## Y. W. C. A. Council

To adjust freshmen to campus life, the Y. W. C. A. sponsored the Big-Little Sister program, under the direction of Beverly Wescott. This program of orientation meetings and social gatherings quickly succeeded in fitting freshmen into the pattern of life at Lindenwood. In the fall, the Y. W. C. A. sponsored the annual freshmen style show at which the student body elected Betty Shook Hallowe'en Queen.

On May Day, we were proud to have Patricia Sharick and Shirley Sagness represent our class in the Queen's court.




Mrs. Margaret Barton Korty, fellowship student in 1941, received her master's degree in history at the University of Illinois where she was awarded a scholarship.


### Beta Pi Theta



### Linden Bark



## Terrapin


