## Grant Received to Search for Wreck of Steamboat

The Department of Anthropology and Archaeological Research Program is receiving a grant from the Missouri Humanities Council to [survey for the wreck site of the Far West](#) - the steamboat that carried U.S. Army survivors of the Battle of the Little Bighorn from the field to Fort Abraham Lincoln. In 1884, it wrecked in the Missouri River in the vicinity of St. Charles and

Hazelwood after a long career as a packet boat. Dr. Douglas Scott, one of the leading experts on the Battle of the Little Bighorn, will present information about the history and archaeology of the battle and *Far West*'s role in the aftermath of the battle.

## Kichkha and Anderson Publish Journal Article

Dr. Areerat Kichkha, Assistant Professor of Economics and School of Accelerated Degree Program Department Chair of Business Administration, and Richard Anderson, Hammond Institute Senior Research Fellow, recently published "Replication, Meta-analysis, and Research Synthesis in Economics" in *American Economic Review*. The paper emphasizes that replicability is essential to assure the scientific integrity of empirical economic research, and suggests that researchers take caution when addressing metadata analysis as a complementary tool because empirical studies in economics seldom are created via experiments.

## Kichkha Presents at ACBSP National Conference

Dr. Areerat Kichkha, Assistant Professor of Economics and School of Accelerated Degree Program Department Chair of Business Administration, presented *Is Less More? Comparing Student Performance in Traditional, Hybrid, and Online Courses* at the Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) national conference.

The study compares student performance in sampled traditional, hybrid and online courses in economics to explore whether these different instructional methods lead to similar learning outcomes, and what assessment criteria we may use to be sure that these teaching methods deliver the same outcomes. The presentation is an extension of a research project started by Kichkha, Mike Mathea, Chair of Economics Department in the Plaster School of Business and Entrepreneurship, and Adjunct Instructor Richard Anderson.



### Aubuchon to Co-Host Webinar

Gregory Aubuchon, School of Accelerated Degree Program Director – Undergraduate Economics and Finance, has been invited by the Missouri Bar to co-host a [webinar titled “2017 Damages, Interest & Attorney Fees”](#). The webinar addresses critical theories of damages and provides practical insight on how to approach damage issues at each stage of the case. Aubuchon's background in forensic economics and law uniquely qualify him to lead this important webinar.
