Earthquake Watch is Underway

The Advanced Reporting class conducted a survey last week concerning the earthquake which has been predicted along the New Madrid Fault on or around December 3.

Members of the class designed a poll with 15 questions to find out how Lindenwood students feel about the earthquake. Part of the class took the surveys to classes last Tuesday morning and evening while others visited the library and the dorms.

The class got a random sampling of students including residents, commuters, full-time, part-time and evening students.

The survey included a total of 222 people; 92% of were full-time students, 6% were part-time, and 2% were faculty/staff.

All but 2% of the people involved in the survey had heard of the prediction on December 3rd.

The survey found that there is a diversity of concern over the earthquake prediction. With a margin of error of +/- 7%, the survey showed that 44% of the students plan to attend classes on December 3 and 28% were undecided. And students were split on plans to take precautions, with 43% saying they would take no precautions on Dec. 3.

Others in Missouri are taking the prediction seriously. The officials at two high schools in Cape Girardeau have already said they will not hold classes Dec. 3 or 4. Local news channels are running news series this week offering earthquake precaution tips. And pamphlets about safety precautions are turning up around St. Louis and St. Charles in several government offices.

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Lindenwood Students Are Not Ready for Earthquake

A majority of Lindenwood students feel they are not prepared for an earthquake according to the poll taken by the Advanced Reporting class. The poll was taken last Tuesday. Lindenwood day, evening, resident and commuter students participated.

Of those asked, 54% said they are not prepared in case of an earthquake; 20% didn't know if they are are prepared or not, and 23% said "yes" they are prepared in case of an earthquake.

Almost half of the students said they are not planning to take any precautions on December 3, the day in which an earthquake has been predicted for this area.

The St. Charles County Emergency Management Office says that no matter how severe an earthquake is, the odds for surviving are in your favor with sufficient preparation.

Lindenwood students who are planning to take precautions listed things such as leaving town, storing supplies, taking out insurance and avoiding bridges. Some students plan to rely on praying as a precaution.

The county Emergency Management Office suggests that you review the following suggestions and be familiar with them so you will be prepared for an earthquake:


- •Stay calm! Do not panic!
- •Stay where you are when shaking starts. If you are indoors, remain indoors. If you are outside, stay outside.
- •If you are indoors, get under a desk, bed or within a doorway. Stay away from glass, windows and outside doors. If unable to move cover your head and body with your arms, pillows, blankets, books, etc. to protect yourself from falling objects.
- •If in high-rise buildings, stay inside building on same floor. Get under desk; stay away from outside walls and windows. Do not use elevators.
- •If in a crowded public place, do not rush for doorway, since other people are going to have same idea. Move away from display shelves containing objects that may fall.
- •If you are caught outside, get away frombuildings, walls, trees and utility wires. Stay in open area until shaking stops.

- •If driving, stop your car and stay inside. Do not stay near high buildings, bridges or overpasses. When driving, watch for earthquake-created hazards.
- •Do not use candles, matches or other open flames either during or after tremor, due to possible gas line ruptures. Extinguish fires,

The agency says that the more you think about what you are going to do before the earthquake the better prepared you will be. For more information you can contact the St. Charles County Emergency Management Agency at 949-3023.
