Lindenwood Enrollment Is Up

Total fall enrollment at Lindenwood has increased this semester and is expected to be up approximately 30 percent after all registration is complete.

According to Sheryl Guffey, Director of Admissions, current enrollment is 1,056 day students, 617 of whom are residents. After the evening, quarter, LCIE, and new day quarter admissions are complete, the projected total number of students will be 2,600-2,700.

Increased housing, parking and faculty have been added at Lindenwood to accommodate this large increase in students.

Fall enrollment in all divisions in the 1987-88 school year was 1,565, of which 224 were residents. In the fall of 1989, 2,105 students were enrolled and 486 of those were residents.

New Chaplain Holds Mass

A chaplain has been appointed to the Lindenwood community and a weekly Mass began on campus Sunday, Sept. 9.

Lions Win First Football Game

On Saturday, Sept. 8, the Lindenwood College football Lions played the first varsity home game in the 163-years of the college's existence. A crowd of 550 watched as the Lions defeated the Vikings of Dana College 21-14.

The Lions controlled the ball most of the game with a run-oriented offense that totaled a respectable 373 yards. Led by Sophomore fullback Tim Gula, 49 yards in ten carries. The Lions were effective on the ground. Offensive line coach Jeff Driskill had nothing but praise for his linemen and was especially proud of two freshmen starting in the offensive line, center Jason Meyers and left guard Doug Riser. Sophomore quarterback Lamar Wilkens, 76 yards in 11 carries and one touchdown, was a little errant in his passing, six completions in 14 attempts, but more than compensated with his running and slick ball handling. Wilkes also threw a touchdown pass to tight end Mike Smiddy in the third quarter to round out the scoring for the Lions.

On defense, the Lions more than held their own with stalwart play from sophomore Charlie Kenyon, 4 sacks, 1 fumble recovery and 1 interception. Also freshman Aaron Frye turned in an excellent effort as a late replacement at free safety, 7 solo tackles and 1 assist.

Except for a lapse in the third and fourth quarters allowing Dana to score on two long passes, the defense led by juniors John McBride and Chuck Frank turned in an exceptional effort.

Head Coach Dave Schroeder said, "I'm proud of them. For a first game they played very well and we had no turnovers. It's a win, it's in the books, and now we can move on."
