Hispanic Heritage Month Speaker: Saúl Flores



Much the same can be said of many charter schools and private colleges and universities.

Melissa Elmes was recently awarded this year's Teaching Association for Medieval Studies (TEAMS) Teaching Award for Early Career College Educators. In addition, Elmes has been invited to share her work at the 2021 International Congress for Medieval Studies in Kalamazoo, Michigan. 
Alumni Merit Award - Jon "JT" Taylor

Requesting Spring Course Materials from the Library

The library is currently preparing for the Spring 2021 semester and wants to know what resources faculty would like to support spring coursework. Review DM free ebooks through the Faculty Select platform and submit your request at the same time. If you don't see a book listed, email the library and we would be happy to see if there is a DM free option available. If you would like help looking for OER material, we have an OER guide to help you through the process and part of the guide has an assistance form. If you are wanting to switch out your main textbook, please request assistance at least a week before the Barnes and Noble deadline. If you are wanting to add in OER supplemental materials, the deadline to reach out is no later than the week before finals.


