Strategic Partnerships and the College of Education

and Human Services Team Up

Teamwork has created some real momentum for the graduate programs at Lindenwood University. Graduate enrollment in the College of Education and Human Services (COEHS) did see significant growth in enrollment for the Fall semester of 2023. One source of this growth is a collaborative effort between Strategic Partnerships and the COEHS, the K-12 Gold Educational Partnership. As reported last Spring, this partnership is between Lindenwood University and K-12 districts. The partnership entitles K-12 schools, that sign a memorandum of understanding, to a 20 % discount on tuition to all staff, not just certificated staff for any online undergraduate and graduate program. The school partner also agrees to share information about Lindenwood programs including flyers and other promotional materials.

Names of schools that might be interested in partnering with Lindenwood were gathered from the COEHS, with a special shout-out to the Educational Leadership Department. Dr. Jill Hutchinson, Assistant Dean, accompanied Wendy Linton to the Tri-County Superintendents' meeting last May, which resulted in several Gold Partnerships being signed this past summer.

Lindenwood is also looking to meet the districts' professional development needs through graduate workshop credits with our Professional and Continuing Education (PACE). Although several districts and Regional Professional Development Centers use this option, many are still unaware. Lindenwood University is also looking at how we can meet districts' needs for educational cohorts. The intention is to keep communication open and develop other ways Lindenwood can help K-12 districts. In response to Lindenwood University's overall realignment, Strategic Partnership Director Donnie Wieland has added two additional employees, Azam Nathaniel, K-12 Partnerships within PACE, and Nicole Sullivan, Manager of Academic Partnerships and Early Start College. The team is rounded out by Dewitt White, Assistant Director of Military Strategy and Student Experience, and Wendy Linton, Manager of Greater Missouri Extended Sites.

According to Director Wieland, "The new realignment allows for more seamless communication and creates an optimal win-win situation for all of our partners and Lindenwood University. For example, this summer, while attending the American School Counseling Association Conference, a big partner within PACE, Azam Nathaniel and Wendy Linton not only recruited for graduate workshop credit but also our doctoral program. "The sky really is the limit when Strategic Partnerships and the COEHS work together!

New COEHS Advisor





Lindenwood's Triad Training. This training,
coordinated by Dr. Amanda Aldridge, Director
of Internships and Culminating Experiences in
the College of Education and Human Services,
provides teacher candidates and their host
teachers with a thorough understanding of each
of the participants' roles and responsibilities in
the experience, as well as a plethora of
supportive resources to use during the experience.



Dr. Dan Kirk, Dean of the College of Education and Human Services, kicked off the meeting with a warm welcome and Dr. Ronda Cypret-Mahach, Department Head for Initial Teacher Education, provided additional words of encouragement and support. Graduate Admissions representative Alicia Buchanon, and Dana Humphrey from the St Louis Regional Professional Development Center, were present and able to provide additional guidance and expertise. Host teachers from districts near and far were present in person or virtually to support candidates, ask questions of the Student Teaching supervising faculty and to calibrate on the Missouri Educator Evaluation System (MEES) tool that is utilized statewide to evaluate teacher candidates before recommending them for Initial Teacher Certification.

This course consists of observation, individual conferences, and supervised teaching in an early childhood, elementary, middle and/or secondary school setting while enrolled in a LindenTeach seminar course. The internship provides candidates with the opportunity to experience the role of a substitute teacher in a real school setting.


Meet Shannon Callanan!

Educational Leadership

Students Successfully Complete Doctoral Dissertation Defense

Several students recently completed successful defenses of their doctoral dissertations, earning their Doctorate in Education.

Ethan Sykes defended his dissertation titled "Effects of the Imposter Phenomenon on First-Generation Students' Academic and Co-curricular Engagement." His dissertation chair was Dr. Roger "Mitch" Nasser. The purpose of this mixed-methods study was to explore the prevalence of the imposter phenomenon among community college and private university

students. Additionally, the study examined how impostorism manifested in academic and co-curricular settings.

