## FACULTY APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED

Elizabeth M. Ammann, former business and fashion merchandising instructor at Patricia Stevens Career College in St. Louis, has been named assistant professor of business administration and fashion marketing at Lindenwood. A 1977 graduate of Southern Illinois University (SIU)-Carbondale, she holds an M.B.A. degree from SIU-Edwardsville.

L. Rao Ayyaggari, former chemistry instructor at Belleville Area College, has been appointed assistant professor of biology at Lindenwood. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees in biochemistry from Bombay University in India and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in biochemistry from Loyola University Medical School in Chicago.

Alan B. Cady, former biology and zoology instructor at the University of Tennessee, has been named adjunct assistant professor of biology at Lindenwood. A 1976 graduate of Syracuse University, he holds an M.S. degree in zoology from Ohio University and is pursuing his doctoral degree.

Deborah Ruhe Cantarero, former translator and editor at Duke University's Translation Service, has been named adjunct assistant professor of French in Lindenwood's Modern Language Department. A graduate of the Universite de Rouen in France, she holds B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in French from the University of Iowa.

Nancy P. Fleming, former director of the Illini Women's Ensemble and the University Chorus at the University of Illinois in Urbana, has been named assistant professor of choral music and director of the Madrigal Singers at Lindenwood. A 1972 graduate of Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts, she has a master's degree in choral music from Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ, and a doctorate degree from the University of Illinois.

Richard J. Ketchum, former visiting professor at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, has been named adjunct assistant professor of philosophy at Lindenwood. He is a 1963 graduate of Beloit College in Wisconsin and holds a Ph.D. degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

Jim Wong, former vice-president of Montgomery Associates in St. Louis, has been named professor of business administration at Lindenwood. A 1962 graduate of Ohio University with a degree in chemical engineering, he has a master's degree in finance from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland and a Ph.D. degree in business organization from Ohio State University.

## THREE NAMED TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

James M. O'Flynn of Glendale, president of the St. Louis Regional Commerce & Growth Association (RCGA); Harvey A. Friedman of Ladue, president of Hadorco Management Services, Inc., and Gothic Investment Companies of St. Louis; and Thomas L. Gossage of St. Louis, group vice-president and managing director of Monsanto International, have been elected to the Lindenwood College Board of Directors.

O'Flynn is a member of the Governor's Economic Development Advisory Council and the board of directors of Downtown St. Louis, Inc., is past vice-chairman of the St. Louis City Plan Commission and is chairman of the Port of Metropolitan St. Louis Promotion Committee. Prior to joining the RCGA in 1978, he was chairman and chief executive officer of Traders National Bank of Kansas City, vice-president of General Bancshares of St. Louis, executive vice-president and director of the Bank of St. Louis and board chairman of Commercial Bank of St. Louis County.

Friedman serves as director of the American Jewish Committee and as a member of the Salvation Army Advisory Board of Directors. He is a former director of the Charter Bank of Ladue, the Jewish Hospital of St. Louis and Landmark Bancshares Corp. From 1947-50, he served as an instructor at Washington University's University College. In 1961, he formed Linco International, Inc., which later became known as International Super Stores. The firm was sold in 1968 and he became president of Medigroup, Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of International, a position he held until 1980 when he became president of Gothic Investment Co.

A 1956 graduate of the Georgia Institute of Technology, Gossage holds a master's degree in chemical engineering from the same institution. Prior to joining Monsanto in 1961, he served as a process engineer with Esso Oil Co. =more=

A reminder from Tim Coerver, director of Food Services, that advance notice is required from individuals and groups requiring the services of Ayres Cafeteria.
