Students' Fate May Be in the Hands of Peers

Lindenwood College students facing allegations which would require disciplinary action by the college may soon be facing a jury of peers and faculty.

Camille Oehler, Assistant Dean of Students, said the establishment of a judiciary board was being reviewed by the Residential Life staff.

If approved, the proposal would then be sent for approval by the administration, including President Dennis Spellmann and Vice-President Daniel Keck.

Exact details of the board's jurisdiction and proceedings are not available yet, according to President of Lindenwood Student Government (LSG) John Batts. (continued on page 2)

Lindenwood Students Invade Soviet Union

Six students, three graduates and the Vice-President of Lindenwood College left for the Soviet Union Thursday. They will return the 29th of September.

They went as part of an exchange program initiated by the Citizen Exchange Council. The council began the program to promote better understanding between people of the United States and the Soviet Union.

In the program students from Lindenwood visit the University of Azerbaijan in the city of Baku for about a week, then, the following semester, students from Azerbaijan come to the U.S. Lindenwood students first visited their sister school in the spring of 1989. Thief Strikes Niccolls Hall

St. Charles police have no suspects in a theft which occurred last week in the dorm room of a Lindenwood student.

The student, Tim J. Wilson, 19, a sophomore resident of Niccolls, said he and his roommate, Sonny J. Arnel, 20, left their room for a short time last Wednesday night and while they were outside someone took a gold chain, \$10, a Shell gas card, and a Visa card, which all belonged to Wilson.

He didn't notice the credit cards were missing until the next evening. He called the St. Charles police and the banks which issued his cards. According to Wilson, the thief had already charged \$350 on the Visa card.

St. Charles police are investigating the incident and they do suspect it was a Lindenwood student who stole the items.

LSG began drafting a proposal for such a board last fall, after the student grievance committee had been eliminated the preceding spring.

"I see the judiciary board as something very positive for the campus," Oehler said. She said she sees it as another outlet for student involvement.

President Spellmann said he had not yet heard of the proposal in an interview Thursday, September 13. He said his views on disciplinary action are all stated in the student handbook from June of 1990 on page 16 in a statement called "Community Well-Being".

Spellmann said he would have to see the proposal before accepting or denying it. He said he thinks it could be a positive learning experience. He said he would consider accepting it "as long as we (the administration) have the opportunity to move swiftly when we have serious offenses." He cited two such offenses as being rape and possession and/or dealing of drugs.

Spellmann said that as reported in the handbook, disciplinary problems would be dealt with fairly, justly, and patiently. He said, however, "There are some things I'm not patient with." He listed rape and drugs as two of those things.

Spellmann also said "We (the college) are here to correct behavior, not punish." He said that talks about improving the quality of on-campus life are always welcome.

Last spring our students were unable to return to Azerbaijan due to civil unrest in the country. This is why three of the people visiting now are graduates. Professor Edward Balog, Dean of the Social Sciences Department and Advisor to the Soviet Exchange Program, said all the students who were supposed to go last year were asked if they wanted to go.

The people now in the Soviet

Union with Vice-President Dan Keck are seniors John Askey, Heidi Hunt, Jay Kemper, Paul Lampe, and David Rachie. Also there is junior Jackie Zaczek, and graduate student Sharon Bollinger. Graduates of Lindenwood Theresa Johnson, Annette Ilse, and Jocelyn Davis also went.

The students in the LC Soviet Exchange program have a steering committee that helps organize the exchanges. Students wishing to be part of the exchange apply and then are interviewed by a board of faculty. Out of about 39 applicants for this trip nine are going.

Balog said the students are staying in dorms on the campus of the university and will stay in students homes in Baku for one night. He said they will hopefully have one or two days to tour Moscow.

One of the students' activities in Baku will be to try to set the date for students from Azerbaijan to come here in the spring.

The students raised some money and also contributed from their own resources. They solicited contributions from businesses and had some funds left over from the auction in the fall of 1989. They also sold items such at T-shirts and plastic mugs with the Soviet Exchange logo on them, according to Balog.

The program extends for three years. When this time is up, it may expand to an exchange of individual students to study for up to a semester, Balog said.

The Citizen's Council has helped subsidize the exchanges for schools, but its funds are running out, according to Balog. Though the funding then will be left up to students, he said he thinks the chances of the program continuing are good.

Balog visited the Soviet Union with the first group of students. He said one surprise for this group might be the openness of discussion on political and economic issues. He said that he and the students had frank discussions with the people of Baku about the state of their nation.

Balog thinks this is a "great" (continued on page 4)

Asbestos To Be Removed From Tunnels

A cancer-causing material is currently being removed from the tunnels on campus by Midwest Asbestos AbatementCorporation.

At the turn of the century, asbestos was used as an insulator and wrapped around the steam lines. Project Manager for Midwest, Larry Eckelkamp, stated "As long as no one tampers with the wrap around the steam lines and releases the fibers into the air, no harm can be done." He said that once the asbestos is removed the steam lines will be re-insulated with fiberglass which he estimated will take 1500 man hours with an average of 20 men to complete the job.

President Spellmann said Tuesday that the re-insulating of the steam lines will help heat the buildings and water more efficiently.

He explained that the removal of asbestos from the tunnel was part of the agreement with the bank when a loan was acquired. The college was given five years to remove the asbestos. Spellmann decided to go ahead with the removal now to avoid any risks since the cable, phone, and computer wires will be put in the tunnels soon.

Another reason for the asbestos being removed now instead of the summer is because the company is in its offseason. That means a savings of \$81,000 for the college.

Lindenwood sophomore, Robert
Bingham, who has had some experience
with asbestos abatement says that the
removal of the asbestos seems to be
going smoothly. "The workers are taking every precaution to insure that the
asbestos fibers are not released into
the air," said Bingham.

Eckelkamp says the asbestos should be completely removed by the 25th or 27th of September.

AIDS is a Major Threat to College Students Across America


The AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome) epidemic is becoming a major problem across college campuses. College students are at risk to the human immune deficiency virus (HIV) that could lead to the AIDS virus.

The HIV virus infects disease-fighting white blood cells of the immune system. The first sign of symptoms is usually an infection like an unusual pneumonia or viral illness, fatigue, or major weight loss. The virus cannot be spread by kissing, touching, or by a toilet seat.

According to blood sample surveys at 19 campuses by the American College Health Association, one in 500 college students may carry the virus. This is due to the fact that 70% of girls and 80% of guys are sexually active by the time they are 20 years old. Sex with multiple partners, the risk-taking involved with not using condoms, and the rise in crack-cocaine and alcohol abuse, which could lead to promiscuity, make students susceptible to the risk of getting the HIV virus.

Most college students aren't aware of the growing threat of AIDS because it may take as long as seven years for symptoms to occur.


