MAJOR FUNDS DRIVE LAUNCHED TO RAISE \$10 MILLION

The Lindenwood College Board of Directors has approved a major funds drive designed to generate \$10 million in pledges and contributions within the next three years. The campaign will be spearheaded by Robert F. Hyland, chairman of the board of directors, and S. Lee Kling, treasurer of the 21-member board. In announcing details of the campaign, both said the board "will play an active leadership role in the \$10 million campaign," the most ambitious in the college's 157-year history.

The major funds drive expects to raise \$8 million for facilities development and campus expansion; \$1.4 million for student development, including \$1 million for leadership scholarship awards to deserving students; and \$500,000 for community development, including programs in basic skill development, value orientation and work-service preparation. The \$8 million in facilities development includes the construction of a \$5 million Renaissance Center, an athletic/theatre/community complex, and \$3 million for major renovation and repair of historic buildings and facilities on the 142-acre campus.

"Based upon a more active leadership role by the Lindenwood College Board of Directors, the new and dynamic presidency of Jim Spainhower and the success of our current Annual Funds Drive, we are very optimistic that \$10 million can be secured from private and corporate sources in the next three years to meet the college's needs for capital expenditures and student development," Hyland said.

The \$10 million major funds campaign is a multifaceted one that will involve not only the board of directors but Lindenwood alumni throughout the country as well as major businesses, corporations and foundations in the St. Charles and St. Louis metro areas.

KCLC-FM RADIO RAISES NEARLY \$2,500

Lindenwood's community radio station, KCLC-FM, has received contributions and pledges totaling nearly \$2,500 from its community fund-raising drive last month. The event, called the "KCLC Christmas Gift Exchange," presented gifts to those who donated to the event. Gifts were supplied by the college and area merchants. Money received from the campaign will be used for the station's programming costs and equipment acquisition, said Jim Wilson, faculty member and KCLC-FM general manager.

'BASKETBALL GUIDE' IN NATIONAL NAIA COMPETITION

Lindenwood College's "1983-84 Basketball Guide" is among entries in a national publication contest sponsored by the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The 16-page guide, the first for the college, contains facts and photos of both the Lindenwood Lions and Lady Lions, a basketball scoresheet, coaching philosophies, college facts, the teams' 1983-84 schedules, information on the coaches and coaching staff and a photo of the Lindenwood Cheerleaders. Available to participants at each home game, the guide was coordinated by the men's and women's coaches and prepared by Randy L. Wallick of the Office of News & Public Information. Contest winners in the NAIA competition will be announced this spring during the 1984 NAIA National Convention in Kansas City.

The St. Louis exhibit, sponsored by the Arts Coordinating Council, continues through February 18. Hours for the Lindenwood exhibit are from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 1-4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.
