# A Look at

## THE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Fund raising through a development program is new to Lindenwood. The new department of development was organized to provide a steady flow of funds into the college treasury for new facilities, expansion, salary increases, and additions to the endowments. These needs will be presented to attract the interest and consideration of prospects and will avoid, at all times, the pressures of a "crash" program.

"The character of the development program is not a high-pressure campaign," said President McCluer recently, "but a continuing effort to enable Lindenwood to meet its opportunities. The college has a sound future assured by investments in its endowment and its achievement through the years."

"Lindenwood's strength is obvious. The opportunities and need it faces are equally clear. Investment in Lindenwood," he stated, "is a permanent investment in the education of women."

In order to attract interest, the development department, under Mr. Fred Doenges, is preparing a series of mailing pieces. They will give a broad and interesting picture of the college and its work. *Lindenwood College . . . and its story*, the first mailing, will relate Lindenwood's history, aims, educational goals, describe the physical plant, and give a general introduction to the student community.

The second brochure is a financial report supplemented by comments from the president of the Board of Directors and from President McCluer.

The third piece will be a profile of the Board of Directors and the administration of the college. A report of the Long-Range Planning Committee's needs for Lindenwood during the next five years will constitute the final mailing. The committee analysis will report needs and their urgency and prepare cost estimates for a five-year program. From this report Lindenwood will specify the details of the development program and the goals to be set.

"The fifth mailing will carry the announcement of a precise five-year development program for Lindenwood and the monies needed for it," stated Mr. Doenges. "It will also list the various gift plans which can be used to supply these needs," he said.

Under the leadership of Dean Donald M. Mackenzie, an inventory of Lindenwood's educational needs is being made. Donors may give their names to any of the smaller projects from this list: language laboratory, library microfilm equipment, endowment of chapel religious programs, etc.

## Women as Intellectuals

Some educated women like to think of themselves as intellectuals. Most are not. The female intellectual is a rare species, and for good reason.

The intellectual is not necessarily a scholar nor a scientist. He is not necessarily a college graduate, nor need he be in the liberal professions. The intellectual may have close ties with the artist, but he need not be an artist. He is certainly not a "culture vulture": he does not enjoy a museum seminar in his home; he does not take up the recorder; he does not learn French in his spare time; he does not buy a set of the bound classics; and he does not particularly enjoy hearing Leonard Bernstein explain classical music.

The intellectual lives by and for his intellect. He *thinks* and thinks *hard*. Most of us do this so rarely that we have forgotten how painful it can be. We will do almost anything to avoid real thinking. I know one sensitive little boy who complained that the inside of his head "got hot" when he was working on a puzzle or writing a theme. The physiologists, using a model of electrical circuits to explain the workings of the brain, say essentially the same thing.

In his private hierarchy, the intellectual values truth—his notion of truth, of course!—above all else. He is like the scientist and scholar in this respect; but,

unlike many scientists and scholars, he follows the truth far beyond the confines of a narrow academic discipline. The interests of an intellectual range widely throughout his lifetime. He frequently has a broad historical perspective and is involved in the larger political and social dimensions of his times.

The intellectual's compulsion for the truth makes him a social nuisance; he criticizes, antagonizes, alienates, and he quarrels with other intellectuals. He is a stimulating, but not a pleasant person. "Other-direction" is alien to him. The intellectual stands apart from a society bent on keeping conversation calm, cool, and full of good will. (What is so often not understood is that the intellectual is arguing about *ideas*. The non intellectual feels he is being attacked personally during such an exchange. He is wrong, and to think he is being attacked personally is a measure of his conceit.)

One does not decide, as an adult, to become an intellectual. One is or is not an intellectual. An intellectual does what he does because he must. He is, in the language of the modern computer, "programmed" to think, to search out the truth, to criticize.

People who *try* to be intellectuals fool no one. The ability to talk glibly about politics, modern art, current

affairs, and recent novels costs a great deal and brings few rewards. It only gets in the way of finding out and doing what one really wants to do—and can do well.

Women can be, and frequently are, well informed and well read. There is an increasing number of great women scholars and scientists. Women now take their place in the arts and professions and do extremely well in politics and community affairs. But yet there are only a handful of women intellectuals.

Why? Thinking, the search for truth, and criticism come *first* for the intellectual. These are the driving forces that give substance to his self and meaning to his life. Women reared in Western societies who value these things discover they come *second*. It is a rare woman who can think through an abstract problem, who can continue writing or reading with concentration if her baby is crying, her husband wants company, or her mother is ill. It is a rare woman who does not at some point question her femininity (mainly because others are doing exactly that) as she ignores the security and personal feelings of her guests to continue a discussion and to drive home an argument with a telling thrust. From the point of view of society this is fortunate. Our social machinery would rapidly come to a screeching halt were it not for the care of women who liked being women.

The plain fact of the matter is this—most women are not programmed to be intellectuals. Their *central* role (some say their soul) contains elements which are diametrically opposed to the life of the intellectual.

