Scheidegger Center for the Arts provides an unparalleled experience in the arts and entertainment.

Home to Lindenwood University's School of Fine and Performing Arts, the J. Scheidegger Center for the Arts features regular performances and exhibits by students in the theatre, dance, art, fashion, technical theatre, and music departments. Venues include the Broadway-style Lindenwood Theater, the Emerson Black Box Theater, and the Boyle Family Gallery. Also included are two dance studios, a costume shop, the Charter Communications High-Definition Television Studio, several piano studios and private music rooms, separate choral and orchestra halls, and many other amenities for the students and community.

BIOS

Betsy Brandt (faculty) Brandt's interdisciplinary point of view is informed by her professional work as a dancer, choreographer, teacher, dramaturge, and writer in the fields of dance studies, film theory, and contemporary art. She earned her MFA in dance from University of Illinois: Urbana Champaign, where she was also served as teaching assistant and adjunct faculty, and she received her BA in dance and political history from Kenyon College. Other current faculty appointments include Saint Louis University and Webster University. Recent professional projects include dramaturay for Jennifer Monson's Bessie-nominated Live Dancing Archive (2013), a dance-film installation in collaboration with Tere O'Connor at CCS Bard in 2012, and an upcoming dance-for-camera project in collaboration with Sara Hook that will premiere later in 2014. She has also danced in works by internationally-renowned choreographers Victoria Marks, Lisa Race, Kim Epifano, and Bebe Miller. Brandt presented her scholarly work at the Congress on Research in Dance 2013 Special Topics conference and the University of Illinois's 2012 Beyond Utopia conference. Here in St. Louis, Brandt was the Co-Artistic Director of the aTrek Dance Collective from 2003-2009 and currently serves on the Board of Directors for Leverage Dance Theater. Brandt also worked in arts administration and program development with the Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis and Young Audiences of St. Louis. Her research and choreographic work has been supported by UIUC's Creative and Performing Arts Fellowship (2009-2012), the Mary Elizabeth Hamstrom Award (2010), the Patricia Knowles Graduate Travel Award (2011), and the Moe Family Award (2012).

Danielle Buttram (senior) Danielle Buttram is a candidate for a Bachelor of Arts degree in dance in August 2014, completing her degree in three years. She is a Lee's Summit native relocated to St. Charles to come to Lindenwood University. She has been dancing for 18 years and hopes to continue after graduation pursuing her dreams of dancing with companies and cruise lines. After hopefully traveling for a few years, she has the dream of owning her own dance studio based in or around the Kansas

City area, sharing her passion with hopeful children. She has had the opportunity to be selected for a piece restaged by dancer Kile Hotchkiss from Keigwin + Co called "Runaway." She has also performed with St. Louis' company Leverage Dance Theater as a guest performer in its production of *Am I the Only One*.

Sarah Chauvin (senior) Sarah Chauvin began her study of dance at the age of 3 and has taken every opportunity since to continue making dance an integral part of her life. She graduates this year with degrees in dance and arts management in dance, and she hopes to continue working with dance throughout her life. Her favorite styles include modern and tap, though she enjoys every style she has experienced. Chauvin's background accomplishments include performances as dance captain in high school musicals, at Six Flags, at the Muny, with Moscow Ballet, and at various studios where she has also choreographed for competition. This is the third concert at Lindenwood for which she has choreographed. Her current work comes from a reflection on stewardship of the earth, in which she is deeply interested. Chauvin would love to one day combine her passions for dance and conservation to make the world a better place.

Kari Ann Davis (faculty) Kari Ann Davis serves as adjunct faculty in dance at the St. Charles and Belleville campuses. Davis received her BA in dance and her MA in teaching from Lindenwood University, and she is also certified to teach dance in the K-12 setting. Between her undergraduate and graduate studies, Davis spent two years performing professionally with the Modern American Dance Company, where she had the opportunity to work with many nationally and internationally acclaimed choreographers. Here, she also spent much of her time in the elementary education setting teaching children creative movement styles as part of MADCO's outreach program. In addition to performing, Davis has modeled for St. Louis Bride Magazine and Dancewear Solutions, and she has choreographed for local universities, industrial flash mobs, and television commercials. Davis' choreography has been showcased at local St. Louis dance festivals, and she has also taught classes at regional dance conferences, in addition to, teaching master classes within the community.

