New Telephone System Installed

All resident students now have telephone service in their rooms with the exception of students living in Eastlick and Watson Lodge, according to Julie Mueller, director of operations for Lindenwood.

Mueller also said the Southwestern Bell workers expect the new system to be completed by Nov. 9. This will include telephone service in the residence halls, administration buildings and a new campus switchboard.

Before this new system, Lindenwood had only 18 lines going in and out of the campus. Four of those lines were put aside for off-campus calling. This means only four people can be calling off-campus at the same time. With the installation of the new system, the campus will have the convenience of 56 lines for incoming, outgoing and long-distance service.

"Traffic studies will be done by a computer hooked into the phone system in Roemer which will enable us to tell how many times a person is getting a busy signal. If there seems to be a problem with students trying to get a line, more lines will be added; although the college does not expect there to be a problem," said Mueller.

For the remaining of this semester, students can pay a \$15 charge for off-campus calling. Next semester the full charge will be \$60. That cost is per telephone and can be split by the roommates. Students can receive calls from off-campus even if they don't have off-campus service.

A telephone directory will be compiled soon. If students do not want their name and number in the directory, they should contact Julie Mueller at extension 31. Otherwise, the number will be listed in the directory. The switchboard will be able to connect a call to a room by name without giving any numbers out.

The new telephones have call-waiting, call-forwarding and conference-call capability. The long distance carrier will be AT&T. However, long distance calls must be made collect or by credit card.

AERho To Co-host Regional Convention

This weekend Lindenwood College's chapter of the National Broadcasting Society - Alpha Epsilon Rho (AERho) will co-host a convention of two regions of the organization at Westport Plaza in St. Louis County.

Approximately 148 students from the Central Plains and Mid-East regions will join the convention. Lindenwood is from the Central Plain's region. Co-host of the convention with Lindenwood is Murry State (Kentucky) from the Mid-East region.

The convention will open Friday, Nov. 11 with a keynote address at the Sheraton. Also Friday, students from out-of state will tour local stations and tourist attractions around the St. Louis area. There will be about 90 students sight-seeing Friday afternoon.

Panel discussions and workshops will be held all day Saturday on various broadcast-related topics. These include broadcast sales, corporate video, broadcast news, broadcast promotions, radio production, and broadcast management. Also on Saturday there will be a session called Career Focus. Here students get an opportunity to discuss career opportunities with professionals.

The bulk of professionals involved in this convention are from the St. Louis market, according to officials in the organization. There will be about 25 professionals speaking and about ten people from the organization's executive committee and national advisory board.

Saturday evening a semi-formal banquet will be held.

The convention will close with a business meeting on Sunday, Nov. 11.

The National Broadcasting Society-AERho is an organization of broadcast students and professionals. James Wilson, advisor to

Lindenwood's chapter, said the students are considered the better broadcasting students at their institutions.

There will be sixteen schools with students attending the convention from eight states. Lindenwood's chapter has nine students attending, according to officers of the chapter.

Super Hoops Competition To Be Held

The Schick Super Hoops 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament will be on Lindenwood's campus in November. For the 1990-91 season, more than 200,000 students at nearly 800 colleges and universities around the country are registered to compete.

The program consists of three rounds. First, all participating schools conduct an on-campus 3-on-3 basketball tournament. Then, each championship team competes at one of 22 regional festivals against other schools. From there, the top two male and two best female teams in each region play for the regional championship at the nearby NBA arena.

The grand prize offers the top two male and female teams in each region the chance to compete for the championship at an NBA arena as part of an official NBA game. Other prizes include free NBA game tickets, trophies, athletic shoes, gym bags and Schick disposable razors.

The tournament is scheduled for Nov. 27 and 29 at 7 p.m. in Butler gym. Students interested in registering a team should contact John Mueller at room 115 in Butler Hall.

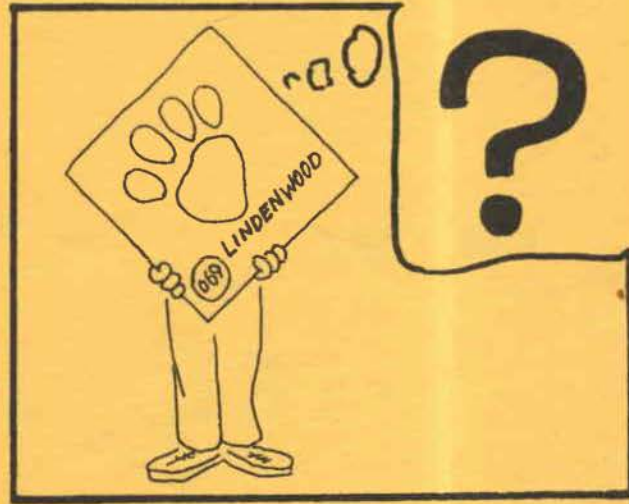