However complex the circuits of the modern educated woman, the master program remains that of nurturing others; the operational test is the choices women make when the chips are down. Society no longer rewards these nutrient activities very highly, and many women want and find more than this; but the "more than this" is in second place.

This means that a woman's search for truth is sometimes compromised by the immediate needs of the situation. She is by love, not mind, possessed. More importantly, it means that her criticism is tempered by sensitivity to the feelings of others. And while it is currently fashionable to say that women live on no more and no less an emotional plane than men, all the evidence is not yet in. I do know that I still

see my friends allowing their little girls more freedom in emotional response than their little boys. This does not mean that women cannot and do not think hard; it may mean that a good part of their energy is spent in emotional outlets.

It is possible for women to be scholars, scientists, and professionals, and good ones, because such activities do not demand *total* commitment. They demand very high commitment; and they demand work, time, sacrifice, loyalty, and energy. But when put to the infrequent test, they can be put in second place and still come out well. The activities of the intellectual, on the other hand, cannot survive in even a potential second position. They demand all or nothing.

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## LC Graduates Rank High in Who's Who Listings

After a comparative check recently, the publishing firm of Marquis, Inc., found that Lindenwood graduates ranked second in the number of listings in *Who's Who of American Women* among all other Presbyterian colleges in the U.S.—including coeducational.

In making the comparisons, the publishers counted the number of Lindenwood graduates listed in *Who's Who . . .*, compared it with the number of persons listed from other colleges, and tabulated results to determine position of rank.

Lindenwood women listed in the book placed 29th in the survey of graduates from 150 women's colleges. In the publisher's check of the entire 1200 independent colleges and universities in the U.S., Lindenwood graduates hold a significant 78th place in number of listings.

Since the Lindenwood graduating classes are a great deal smaller than many of the classes of the 1200 schools tabulated, these findings reflect much credit on the college and its graduates.

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## ON THE CAMPUS

The warm haze of August has yielded to Missouri fall with ritual form. As summer died, the campus was born again in the ever-changing, never-ending cycle that is Lindenwood. The freshman counselors returned, bubbling over with upper-class authority and well-versed in the most concise route to the "Teahole", or the post office. It was difficult to tell who was more excited on opening day: Lindenwood or the army of '64, wearing new fall suits and an unsuppressible smile of high excitement. A campus policeman confided in a dry tone to a father, who was a bit ill-at-ease among so much purposeful femininity, that he'd "seen 'em come and seen 'em go." But the newest college girl mounted the dormitory steps to meet her future, knowing that to her this day was as unique as Creation Day; and even the policeman could not restrain a little brisker spring to his step as he went about his duties. Soon the campus swarmed with returning upperclassmen. The freshmen took off their name tags, summer gossip was exchanged, and "Gracious Living" miraculously grew out of packing boxes. Unperturbed, Lindenwood settled down to the business at hand.

**FIVE JOIN FACULTY . . .** Lindenwood welcomed five new members to its teaching staff this year. Dr. Helen Bedon is the new chairman of the chemistry department. She replaces Prof. Mary Lear who retired last spring. Dr. Bedon comes to Lindenwood from Sweet Briar College. She received her B.A. from Meredith College, M.A. from the University of North Carolina, and Ph.D. from Cornell.

The Rev. William W. Thomas is the new instructor in the department of philosophy and religion, which is now headed by Dr. C. Eugene Conover, Dean of the Chapel. Mr. Thomas holds a B.A. from Washington and Lee University, B.D. from Yale Divinity School, and is now working on his Ph.D. at Duke University.

Miss Marjorie Ann Banks, associate professor, is new in the education department. She received her B.A. from Southeast Missouri State, her M.A. from Washington University. Miss Banks will supervise practice teaching by Lindenwood students in the local elementary schools.

Miss Lanore Sogard heads the Lindenwood Nursery School this year. Overall direction of the program is under Prof. William Engram, psychology department chairman. Miss Sogard holds degrees from both Iowa

State and Kansas State Universities and has had nursery school experience in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Pineville, Louisiana.

Mrs. Lynn Beck Dillon, Lindenwood College and Washington University, is a part-time instructor in English.

**ENROLLMENT . . .** Lindenwood opened its 134th year this fall with a capacity enrollment—the largest in the history of the college. The 549 students come from 36 states, Canada, Mexico, China, Ecuador, Germany, Greece, Iran, Italy, Japan, and Korea. So far as Lindenwood is concerned, the anticipated college "bulge" has arrived. Last year the college opened with 498 students. The young woman arrived on September 11 for a week of orientation and registration. Classes started September 19.

**DR. PARKER GIVES TV LECTURES . . .** Dr. Alice Parker, English department, is continuing her course this year in English literature on KETC-TV, educational outlet in St. Louis. The course is being taken for credit by students of several colleges and has been made possible by a grant from the Ford Foundation. Her show, which carries three hours of credit, is telecast twice weekly under the title, "A Survey of English Literature." In addition to the TV lectures, a weekly classroom meeting for discussion of the televised material is held in each participating school.

