ST. LOUIS BRASS QUINTET TO PERFORM - The St. Louis Brass Quintet will perform in concert February 3 at 7 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre. Part of the Visiting Artists Series, the event is sponsored by the college's Lectures & Concerts Committee and funded in part by a grant from the Missouri Arts Council. Tickets, priced at \$5@, are available at the Box Office in Roemer Hall.

Inspired by the rebirth of chamber music for brass, the St. Louis Quintet was formed 20 years ago. Since then, it has played concerts for audiences of all ages at public events, colleges, universities and community groups throughout the United States. The group plans to bring to the Lindenwood campus the vital energy of brass music. It will perform, on a high artistic level, the music of major composers from the Renaissance and Baroque eras to the 20th century. A highlight of the concert will be a demonstration of how each of the instruments - trumpets, French horn, bass trombone and tuba - work, including a lighthearted presentation that will feature solo performances by quintet members.

Remaining concerts in this year's Visiting Artists Series include the St. Louis Black Repertory Company on March 3 and Flamenco guitarist Ronald Radford in concert March 31.

ART EXHIBIT THROUGH FEBRUARY 24 - A collection of textiles, called "Pa ndau," will be on exhibit January 27 through February 24 at the Harry D. Hendren Gallery in the FAB. Pa ndau (pronounced "pahn dau") is an ancient form of needlework distinctive to the cultures of Laos, southern China and southeast Asia. It combines embroidery, applique and batik techniques, and it often depicts intricate patterns of flowers, abstract and geometrical forms. Entirely handmade, Pa ndau originally applied only to clothing but is found now in wall hangings, bedspreads and pillow covers.

The exhibit will feature 50 different textiles, all of which will be for sale after the showing. A former reception, open to students, faculty and staff, is scheduled February 1 from 4-8 p.m. in the gallery. Hours of the exhibit are from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 1-4 p.m. on weekends. There's no charge for admission or the reception.

POSITION AVAILABLE IN PRESIDENT'S OFFICE - Jane Pace, an employee of Lindenwood for more than four years, has resigned her position as secretary to President James I. Spainhower to relocate in Dallas, TX. Her resignation, effective February 15, creates an available opening for the secretarial position. Applications will be taken until Jan. 28.
