





The Lindens



Niccolls, for twenty-five years president of the Board of Directors; Roemer Hall, named for the late president, who for twenty-six years guided the destinies of Lindenwood; Irwin Hall, named for Dr. Robert Irwin, president of the college from 1880 to 1893; the library, named for Margaret Leggat Butler; the Lillie P. # "On the Alert"


By participating in defense work, the students of Lindenwood College dedicated themselves this year to the freedom and victory of their country. Early in January the Lindenwood Civilian Morale Service was organized:

The students showed enthusiasm all year for Red Cross activities headed by Dorothy Felger. First Aid classes met with Miss Reichert every Wednesday and Friday. Those who successfully completed these classes were then eligible for the Motor Ambulance Corps. A number of girls, led by Virginia Mackay, spent their free time sewing and knitting.

Miss Staggs of the Home Economics department conducted a Food and Nutrition Course, while Doris Gruer and Bertha Jauch assisted in defense work by teaching a Home Nursing class every Tuesday and

Thursday evening. Under the direction of Mr. Stine, about fifty students planned and participated in a musical revue, designed to entertain soldiers in nearby camps. Another outstanding activity was the Recreation Defense Training Program, sponsored by the freshman class and directed by Mr. Alfred Wyman of St. Louis. Its purpose was to teach skills basic to community recreation in a total war. In an effort to enlist the entire school in defense activity, each hall selected fire wardens, air wardens, and messengers. Students contributed books to the Victory Book Campaign, and, in addition, throughout the year, the girls bought defense stamps and bonds in order to show their loyal support to their government and the American Way of Life.
