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Final Exams on Saturday Causes Debate

Final Examination scheduling for Saturday, Dec. 15 has created a controversy among students and staff.

This decision was made by division deans and faculty with the approval of Dennis Spellman, president, because of the extended week in the semester and the increase in student population, said Arlene Taich, Dean of Academic Administration.

Taich says, "We needed more days for the exam schedule and this is the way we're able to get the number of days we needed."

Classes will be dismissed on Thursday, Dec. 13. "Faculty feels it's important for students to have a study day before exams," explains Taich.

Niki Juncker, associate theater professor, said she doesn't see the reasoning behind it.

Freshman Amy Baumann says, "It's going to cause scheduling problems.".

Sophomore Julie Tierney is on a "fixed work schedule. If I have to get off work, I will, but I'll end up paying for it in the long run."

Other students object to the decision because their religions observe the Sabbath on Saturday.

Ann Canale, associate English professor,

said she thinks individual teachers will probably have to make alternative plans for students with other commitments on Saturday. When asked her opinion about the situation, Canale answered "I think we can live with it."

Who's Who is Seeking Outstanding Students

Lindenwood has been asked to nominate a limited number of students to Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges, an annual directory of outstanding students.

Alan Meyers, Assistant Dean of Student Life will chair a committee which will decide on final nominations to be submitted to *Who's Who*. The committee will be composed of faculty members, students and staff.

Meyers has invited all Lindenwood students, faculty and staff to contribute suggestions as nominees. Nominees should exemplify high standards of scholastic ability, participation and leadership in academic and extracurricular activities, citizenship and service to the college and potential for future achievement.

Nominations must be submitted with brief accounts of supporting reasons why they were made and they must be signed. According to Meyers, self-nominations are perfectly acceptable. He will be accepting nominations until Friday, November 30, 1990.

Education Division Offers New Opportunities to Future Teachers

Four new certifications in teacher education are being added to the Lindenwood Education Division program.

The new certifications are in Teacher of the Gifted, School Psychological Examiner, Elementary or Secondary School Counseling and Physical Education.

The certification for teachers of the gifted was approved this year by the State Board of Education. Most school districts have programs for gifted students, but now certification is required. Those who have been teaching will only need minor course work to complete their certificates. Others must first have a certificate in another area and then add the courses required for gifted certification.

Lindenwood has offered courses for teachers of the gifted for a dozen years under the leadership of Nancy Polette and Mary Gismegian. This certification program, now under the direction of Dr. Jane Aucutt, blends a series of courses into a complete program to prepare teachers to organize, teach in, and evaluate programs for gifted students.

The school psychological examiner's certificate requires a valid Missouri teaching certificate plus 24 credits in appropriate courses.

The certificate for counseling also requires a state teaching certificate, along with a Master of Arts (48 credit hours) to complete certification.

Physical education is being offered because of the large number of athletes interested in earning a teaching certificate. Programs for coaching and athletic training are also available.

Students can begin work on these programs in the spring semester.

New Language Club Forms

The Modern Language Department has formed the Lindenwood College Language Club.

The Language Club has met three times this term to elect its officers, set up a schedule of events, to discuss recruiting new members and to celebrate Halloween.

The officers of the Language Club are Heidi Hafer, President, Nancy Schumacker, Vice President, Elizabeth Renaud, Secretary and Kim LaBelle, Treasurer.

Scheduled events are as follows: the showing of a French film with discussion and refreshments after; a fundraising bake sale to assist eligible students with textbook costs and caroling in Spanish and French during the Christmas Walk.

Language and non-language students are encouraged to become members of the Language Club. To do so, one may contact an officer or Anthony Perrone or William Perry, the faculty advisors.

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KCLC Membership Drive Exceeds Goal

According to Rich Reighard, the station Operations Manager, approximately 75 students participated in this semesters's drive. The management hopes to see just as much participation in the upcoming toy drive in December.

After a scoreless 15 minute period, the teams switched sides and squared off again. With 9:26 remaining in the second overtime,
