Her exhibition shows plastic bags caught in trees and bushes fluttering like tattered veils, photo transfers on rice paper, cyanotype rain impressions and even a photograph buried in Forest Park for a year! Critics describe her work as hauntingly beautiful and an archeological quest for environmental justice.

This event is capacity controlled with no more than 8 people in the gallery at a time, masks required and social distancing. Refreshments will be served. The exhibit runs Nov. 22 - Dec. 29. 
