

COMMUNICATIONS DAY BRINGS MEDIA PROFESSIONALS

Dave Murray, chief meteorologist for KTVI-Channel 2, and five other St. Louis area media professionals are scheduled to appear on a panel at Lindenwood College's St. Charles campus on Saturday, March 24.

Lindenwood College's communications program and the Lindenwood chapter of the National Broadcasting Society - Alpha Epsilon Rho - are hosting the seventh annual Communications Career Day at which these guests will appear.

Students from 143 area high schools have been invited to attend, according to Jim Wilson, dean of Humanities and head of the Communications program at Lindenwood. However, students from Lindenwood and other colleges are welcome.

This year presents two firsts for the program, Wilson said. Students are being invited on an individual basis to come on a Saturday instead of whole classes coming as a field trip during the school week. Wilson said he hopes this will eliminate students coming just for the field trip and bring in students who are really interested in communications.

Also this year, there will be a video presentation for the students to view along with the panel discussion. The presentation will show the panelists' work places, said Wilson.

The panel will include Randy Karraker, a sports producer for KMOX radio and the CBS radio network; Steve Immer, a producer of special events for Busch Creative Services Corp.; and Kathy Leonard, public

relations director for Lambert Airport. Also scheduled to appear are Gordon Atkins, a sales executive for KMJM radio, and Roy Sykes, photo editor for the St. Charles County Journals.

The panel will discuss various specialized fields of communications as well as job opportunities in the future, Wilson said.

The program will be held from 10 a.m. until noon in Young Hall Auditorium. The auditorium doors will open at 9:30 a.m. and refreshments will be served until 10. Admission is free of charge.

A new petition, R.M. 2493, has been introduced by a woman named Madalyn Murry O'Hair, that would eliminate all of this and much more. LINDENWOOD NUT TREES ARRIVE

"The new nut trees will also be a major source of food for our campus birds and wildlife," Interim President Dennis Spellman said in a press release from LC's Public Relations office. "I think the red, brown, gray, and even the black squirrel may enjoy the nuts."

Yet another academic department experienced a move to a different location. The social sciences department was moved from the second floor of Roemer Hall to various locations in Young Hall. Dr. Edith Graber, who will be retiring at the end of the semester, will remain in her office in Roemer until she leaves. Dr. Judith McMahon has moved to 212 Young Hall. Dr. James Evans' office will be in 108 Young Hall and Dr. Raymond Scupin will be located on the fourth floor of Young Hall. The social sciences department was moved to make room for the education department, which will be relocated to Roemer. The education department is currently in Butler Hall, which is being renovated to become a student center.

The faculty members within the social sciences department are unhappy with the move. According to Dr. McMahon, the whole process lacked planning and organization. Their department was moved on March 2 and they still did not have telephones on March 12. The faculty is also upset because all of their equipment is in one office, therefore, duplicate keys will be needed for all faculty using the equipment and for student assistants. McMahon said she feels this inconvenience is just one of many caused by the move. She pointed out that the faculty are all on different floors, Dr. Evans' office is crowded with equipment, and they have no room for student assistants to work. She said they aired their complaints to administration but got no response.

As Lindenwood continues its climb out of financial problems, Interim President Dennis Spellmann has taken yet another step to insure financial stability. Spellmann has named David M. Kandel as controller and chief finance officer at Lindenwood.

Kandel received his B.S. from Fairleigh Dickenson University in Teaneck, New Jersey in 1970 and is a Certified Public Accountant.

Prior to coming to Lindenwood, Kandel was the Business Manager for The St. Louis Conservatory and Schools for the Arts. He was responsible for preparing cash flow and budget projections and preparing all workpapers for audit. He also reviewed and approved all purchase orders, monitored all departments' budgets, collected tuition, deposited receipts, disbursed funds and managed the endowment fund.

Kandel is also a member of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, Missouri Society of Certified Public Accountants, the Benjamin Franklin Masonic Lodge 642 and the Jewish War Veterans Post 644.

A Lindenwood news release quotes Spellmann as saying, "David has a solid background in accounting and business management, and his expertise will be a definite asset to the Lindenwood team."

Kandel said he is happy to be here and that "the campus is beautiful." He sees his greatest challenges as becoming familiar with the operating system and getting to know the people.

SHUTS OUT TWICE

On a chilly and cloudy day, Lindenwood College started its baseball season. They lost a doubleheader against Missouri Baptist, on March 6.

In the first game they were shut out in five innings 11-0. The right-handed starting pitcher for Lindenwood, Monte Beatty, allowed ten hits, including three home runs.

Missouri Baptist scored two runs in the first inning after C. Robinson, third baseman, singled to center field and the designated hitter, S. Sadler, hit a home run to right field.

In the bottom of the third, Missouri Baptist scored six runs. The leading hitter and right fielder, E. Ross, hit a double to center field. T. Kirt, center fielder, hit a fly to center field for the first out, C. Robinson was walked and S. Sadler, hit a double to center field. C. Wiesner, catcher, hit a fly ball to shortstop, with two downs, J. Mamayek, shortstop, and S. Penning, first baseman singled to right field. After the consecutive singles, G. Turner, left fielder, hit a home run to left field, and put the score 8-0 in the bottom of the third.

In the bottom of the fourth Missouri Baptist scored three more runs. With two outs, and two men on bases, S. Sadler hit his second home run of the game, this time to left field.

In the top of the fifth, the last chance for Lindenwood, James Masseur hit a fly to right field. Jeff Burton struck out and Greg Kerner ground to the pitcher.

In the second game it was the same story. Lindenwood left handed-pitcher Shawn Bond allowed 9 hits and 12 runs. Missouri Baptist scored one run in the first inning, three in the second and eight in the third.

In the top of the second with two outs, Mike Huber, catcher, hit the only single for Lindenwood College in both games.

Lindenwood players and coach knew that those games against Baptist were not easy. "We are going to struggle against them. This team is a top ranking team in the nation," coach Art Siebels said two week before the games.

Mike Huber said "We came in with a negative attitude. We just thought we did not have any chance and that kind of got us down."

Right now Lindenwood has a record of one victory and seven losses. The next scheduled home game is on March 25 against Tarkio.
