STUDENT CONVCCATION THIS AFTERNOON - Lindenwood students are invited to join faculty and staff members in meeting members of the Lindenwood College Board of Overseers during a special convocation today from 4:35-5 p.m. in Young Hall Auditorium.

According to Ed Watkins, vice-president for institutional development and liaison to the board of overseers, the purpose of the convocation is to make board members more aware of the special needs of the college. Student, honor, service and athletic groups will be recognized at this afternoon's session where they will be able to stress the importance of board support in such areas as scholarship funding, the athletics programs, residential life support and student activities, Watkins said.

The 21-member board is an advisory body to the Lindenwood College Board of Directors, which will meet on campus tomorrow at 10 a.m. Members of the board of overseers, several of whom have voting rights on the board of directors, serve for three-year terms. The deadline for submission of editorial copy is 2 pm Monday prior to Tuesday's publication; copy should be sent to the Public Relations Office, #6 Roemer Hall. <u>COMMUNITY RECITAL SET FRIDAY</u> - "Bach as Transcriber, Arranger and Adapter" is the title of a recital scheduled Friday at 8 p.m. in Sibley Hall Chapel, featuring organist Ansley Fleming. The concert is free of charge to students, faculty and staff as well as the community.

Fleming, who is pursuing a doctorate degree in organ performance, serves as Director of Music for the Evangelical United Church of Christ in Webster Groves and as an instructor for both the Sacred Music Institute and Lindenwood CASA.

<u>HIGHEST SPRING ENROLLMENT SET</u> - Lindenwood's total enrollment for the current semester is 1,847 students, the highest spring enrollment in the college's history. In announcing the record spring enrollment, President Spainhower said the total headcount represented a six percent increase from the 1,743 students enrolled for the fall, 1984, semester.

"We are extremely pleased with our spring figures," he said, "since, traditionally, colleges and universities throughout the country experience a six to 10 percent decline in spring enrollment from the fall term."

Spainhower attributed the record enrollment to increases in Lindenwood's MBA programs both on and off campus and to the recent program between LCIE and American Telephone & Telegraph Information Systems that provides both undergraduate and graduate instruction in business administration to AT&T employees at on-site locations throughout the metro area. He also credited the 104-student increase from the fall to intensified activities by the Admissions Office and to increased marketing and recruiting efforts by Lindenwood.

The highest enrollment in the 158-year history of Lindenwood was in the fall of 1982 when 1,985 students were enrolled.

<u>'BLACK HISTORY MONTH' EVENTS</u> - As part of this month's observance of "Black History Month," Lindenwood will present a free poetry reading Thursday at 7 p.m. in Sibley Hall Chapel, featuring well-known St. Louisian Shirley LeFlore, a poet, playwright and singer. LeFlore has read before cultural, educational, social and religious groups throughout the St. Louis area in addition to Chicago, Kansas City, New York City and Washington, DC. In recent years, she has collaborated on artistic or educational projects with many nationally and internationally-celebrated artists, and she has been a frequent performer and guest on radio and television.

During her appearance at Lindenwood, she will be accompanied by saxophonist John Norment. She is one of several guest artists on campus this month to take part in the month-long celebration of black cultural heritagc. The poetry reading is open to all without charge.

Other events include the St. Louis Black Repertory Co. and its presentation of "Sty of the Blind Pig" at 3 p.m. March 3 in Jelkyl Theatre. Tickets for this exclusive engagement are on sale at the Box Office in Roemer Hall from noon to 5 p.m. Monday - Friday.

Also on March 3 as part of "Black History Month," the college will present a free exhibit of sculpture, drawings and paintings, entitled "Southern Folk Images." Continuing through March 27, the free exhibit will be in the Hendren Gallery of the FAB.

THESIS BINDING PRICES INCREASED - Janice Czapla, acting head librarian, reports that the cost of thesis binding has been increased to \$12 per copy, effective February 1, due to an increase in charges to Butler Library by vendors.