Tiffaney Whitt defended her dissertation titled "A Quantitative Methods Examination of the Relationship between Student Academic Performance and the Race and Gender of School Administrators." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Tammy Moore. This quantitative methods study identified and tested research-based constructs of school administrators' race and gender compared to discipline, attendance, and academic achievement. The study aimed to address inequities in educational practices, policies, and systems that directly impact student academic success in schools.

LaVada Rebecca Rice defended her dissertation titled "Unfit for Slavery: A Qualitative Exploration of African American Male Perceptions of Persistence and Academic Achievement at a Midwest Public Community College." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Lynda Leavitt. This study examined how institutional and socio-ecological influences might be necessary to improve the persistence and academic achievement of African American male students.

Emily Alicia Dittmer defended her dissertation titled "A Mixed Methods Study on Urban Educators' Feelings of Preparedness to Implement Practices that Impact Social and Emotional Learning in a Mid-Pandemic Environment." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Beth Rapoff. The purpose of the mixed-methods study was to evaluate urban educators' perceptions of their preparedness to implement social and emotional learning strategies in their classrooms/workspaces as well as to understand what the educators' experiences were as their students returned to a five day a week school schedule after a year and a half of disruptions due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Meghan Ann McNulty defended her dissertation titled "A Mixed-Methods Investigation of How Student Goal-Setting for Improved Learner Behaviors Affects Intermediate Elementary Academic Achievement." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Robyne Elder. The study investigated how focusing intermediate elementary school students on improving their behavior could influence their academic achievement.

Andrea Marie Melrose defended her dissertation titled "What's the Big Fat Deal?" The Experience of Fat Students in College." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Roger "Mitch" Nasser. The purpose of this study was to research the experiences of fat students on college campuses, examining their experiences of anti-fat bias and discrimination. Additionally, this study explored policy and practice implications for improving the experiences of fat college students and supporting body diversity on campus.

Lori A. Vaughn defended her dissertation titled "An Action Research Study on Visible Learning Feedback and Motivational Interviewing Concerning Underserved Advanced Placement Students." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Lynda Leavitt. This study addressed inequity as well as self-motivation, self-regulation, feedback practices, and student autonomy and involved improving AP exam scores, increasing post-test essay grades, and raising self-motivation and self-regulation measurements. The study also examined student perceptions of the interventions, self-motivation and self-regulation relating to the programs, and racial bias.

Kathryn Joyce Stanley-Dietzmanher defended her dissertation titled "Student Success Navigators: The Keys to Intrusive Advising, Student Supportive Services, and Academic Success." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Shelly Fransen. This study investigated the connections between intrusive academic advising, student success and retention, and growth within an institution. The study was conducted to demonstrate that intrusive advising is beneficial to students, especially to students who are considered to be at-risk.

Willie Mae Dean defended her dissertation titled "Moving Forward with Music to Promote Student Growth: A Mixed Methods Study with 9th-Grade Algebra 1 Students." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Shelly Fransen. The purpose of this mixed methods study was to investigate what effect music had on student achievement and student behavior during independent practice time for 9th-grade Algebra 1 students. Benchmark assessments from the participating district, a focus group of six students, and four in-person teacher interviews provided the data for this study.

Nancy Fuchs defended her dissertation titled "Trust, Levels of Functioning, and the PLC Process in a Midwest Middle School: A Case Study." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Lynda Leavitt. This dissertation investigated the connections between Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), trust, and targeted interventions to promote increased functioning within adult groups. The study critically analyzed the theoretical foundations of PLCs and the potential to foster professional growth and collaboration.

Kerry Von Behren defended her dissertation titled "A Qualitative Exploration of School Leader Response to the Coronavirus Pandemic." Her dissertation chair was Dr. Sherrie Wisdom. The purpose of this study was to consider the lived experience of K-12 school leaders amid the pandemic of 2020. The study addressed the research question "What were the professional experiences of educational leaders as they responded to the COVID-19 pandemic?"

Matthew John Gaglio defended his dissertation titled "Psychological Needs Satisfaction in Teaching: A Mixed-Methods Analysis on the Impact of Evaluation Systems on Teacher Intrinsic Motivational Outcomes Using Self-Determination Theory." His dissertation chair was Dr. Kelly Dickinson. The purpose of this study was to examine the relationships between psychological need satisfaction, motivational regulators, and intrinsic motivational outcomes regarding teacher evaluation systems related to the self-determination theory.