Ali Duffy (guest artist) Ali Duffy is an assistant professor of dance at Texas Tech University and the artistic director of Flatlands Dance Theatre (http://www.flatlandsdance.org). She holds an MFA in choreography from UNC Greensboro and a BA in dance from UNC Charlotte and is working toward a PhD at Texas Woman's University. She has been awarded the Texas Tech New Faculty Award, recognition from the Mortar Board as an outstanding frofessor, and has received multiple grants from area foundations and Texas Tech to present her creative and scholarly work. Duffy has toured internationally with Stiletto Entertainment and Holland America

Line and has performed in American Dance Festival's Acts to Follow, Central Park's The Gates exhibit, the NC Dances Festival, Houston Fringe, {254} Festival, Choreo Collective, PILOT Festival, and Charlotte Symphony Orchestra concerts and has also been invited to perform the works of Donald McKayle, Patti Colombo, Martha Williams, BJ Sullivan, Ann Dils, Duane Cyrus, Delia Neil, Till Schmidt-Rimpler, and Posy Knight, among others. She has been commissioned for residencies and performances with professional companies and universities in New York, Virginia, North Carolina, Nevada, Oklahoma, and Colorado. Duffy is also an active writer, presenting her scholarly research internationally and publishing in academic journals and texts. She sits on the Dance Critics Association Board of Directors and serves as the organization's scholarship chair.

Amy Gammon (senior) Amy Gammon plans on graduating this May with a degree in dance. She has been dancing since the age of 3 and has been teaching dance for the past four years. She has choreographed numerous dances with the Performing Arts Centre and works with the Dance Company of St. Charles. After graduating, she hopes to one day own her own dance studio and teach in the St. Charles region.

Heather Hindes (senior) Heather Hindes has previously choreographed for the Dance Artist Showcase 2013 and the 2012 and 2013 Student Dance Concerts. Her collaboration with DuVaul Gamble, " $\Delta \uparrow XO \leftarrow L2$ " appeared in the 2013 Gala Concert at the American College Dance Festival, Central Conference. Hindes recently performed as a student apprentice with Leverage Dance Theater in its site-specific dance concert, Am I the Only One, taking place in the 173-year-old St. Francis Xavier College Church. Hindes plans to continue choreographing and performing after graduating this May with a BA in dance.

Deanne Leatherberry (senior) After networking and exploring career options for the last year, Deanne Elise Leatherberry. "Dee," has decided to audition to join a cruise-line performance group and develop dance aspects for a range of musicians' videographies. Her ultimate goal is to build a company of her own whose foundation is built on the enrichment of culture and the advocacy for human rights.

Sara Mayfield (senior) Sara Mayfield will be graduating in the summer. She has been performing since she was 6, starting as a gymnast. She soon joined the competing dance team at her studio and developed a passion for dance, which became her one true love. She has a goal of working in the cruise ship entertainment industry. When she began at Lindenwood, she developed a very painful joint disease, which she said tested her love and relationship with dance, though she said dance gets her through her pain every day. "It gives me life and keeps my passion alive," she said. "Every

day is a new challenge, but I feel like I can get through anything as long as I can dance. With every struggle I endure, and dance is always there to pull me back into happiness again. I owe my life, my happiness, my hope, and my strength to dance." Heidi Morgan (senior) Heidi Rai Morgan is a four-year Lindenwood University student graduating in May of 2014 with a BA in dance and non-profit administration with an emphasis in business. Morgan has grown up dancing while training for many different styles and performing for her high school dance team and studio competition team. Her performance credits include ballets, musicals, dinner theatre, television commercials, and even Six Flags Productions. Some of Strzelec's favorite roles are Adelaide (Guys and Dolls), Anna (The Kind and I), Roxie (Chicago), and dancing as a "Friend" and a "Wili" in her favorite ballet, Giselle.

Tricia Zweier (faculty) Tricia Zweier is an educator, choreographer, and performer with a cross-disciplinary interest in dance and kinesiology. After earning a Master of Science in kinesiology and a Master of Fine Arts in dance from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, she relocated to Missouri and is in her third year as an assistant professor of dance at Lindenwood University, teaching mostly contemporary and jazz techniques, dance history, dance & technology, and dance science courses. Zweier danced with the Atlantic City Ballet (formerly Atlantic Contemporary Ballet Theatre), then toured internationally in the cruise line industry as a lead dancer and dance captain. Her modern dance performance credits include the works of Hanya Holm, Merce Cunningham, and Martha Graham. She has also had the pleasure of working with more contemporary artists, including Sean Curran, Mark Dendy, and Nejla Yatkin. Most recently, she performed with Flatlands Dance Theatre in Lubbock, Texas, and with St. Louis's own Leverage Dance Theatre in the Dance St. Louis production, New Dance Horizons II. Zweier is a member of the Dance Kinesiology Teachers' Group, the Congress on Research in Dance (CORD), and the International Association of Dance Medicine and Science (IADMS).


