WOLF NAMED TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS - John D. Wolf of Manchester, vicepresident and general manager of McDonnell Douglas Electronics Co. in St. Charles, has been elected as the 29th member of the Lindenwood College Board of Directors. Active in volunteer and community events, he is a member of St. Joseph Health Center Development Council in St. Charles, and has served as president of the American Cancer Society West County Board of Directors, the Manchester School Parent Teachers Association and the Glen Trail Local Homeowners Association.

Holding undergraduate and graduate degrees in electrical engineering, Wolf joined McDonnell Douglas Corp. in 1967. He is a member of the Institute of Electrical & Electronic Engineers, the American Institute of Aeronautics & Astronautics and the Electronic Industries Association. Married, he and his wife, Carol Louise, have two sons - Stephen J., 16, and Scott W., 14.

RENAISSANCE MEDAL OF HONOR - The Kiwanis Club of St. Charles (Noon Day) will provide an honor scholarship, valued at nearly \$2,500 annually, to be awarded each spring to an outstanding Lindenwood student. Called the "St. Charles Kiwanis Renaissance Medal of Honor," the award will be matched financially by the college, enabling the student to receive full tuition for one year.

"This scholarship will be given to a student, one of our best, who exemplifies the highest academic and community standards," said Jim Thompson, major funds coordinator. The student must have a 3.7 or higher GPA and be active in campus and community events, such as the student newspaper or yearbook, church or campus and/or community organizations such as the Lindenwood Circle K Club, he added.

With a membership of nearly 25, the Circle K is a coeducational campus organization hosted by the Kiwanis Club. Founded recently, it is the first international organization on campus, providing service to the college and St. Charles community.

A special committee has been formed to select the outstanding recipient of the award. It consists of three Kiwanis representatives along with William B. Schaefer, immediate past president of the club and founder of the Circle K; James F. Hood, acting dean of faculty; Larry Sackman, director of financial aid; and Thompson, who serves as advisor to the Circle K. The scholarship and a certificate of recognition will be presented at Honors Day in April. The scholarship is for the following academic year. Post Office Procedures RE:



In May, 1983, personnel cutbacks left the Post Office with only one full-time employee. At that time, your assistance was requested in order to process the mail in an efficient manner. Unfortunately, established procedures were followed for only a short period of time. I am again posting the following regulations, and I ask your utmost cooperation in seeing that they are followed.

Only authorized personnel are allowed in the Post Office. No one will be permitted inside the Post Office to pick up or disperse mail.

You must have a mailbox key to receive mail. If you do not have a key, or if you need additional keys, please ask to have a key(s) made. No mail will be handed through the window.

Please sort your mail into separate groups (on campus or off campus).

All foreign mail must be brought to the attention of

- The flaps should be left up (open) on all out-going mail which needs to be sealed. Brown 9x12" envelopes should be sealed and clasped, as should very thick envelopes. Over-stuffed envelopes cannot be put through the mailing machine.
- Account numbers must be in the upper right-hand corner for all out-going
- All on-campus mail must have (1) a name and (2) a box number.

For third-class bulk mailings:

(a) You must have 200 or more letters for bulk mailings.

- (b) All bulk mailings must be accompanied by a correctly-approved Inter-Departmental Order (IDO) and must be signed by Jerry Rufkahr.
 (c) All materials have to be the same (such as same envelopes, letters
- and insertions), and there can be no personal notations inside or outside of the envelope.

(d) A bulk permit stamp must be in the right-hand corner. convenience, the Printing Center can print the bulk permit on your envelope. See Kris Cordes for details.

(e) Flaps should be left up if mail needs to be sealed.(f) The Post Office must have one week's notice for bulk mailings. This amount of time is needed to arrange for processing and to deposit money in our bulk postal account.

(g) All mailings must be received in proper zip code order.

(h) You might consider a sample mailing to your residence. This will give you an idea of how long it takes for your mailing to be received.

Thank you for your cooperation and patience.
