## **COEHS Earns CAEP Accreditation**

Over the past several years the COEHS has worked diligently to prepare for the accreditation of our Educator Preparation Provider (EPP) initial and advanced programs through the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP). The 43 programs include all of the COEHS departments including Administration, Human Services, and Curriculum and Instruction.

CAEP is considered the gold standard for accreditation at both the initial and advanced levels. Dr. Ralston, Assistant Dean for Program Assessment and Accreditation, and Dr. Hutcheson, Associate Dean acted as co-coordinators for gathering and analyzing data and creating the associated self-study narratives for submission to CAEP. All faculty members were very involved in providing written input and feedback for the self-study. On Sunday, May 1, 2022, the COEHS welcomed a team of reviewers to our virtual campus. Over the following

three days, the team met with COEHS leadership, faculty, adjuncts, students, alumni, and community stakeholders.

**Success at last!** On Friday, Nov. 18, 2022, the College of Education and Human Services received official word that the LU COEHS EPP programs were fully accredited for the maximum possible length of seven years. The President of CAEP, honored the COEHS with a personal phone call indicating LU as one of the few college EPPs that received no Areas for Improvement (AFIs) or Stipulations. A very small percentage of programs nationwide have achieved such. This milestone is a tribute to the dedication and hard work of the COEHS faculty and staff along with support from faculty across the university as well as our community stakeholders, students, and alumni.

## Social Work Majors Speak: Social Work Courses without Textbooks

Since the fall semester of 2019, all social work courses have been taught without required textbooks. OER are free, digitally accessible course materials that have been integrated without the additional educational expense of a textbook. Students access journal articles, parts of textbooks, YouTube, websites, TED Talks, and podcasts to enhance their learning of social work practice. Our current cohort of social majors will be the first to graduate with a BSW without having to have paid this additional expense. It is estimated this cohort will save \$17,856 due to this program's uniqueness—being the only program at Lindenwood to teach textbook-less. Quality is not sacrificed. Program outcomes have

continued to have been attained, and our social work majors endorse the curriculum choice.
