the board of directors and Lindenwood College Board of Overseers and representatives of the faculty and student body.

The mission statement was recommended to the board by the Long-Range Planning Committee, a 16-member group that consisted of community, student, faculty, alumni and board interests. Briefly, the new mission statement contains four key parts that:

- Reaffirm the teachings and intellectual and moral values of the
- Judaeo-Christian faith as the value orientation of Lindenwood.
- Call for the continuation of Lindenwood College's strong commitment to higher education that is academically strong and steeped in the liberal arts tradition.
- Point out the superiority of educational experiences in which students work while they learn, and commit the college to encourage all students to work either on or off campus and/or participate in an internship program.
- And, speak to the need to fashion a campus environment that is wholesome
- without unrealism and is orderly without regimentation.

Commenting on the new mission statement, Dr. Spainhower said, "It retains the commitment to quality liberal arts education that has characterized Lindenwood College from its beginning. It also states distinctly the institution's commitment to its religious heritage, to innovative educational opportunities for adults and to educational experiences that are highly work-oriented."

APPEAL MADE FOR TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP CONTRIBUTIONS

President Spainhower is making a personal appeal to the community, alumni and supporters of Lindenwood College to provide funding for scholarships for elementary and secondary teachers who want to enroll in the college's Master of Education program. Contributions, which are fully tax-deductible, "will enable those who are shaping the minds of our young to receive additional schooling to do their job better," Dr. Spainhower said.

SYMPATHIES CONVEYED TO CONOVER FAMILY

Faculty and staff members join together in conveying sympathies to the family of the Rev. C. Eugene Conover, Lindenwood professor emeritus who died August 5 at the age of 79. A resident of St. Charles, the Rev. Conover was an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church and professor of philosophy and religion from 1948-1970. He also served as dean of the Lindenwood College Chapel from 1960-70. Active within his profession and the community, the Rev. Conover was past president of the St. Charles Rotary Club and was active in the St. Charles Historical Society, the Lindenwood Chapter of the American Association of University Professors, the American Philosophical Association and the American Academy of Religion. He is survived by his widow, Christine, and two brothers, Merrill of Philadelphia and Donald of Cincinnati. Services were held August 10 with entombment in St. Charles Memorial Gardens.

The \$304,026 subscribed since January 1 represents a significant increase from the \$87,877 raised between January 1 and August 1 last year, said President Spainhower. This year's campaign began the first of the year and will continue through the current fiscal year which ends June 30, 1984.

In announcing the seven-month tabulations, Dr. Spainhower said \$72,401 has been subscribed from corporations and foundations, including \$50,000 from the Monsanto Fund of St. Louis; \$71,000 from St. Charles area residents and businesses; \$50,793 from friends and supporters of the institution; \$44,760 from alumni throughout the country; \$44,000 from the board of directors; and \$21,072 from faculty and staff members.

"The total \$700,000 goal is ambitious, but with the splendid beginning our own faculty and staff and our board of directors have made, I am very optimistic that by the time we start our 1984-85 fund-raising drive next March, we will have reached this year's goal," he said. "The support shown by our faculty and staff and the board of directors demonstrates to the community Lindenwood College's united commitment toward financial solvency. It also has formed the groundwork for raising additional money from other sources such as the community and alumni to meet our \$700,000 goal," he added. Contributions in all other aspects of the fund-raising campaign, including alumni subscriptions, also are significantly higher than in previous years, Dr. Spainhower said.