Fall 2023 Dissertation Help Session

MO School Counselor and Counselor Educator Curriculum Revision Task Force

This past May, Dr. Patterson-Mills finished work on a Missouri Task Force for Missouri School Counselors as part of revisions to the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE MO) Comprehensive Model of School Counseling. This will take place in stages and this task force looked at school counseling curriculum. The curriculum consists of three grade level areas of focus: social emotional learning, academic planning, and post-secondary planning. The first stage was looking at general curricular themes, updating language, updating topics and terminology, and collecting expertise from multiple constituencies across the state as school counselors and

counselor educators to voice what they are seeing as needs of today's K-12 students in Missouri.

Missouri, home to the father of modern school counseling Dr. Norm Gysbers, continues to be a leader nationally in comprehensive school counseling programs and curriculum. All lesson plans are free to use by school counselors in any state.

Dr. Molly Stehn joins COEHS

Molly Stehn, EdD, LPC joined the faculty of the Counseling and Human Services Department as Associate Professor in August 2023. Her primary professional and scholarly interest is in the practice and scholarship of Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT). Dr. Stehn had previously taught at Webster University's Department of Professional Counseling from 2014-2022, where she had developed and furthered her interests in assessment,

accreditation, and the scholarship of teaching and learning. Outside of academia, she has seen clients in her capacity as a clinical mental health counselor at both St. Louis DBT and the Portland DBT Institute. Dr. Stehn earned her master's in mental health counseling and doctorate in counselor education and supervision from the University of Cincinnati. A significant part of her continuing professional education included intensive training in DBT from Behavioral Tech Institute and in a newly developed DBT-informed protocol for treating PTSD from that protocol's author, Melanie Harned.



Rigor Remains without Use of Textbooks

The Social Work Program has been textbookless since the spring of 2019. As a competency-based curriculum, annual assessment data is collected to measure if our majors meet a benchmark of 80% for the nine generalist social work core competencies as developed by our

accrediting body, the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). Among concerns expressed, the social work faculty was particularly concerned that going without textbooks would negatively impact the stringency of the program. We are pleased to share, however, that the rigor has been surpassed in 2023. Our assessment data reveal an average of the core competencies to be 86% in academic year 2018-19 (with textbooks) and an average of the core competencies in 2022-23 to be 93% (without textbooks).

Our senior class cohort have never had a required textbook in their social work classes, but they have had reading materials. They report benefits of being without textbooks to include lowered educational costs, as well as current and multiple expert "voices" from a variety of sources including journal articles, videos, parts of textbooks, professional training materials, and podcasts. These students report coming to class is beneficial to apply this relevant information to hone their skills and apply what they have learned from the course materials. Social work faculty recognize the burden of being without texts falls on them to remain current in a dynamic field. Faculty are continually changing course materials and updating resources almost every time the course is taught.

We are pleased to note that what began as an experiment four years ago has been a success. We consider our 'textbookless' social work program to be a hallmark in the Open Educational Resources (OER) higher education movement.

She has published several empirical articles on racial disparities, antiracist practices, distance counseling in



underserved populations, and addiction studies; and she has disseminated and presented her research at several counseling conferences. Dr. Springfield also holds a Master's degree in Rehabilitation Counseling with an emphasis in Addiction Studies from the University of Arkansas Fayetteville and a Bachelor's degree in Psychology from the University of Arkansas Pine Bluff.

Illinois School Counseling Association Developmental Model Revision Task Force work completed

Dr. Patterson-Mills, Department Head for Counseling, was invited to serve on the Illinois School Counseling Association developmental model revisions task force. Dr. Patterson-Mills had the honor of serving on the last writing task force and on this version helped update terminology, standards, and other relevant information to meet today's learners' needs. School counselors will be equipped with a comprehensive plan to direct their counseling programs across K-12 schools in Illinois. Topics covered by school counselors include social emotional learning, academic organization and planning, and post-secondary planning. sented over the next year at state conferences and workshops.




