LINDENWOOD PLANS DEVELOPMENT OF LAND

Lindenwood and the Episcopal Presbyterian Foundation for the Aging in St. Louis (EPFA) are planning development of a portion of the college's land on the northwestern boundary of campus. The EPFA has an option until April 28 to purchase 30 acres of an 80-acre undeveloped parcel for construction of a retirement center and residential complex. The proposed complex would be similar to facilities currently operated and owned by the EPFA - Tower Grove Manor in south St. Louis and Gatesworth Manor in St. Louis.

In announcing the proposed plans, President James I. Spainhower said the college is reviewing the best utilization of the land "not only for future expansion needs of Lindenwood but for the total benefit of St. Charles." Future expansion plans and long-range feasibility studies indicate Lindenwood would utilize only a small portion of the 80 acres, "perhaps as few as 20," Spainhower said. "We are a small liberal arts college and we intend to remain that way," the president added.

The 30 acres considered for purchase and development are part of an 80-acre tract of non-utilized land located between Boschert Creek and Duchesne Road.

COLVIN TO HEAD ST. CHARLES CAMPAIGN

Robert H. Colvin of St. Charles, director of deferred giving at Lindenwood, has been named chairman of the St. Charles Fund-Raising Campaign, replacing past-chairman William O. Mullins of the Lindenwood College Board of Overseers. Mullins is credited with spearheading local efforts that have raised nearly \$75,000 toward's the college's \$700,000 goal as part of the Annual Funds Drive.

A past president of the St. Charles Chamber of Commerce, Colvin retired from J.C. Penney Co. in 1974 after serving 38 years in management positions. A former chairman of Lindenwood's Community Support Campaign, he served in a part-time capacity as director of development for the college between 1975-79. He was appointed director of deferred giving last November.

'COKE NIGHT' TO FEATURE BASKETBALL DOUBLEHEADER

The Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of St. Louis has donated more than 100 prizes and promotional products that will be given away to those attending tonight's doubleheader basketball game featuring the men's and women's teams. Under the direction of Coach Christina Storey, the women's team competes in a match against Maryville College beginning at 6 p.m. It will be followed by an 8 p.m. game between St. Louis Boys Club and the Lindenwood Lions, coached by Bob Benben. Admission to both games is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children; Lindenwood students with proper I.D. are admitted free.

Prizes to be given away during half-time celebrations at both games include Coca-Cola duffel bags, six packs of Coke and Diet Coke, T-shirts and keychains. Members of the Lindenwood College Cheerleaders and the Dance Squad will award prizes in random drawings and to winners of athletic events scheduled during halftimes. The Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of St. Louis has a past history of support and sponsorship of athletic events and programs at Lindenwood.

ROTARY CLUB ESTABLISHES SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The St. Charles Rotary Club has established a full-tuition scholarship for an incoming freshman at Lindenwood in memory of the Rev. C. Eugene Conover, Lindenwood professor emeritus who died last summer at the age of 79.

According to Raymond E. Botz, club president, the recipient should be a freshman in true financial need who resides in St. Charles County and who applies for this fall's semester at Lindenwood. "Ideally, the student should have an interest in pursuing studies in philosophy, art or the humanities, in conformance with Dr. Conover's lifelong commitment to higher learning," he said.

The Rotary Club Scholarship Committee will choose the individual to receive the award, which is valued at \$4,600 annually, based upon recommendations from the college's Financial Aid Office. GUITARIST BREZNIKAR TO APPEAR FEBRUARY 19

Joseph Breznikar, a classical guitarist who has earned an international reputation as a superb concert performer and virtuoso, will appear in concert February 19 at 3 p.m. at Sibley Hall Chapel. Sponsored by the Lectures & Concerts Committee, the event is free to all students, faculty and staff as well as the St. Charles community.

Breznikar's concert appearances have taken him across North and South America and the Far East. His recent album for Coronet Records, entitled "The Contemporary Classical Guitar - Music from Two Continents," has been awarded esteemed praise from critics and features the first recordings of new works that will be performed at the Lindenwood concert. Adding to his recognition are his successful publications of transcriptions for guitar works of the Renaissance and Baroque periods by well-known classical guitarists. Currently, he is on the faculty at Southern Illinois University, serving as assistant professor of music.
