SADDAM HUSSEIN FEATURED IN DOCUMENTARY

KETC Channel 9 will probe into the world of Saddam Hussein Thursday, Dec. 6 at 7 p.m. in a documentary called Saddam Hussein: Define the World.

KETC reports the program explains how the Iraqi army managed to overcome Kuwait in just two days. It also profiles the Iraqi President, who has assumed omnipotence in his country by using his army's power to purge opposition, according to KETC.

The documentary examines Hussein's decision to use chemical gas during the Gulf war, his execution of British and Swedish journalists for alleged spying activities and his plans to build a nuclear armory.

The documentary is a production of ITN, Independent Televison News. The show is one-half hour long.

WHEN THE BLUES PERSIST. . .

Blue has described more than the sky for you for several weeks. You can't sleep; you can't eat; you can't concentrate; you are bored out of your mind; and you can't stop crying. You may feel you're going crazy.

You're not. These are all symptoms of a disease practically as common as the cold - Depression. This is not to say it is not far more serious than the common cold. If not treated, it can be emotionally and physically disabling. If a person feels too hopeless and overwhelmed, he or she may decide there is only one way out: Suicide.

Depression is a treatable disease. It is caused by a chemical imbalance in the brain. When one or two of the chemicals in the brain that carry messages across nerve endings become deficient, various kinds of loss of motion or function can occur. Another thing that occurs is depression.

There are various forms of depression. According to the National Institute of Mental Health's Depression Awareness, Recognition and Treatment (D/ART) Program, some people only have one episode in a lifetime, while others may have recurring symptoms.

According to D/ART some have symptoms that are so severe, they are unable to function normally. And others have continuing symptoms that may not interfere directly with everyday activities, but keep them from feeling well.

A third severe type of depression is bi-polar, or

manic depression. In this, the person feels extremities in emotion. He or she may feel ecstatic for a while, and then suddenly crash to feelings of hopelessness or grief.

Some symptoms of depression, I have gathered from various sources and experts are as follows:

- * FEELING PERSISTENTLY SAD OR UNHAPPY FOR A PROLONGED PERIOD OF TIME
- * FEELING TIRED OFTEN, EVEN AFTER A PERIOD OF RES T OR INACTIVITY
- * NOT BEING ABLE TO SLEEP AT NIGHT, OR NOT SLEEPING WELL - EVEN IF TIRED
- * SLEEPING FOR PROLONGED PERIODS OF TIME - STAYING IN BED ALL DAY
- * INABILITY TO CONCENTRATE IN CLASS OR AT WORK/ FALLING GRADES
- * LOSS OF INTEREST IN ACTIVI-TIES YOU ENJOY
- * LOSS OF SEX DRIVE
- CRYING OFTEN, SOMETIMES FOR NO APPARENT REASON
- * MOOD SWINGS, IRRITABILITY
- * CHANGES IN APPETITE OR DRASTIC CHANGES IN EATING HABITS
- * PAIN IN THE BACK, STOMACH, OR ANYWHERE ELSE WHICH MAY BE SEVERE, AND IS REAL
- * THOUGHTS OF SUICIDE OR DEATH

PERUVIAN JOURNALISTS RECEIVE AWARD

Two Peruvian journalists are being brought to St. Louis by the United Nations Association of St. Louis for an award on Sunday, Dec. 9.

Both are credited for exposing human rights abuses by the Maoist guerrillas and Peruvian authorities in the ten-year civil war in Peru. Reporter Abilio Arroyo and Editor Enrique Zileri are from the newsmagazine Caretas. Both have been threatened repeatedly. A colleague was murdered and a photographer from the magazine was badly wounded.

The Committee to Protect Journalists has brought the Peruvians' cause before the Organization of American States' Human Rights Court, seeking a petition establishing witness protection throughout Latin America. The Society for Professional Journalists and other press groups are also backing this petition.

A ceremony will be held at Washington University's Graham Chapel at 4:30 p.m. that Sunday. It will be conducted in honor of Human Rights day which is celebrated on Dec. 10

A reception will follow the ceremony immediately at the Stix International House. Both ceremony and reception are free and open to the public.

Speakers will include former senator Thomas F. Eagleton and Editor of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, William F. Woo.

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