Entering her second year of television, Dr. Parker has nothing but praise for this new and stimulating teaching dimension. She has received letters from many people who watch her program for sheer enjoyment or as a source of fresh ideas. A suburban St. Louis housewife reported that even her four-year-old daughter was an avid fan. The little girl has affectionately dubbed Dr. Parker, "The English Lady."

**SUMMER WORK . . .** The job of maintenance, renovation and decorating in dormitories and campus buildings, as usual, kept Lindenwood busy during the summer. The old sign facing the corner of Kingshighway and Clay was removed. A new one is under construction, a gift of the Class of '61. The Development Office has been equipped and is now operating on the terrace level of Roemer. It occupies the site of the old home economics suite. A large lounge for Nicolls Hall has been approved and will soon be under way. McCluer Hall is rising on schedule. Work is proceeding now on the upper floors.

## FROM FOREIGN LANDS

Look

*Rhoda Sotiropoulou from Athens, Greece, wrote the following article shortly before her graduation last June. She majored in English at Lindenwood and took an active part in campus life.*

When the letter from America arrived at my home in Athens on a July afternoon in 1957, announcing my Lindenwood scholarship, what had seemed only a far-fetched dream became a reality.

I left Greece to come to the "new world" with great enthusiasm and the thrill of the unknown. Now I have my B.A. and am ready for another new venture—graduate school. After I receive my master's degree, I shall return to my country to teach English at the American College in Athens.

From the first moment I set foot on the Lindenwood campus, from the first moment I glanced at my roommate, I earnestly believed that all would go well. It has. The friendliness of the people and the pleasant environment of the campus gave me confidence and self assurance to begin my new life without reservations. The feeling of security, which is so important for a student away from home, never left me. This security I owe to the friendliness and warmth I found in the faces and the hearts of the American people with whom I came in contact. As simple as this may seem, it is something that one has to consider before one leaves his country, his family, his friends, and his way of life, to go to a world completely new to him—a world one has known only from magazines, newspapers, and movies.

I won't forget my first day on the Lindenwood campus. Walking from Cobbs Hall to Roemer, I met young faces which I had never seen before. They smiled and said "Hi." I was puzzled and turned to see if there were someone behind me. I was a little slow in comprehending that this smile was addressed to me. This smile, which I know so well now, made me feel that I, too, was a part of this closely-knit family of students, faculty, and staff.

Three years ago, I looked toward this venture with a thrill and enthusiasm. Now one more feeling has been added to the other two—pride: the kind of pride that inspires only noble and humanistic elements; pride that will lead me toward putting into practice the goals of life that were unfolded before me in the classroom, the chapel, and in the social life of my alma mater—Lindenwood College.

"Knowledge is gained, friendships are made, opinions are formed, plans are laid—life is lived. Life at Lindenwood—that's a lot to remember."

These were the words of my classmate, Jane Ely, as she expressed herself in an issue of *The Linden Bark*. I could hardly find better words to express my own feelings as I depart from Lindenwood. I am sure many other Lindenwood girls have found the statement an expression of their own feelings, too. But I think that for me, a student from another country, one for whom life in the United States meant life at Lindenwood, life away from home, life with new traditions, different language, different friends, different food, and a different pattern, it carries a much deeper meaning than for most of my American friends.

I am grateful for the privilege of spending these enriching years at Lindenwood—a school full of people who are always ready to share knowledge and experiences, to form new friendships, to listen and help with problems—people who add to a school the charm and warmth of a home. Anyone, I feel, is lucky to come to a college where so much efficient effort is spent in making one feel welcome—in giving an effective education accompanied by the highest moral principles.

I hope that everyone who has attended Lindenwood appreciates the knowledge one gains here, but I don't know who could be more grateful for it than students like me—students who, in their own countries, would never have the opportunity to get a liberal arts education. If I had gone on to school after graduating from the *Lycee*, I would have gone to a university and specialized in a profession. Here at Lindenwood, in addition to my major field of chemistry I have gained much from the many other courses that I chose to take—subjects that range from sewing to philosophy—from journalism to play production. I have enjoyed taking them, and I feel that they have added a lot to my interests and my appreciation of life.

Yes, "friendships are made" at Lindenwood. For me this has meant friendships not only with American girls but also with other students from abroad—friendships that made me consider questions from many points of view—pleasant, long-lasting friendships.

Certainly, "opinions are formed." Lindenwood encourages free and independent thinking. When you can't call your mother over the phone to ask her what to do, you *have* to learn how to make up your own mind, form your own opinions.

I can hardly find suitable words to express my thanks to those who have made it possible for me to attend Lindenwood and those who have made my stay here so wonderful. I will just say—thank you for a lot to remember, and may I add—to miss.
