UNITED WAY CONTRIBUTIONS INCREASE 44%

A total of 50 employees contributed to this year's United Way campaign, resulting in pledges of \$2,343. POETRY READING TUESDAY AT BUTLER LIBRARY

Two midwestern poets, Normajean MacCleod of Bloomington, IN, and Michael Pfeifer of St. Louis, will take part in a poetry reading at 7 p.m. Tuesday in Butler Library. Sponsored by the Griffin Society, the event is open to all and will feature the presentation of creative works by students and faculty in addition to readings by MacCleod and Pfeifer.

MacCleod is employed at Indiana University and serves as midwest coordinator for the International Women's Writing Guild. Her poems have appeared in several newspapers and magazines throughout the midwest, including the INDIANAPOLIS STAR, NEW AMERICA, INDIANA POET, the WORLD CONGRESS OF POETS ANTHOLOGY, OUR WESTERN WORLD'S GREATEST POEMS and AMERICAN POETRY ANTHOLOGY.

Pfeifer holds an M.F.A. degree in creative writing from the University of Iowa. In 1976, he received a first-place award in creative writing from the University of Missouri-Columbia. His creative writing and poetry have been published in such periodicals as CHOTEAU REVIEW, MIDLANDS, IOWA JOURNAL OF LITERARY STUDIES, VOICES FROM THE INTERIOR, RIVER STYX, CAROLINA QUARTERLY and MISSOURI REVIEW. ASSOCIATE PROGRAM IN EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY

Lindenwood has introduced an associate degree program in emergency medical technology to its offerings of more than 50 associate, undergraduate and graduate degrees. The two-year program will be instructed by faculty members and emergency medical professionals from Sigma Medical Management, Inc., of St. Charles, DePaul Hospital in St. Louis and St. Joseph Health Center in St. Charles. Upon successful completion of the program, the student will be awarded an associate degree from Lindenwood and will be eligible for the uniform examination for state licensing as an Emergency Medical Technician.

LINDENWOOD TO HOST HEC MEETING TODAY

How to get better quality teachers in today's schools is the subject of the monthly meeting of the Higher Education Center of St. Louis (HEC), scheduled at noon today at Ayres Cafeteria. Presidents and administrators of area institutions of higher learning and school districts are expected to attend the session, which is being hosted for the first time by Lindenwood. The HEC is composed of representatives of area colleges and universities, the St. Louis Board of Education and cooperating school districts of suburban St. Louis. Representing Lindenwood at the HEC session will be President Spainhower, Dean of Faculty Aaron Miller and Education Dept. Chairman Gene Henderson.

COLLEGE PROGRAM CITED IN NATIONAL MAGAZINE

A description of Lindenwood's preschool and kindergarten programs for gifted children appears in the November/December issue of INSTRUCTOR MAGAZINE, a national publication circulated to elementary classroom teachers and supervisors. The article quotes Nancy Polette, assistant professor of education and director of the Campus Lab School. "In the United States, the program is unique," she states, "because it is one of the very few preschool gifted programs that stresses integration of the arts and content areas as well as the development of higher level thinking skills." Founded in 1891, INSTRUCTOR MAGAZINE has a circulation of more than 300,000 each month.

MISSOURI SONGWRITER TO APPEAR NOVEMBER 20

Bob Dyer, a central Missouri singer and poet, will present a unique program November 20 at Lindenwood that will combine his knowledge of Missouri history with his abilities as a guitarist and songwriter. Open to the public without charge, the program will be at 3 p.m. at Butler Library.

The author of a published book of poems, Dyer recently released his first record album, RIVER OF THE BIG CANOES. The album contains several songs that are based on historic incidents and personages of Boonville, MO, and the "Boonslick" region of the state where Dyer was born and raised. Dyer holds bachelor's and master's degrees in English. Currently, he is an instructor at Kemper Military School & College in Boonville, where he serves also as the institution's historian and archivist. In addition to his numerous career pursuits, he has held such diverse jobs as a commercial artist, a furniture maker, a cook, a bookstore detective, carpenter, farm laborer, film maker and genealogist.
