Alsobrook Named Dean of Online Programs, Lively Assumes Deanship at School of AMC

Reflecting an increased focus on Lindenwood University's online degree programs, Dr. Joe Alsobrook, former dean of the School of Arts, Media, and Communications, has been named dean of online programs. In a corresponding move, Dr. Jason Dude Lively, previously associate dean for the School of Arts, Media, and Communications, has been named dean of the school.

Alsobrook has been in education since 1988 and has been with Lindenwood since 2004. Alsobrook was the first dean of the School of Arts, Media, and Communications, which was created from the combination of the former schools of Communications and Fine and Performing Arts, prior to which Alsobrook served as dean of the latter.

Alsobrook has received multiple awards for mentorship, scholarship, and impact on student success and is certified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. He has published three textbooks, has spoken throughout the United States, and has extensive experience developing and teaching online courses. In August, he will present a session on course design at the 35th Annual Distance Teaching and Learning Conference in Madison, Wis.

"I look forward to working with faculty and staff across the Lindenwood system on our online offerings and enrollment," Alsobrook said. "Although I will miss all of my colleagues in AMC, I am most confident the school is destined for a great future under Dr. Lively's leadership."



Lively has been at Lindenwood University since 2007, initially as a professor and program chair for the Interactive Media & Web Design program in the School of Communications, and represented the school for six consecutive years on the Faculty Council, four as the chair. He has served the last three years as an assistant dean and then associate dean of the School of Arts, Media, and Communications. Lively has been teaching in higher education since 1998.

"I am honored that the faculty and staff of the School of Arts, Media, and Communications, rather than opting for a nationwide search, have the confidence in me to lead the school," Lively said. "I look forward to working

with this amazing team and am certain that we will accomplish great things in the coming years."

The Hammond Institute's Center for Economics and the Environment Receives Top Worldwide Ranking



Based on the quality and impact of its economics research, Lindenwood's Hammond Institute for Free Enterprise is among the top 9 percent of economics research organizations in the world. Only three other academic departments in Missouri rank higher: the economics departments of Washington University in St. Louis, and the University of Missouri, and the Olin School of Business at Washington University.

This ranking is produced by RePEc (Research Papers in Economics) and is based on the research output and citation records of over 70,000 economists worldwide. RePEc is the primary resource among economists for bibliographic information about economics working papers and journal publications.

Also according to RePEc, Lindenwood's Plaster School of Business & Entrepreneurship, which houses the Hammond Institute, <u>ranks among the top 11 percent</u> of the world's business schools. The Olin School is the only business school in Missouri that ranks higher.

Four Hammond Institute economists--<u>Howard Wall, Rik Hafer, Richard Anderson, and Daniel Thornton</u>--<u>rank among the world's top 5 percent of economists</u> in several categories.

Wall, the director of the Hammond institute, said, "Our research ranking is not an end in itself, but it is an important component of our contribution to the university. Most obviously, it enhances the academic reputation of Lindenwood and the Plaster School. In addition, our students benefit because we bring our research experience into our courses and into the various student programs supported by the Institute."
